





To avoid burning, stir constantly. Pour the catsup into the sterilized jars or bottles. Set the hot containers at once in a vessel of hot water having a false bottom to prevent breaking. Put the cork stoppers in loosely and process at the boiling point for thirty minutes, cork and seal tight. Mrs. Sarah Tyson Rorer, the Philadelphia cooking expert, gives to-day a few simple rules for canning regetables.

"Light your stove first. Put a wash boiler filled with water on one burner, a teakettle on another, and a large pan of water on the third. "Prepare vegetables by washing, and skinning where this is necessary." Mrs. Rorer says, "Wash the glass jars, adjust rubbers on them, and screw on the tops to test them.



"Then open jars, but do not re-ove the rubbers. Put them, with le lids, in a pan, and dip over them com the boiler enough water to

"Put the vegetables in a square of cheesecloth, and lower into the pan of boiling water for 15 minutes. Lift, drain, and put into the jars

"Add a teaspoon of salt to each quart jar. Add enough bolling water to fill jar (after vegetables arin). Screw on the tops, give half turn back, and place at once on the rack in the wash boller or canner. "Individual wire helders cost but little and are more easily managed than a solid rack. When the boller is filled, cover, wait until the water again boils and turn down to low heat."

gests a new and pleasing way of cooking string beans. Etring beans are very rich in vitamines. Mrs. DeGraf's recipe follows:

String and cut beans in two lengthwise. Cook in a boiling salted water in an uncovered saucepan about 35 minutes. Use only shough water to barely cover beans. Drain and season with ¼ teaspoon salt and a dash of pepper and I tablespoon of butter. Set beans seide until sauce is made.

Put 2 egg yolks in a small saucepan, add I teaspoons of flour and I tablespoon of lemon juice; mix them and add I cup of stock. The stock can either be canned consomme, a bouillon cube dissolved in warm water or strained soup stock. Cook over a very low fire until sauce has thickened, then add to hot beans. Too fast or too long cooking will make this sauce curdie.

when well dried, put half of them into a shallow baking dish, season highly with salt and cayenne, sprinkle over the beans three table-spoonfuls of grated cheese, and pour over three tablespoonfuls of heavy cream. Repeat, making two layers and put into the oven to heat and brown about ten minutes.




