### THE ONE STOCK SHOW TO BE GREATEST IN HISTORY OF THE TEXAS STATE FAIR



The fleetest runners, the best draught horses, the most highly trained and best looking saddle horses will be at the State Fair of Texas next month.

when the big show opens on Oct. 8 according to Dr. A. E. Flowers, superintendent of the horse and racing departments of the Fair, who returned Saturday from a trip to the northern state fairs.

"At the Illinois and Missouri State Fairs I found exhibitors of the best breeds of draught horses greatly interested in the premiums the State Fair of Texas is offering in these classes," said Dr. Flowers, "and many of them agreed to exhibit here, some of them planning to send their full herds for display. This year the draught horse section of the show will be complete.

"In the beef cattle departments I found that the major exhibitors of past years, showing the finest herds of Herefords and Shorthorns, were headed this way and requested that ample space be reserved for them. The same is true of the Holstein men, who had fine exhibits in both Illinois and Missouri. They are coming, too.

"Many of the contesting breeders of Jerseys assure me that this year they were going to lock horns with our Texas exhibitors, admitting that while Texas could claim the largest herds of Jerseys in the world, there was a chance that the prizes for the best might possibly go elsewhere. So they are going to give our great Texas Jersey breeders a run for their money, they say.

"In the race sections, however, I found the greatest enthusiasm. The owners are keen to get back to the South and it pleased them all to learn that the directors of the 1927 Fair had reinstated horse racing.



Among these horse owners were many Texans, who were 100 per cent for the movement "back to Texas."

### The Largest Phonograph in The World at the Texas State Fair

The largest phonograph in the world will be installed in front of the Plaza at the State Fair of Texas, which opens Oct. 8, in a location where it may be seen and heard by thousands as a free attraction.

Because of the demands made upon the manufacturers, the giant instrument will not be set up at Dallas until the second week of the fair, but it will remain until the close on Oct. 25.

## An Open Letter to the Editor

From the President of General Motors

**TELEPHONE IS PARENT OF AN ILLUSTRIOUS FAMILY**

The telephone, through research and experience, has become the father of an illustrious family of communication instruments. These include the Vitaphone which furnishes a voice to the motionpicture screen; an audiometer to test hearing; an electrical stethoscope which amplifies the faintest heart sounds; a public address system which carries a speaker's voice to crowds of thousands and tens of thousands; and the microphone the heart of the radio. Many, if not all, of these devices are used in some form by the telephone industry in its present role of transmitting human speech, while others have found a big and useful field in other industries. At the present time a force of 3,800 people, composed of scientists, engineers, chemists, research workers of various kinds, are engaged in seeking better, cheaper and faster improvements in telephony.

In the manufacture of certain telephone parts, machinery of an almost unbelievable accuracy is required. One piece in operation in the works of

the Western Electric Company is a measuring machine that is capable of measurements within one one-hundred thousandth of an inch. These results are a part of the contribution to the general welfare and happiness of the public which a privately owned and operated utility makes, and is in vivid contrast to the nonprogressive attitude of government owned and operated telephone systems in Europe where the service is inadequate, says the Texas Public Service Information Bureau.

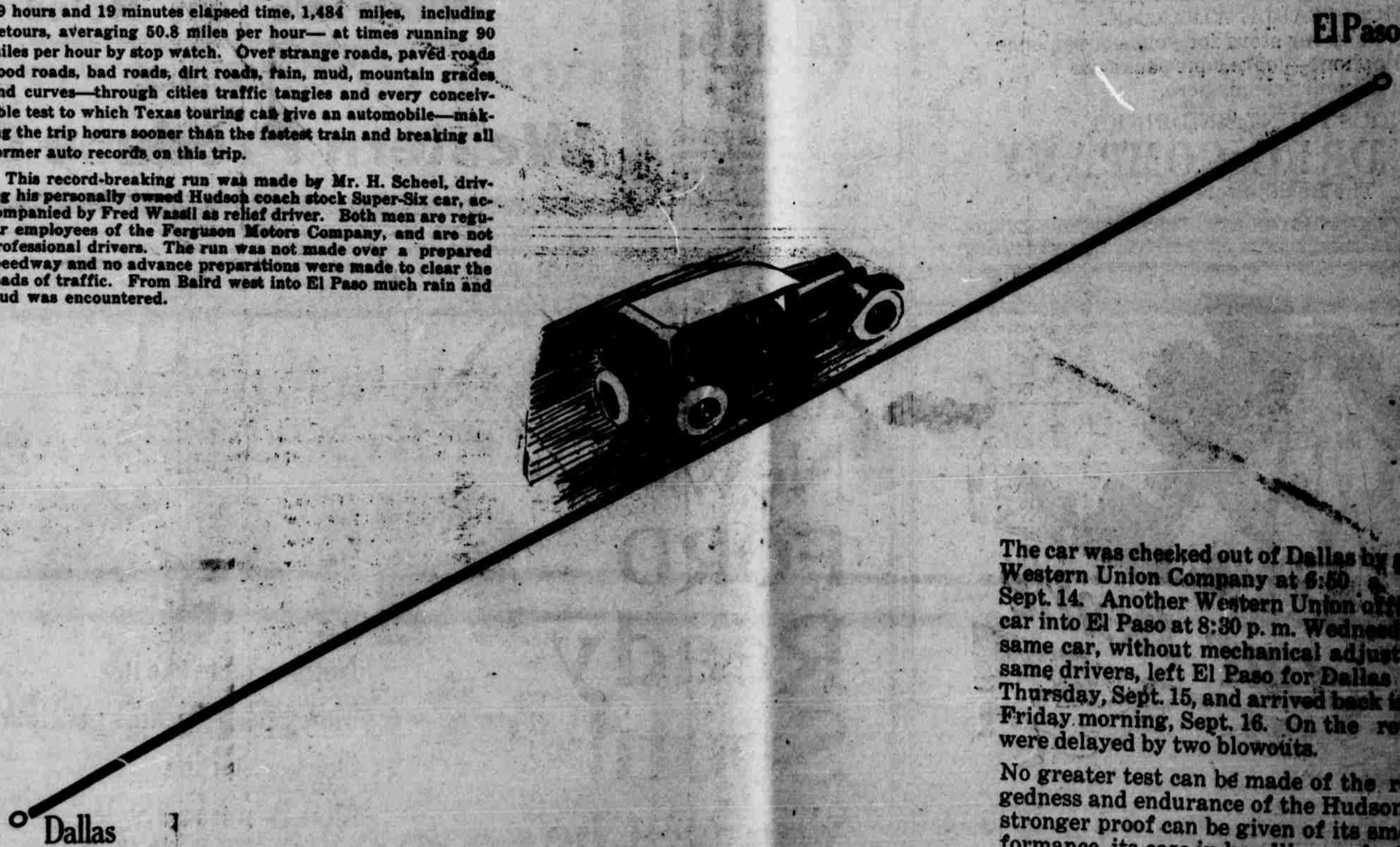

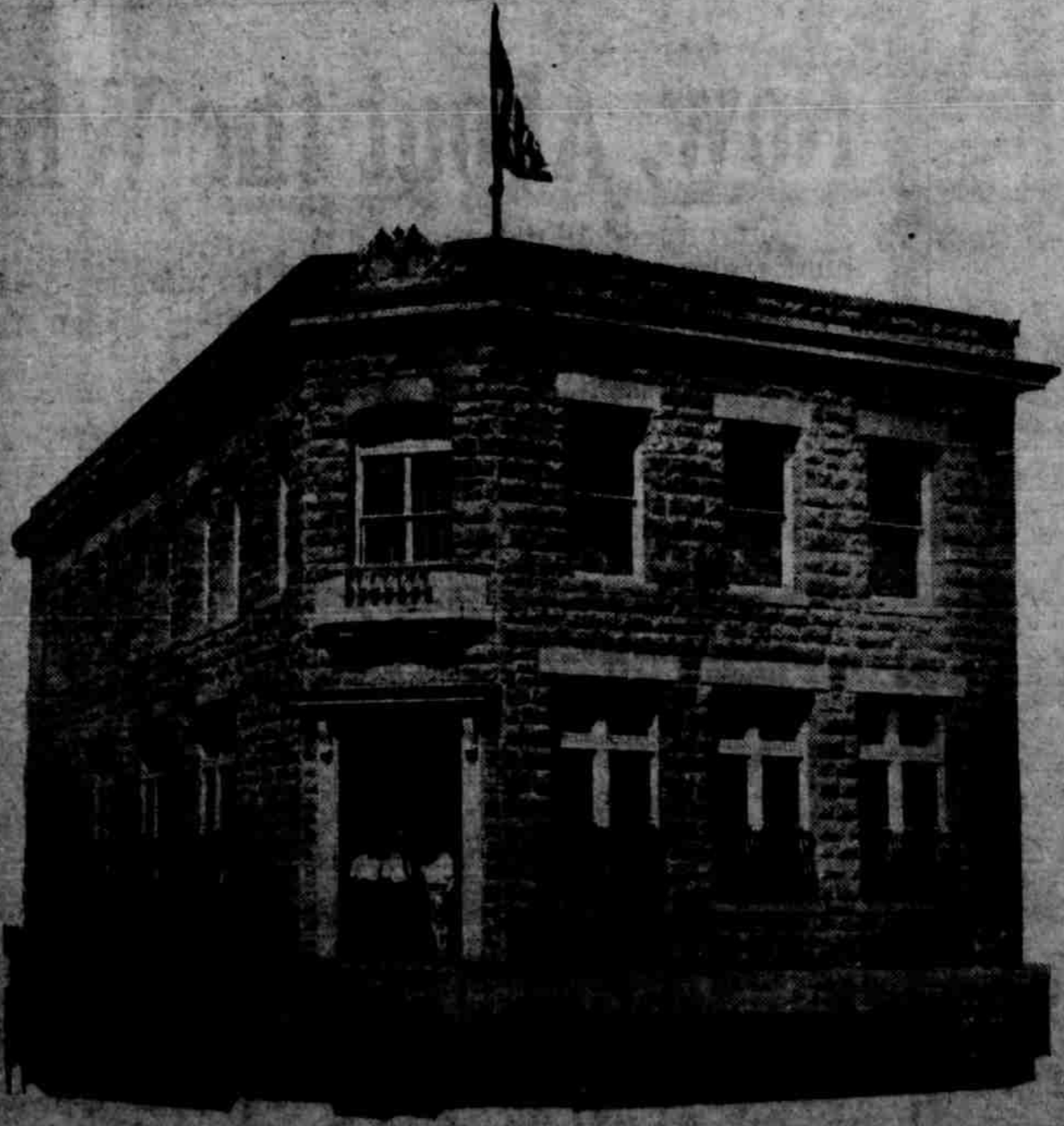

**GREEN TOMATO PICKLES**

Following are a few more recipes for pickling for those who are interested in saving their surplus vegetables, given by Miss Gunn, the County Home Demonstration Agent.

- Green Tomato Pickles**
- 1 gallon green tomatoes.
  - 1 1/2 dozen large onions.
  - 3 cups brown sugar.
  - 1 1/2 lemon.
  - 3 pods red pepper.
  - 3 cups vinegar.
  - 1 tablespoon whole black pepper.
  - 1 tablespoon whole cloves.
  - 1 tablespoon all spice.
  - 1 tablespoon celery seed (crushed).
  - 1 tablespoon mustard seed.
  - 1 tablespoon ground mustard.
- Slice the tomatoes and the onions thin, sprinkle over them 1-2 cup salt and let stand over night in a crock or enameled vessel. Tie the pepper, cloves allspice and celery seed in a cheese cloth bag. Slice the lemon and chop the pepper pod very fine. Drain the onions and tomatoes well. Add the seasoning, except one peppercorn to the vinegar, then add the tomatoes and the onion. Cook for one-half hour, stirring gently at intervals to prevent burning. Remove the spice bag to prevent darkening the product. Pack by garnishing the opposite sides of the jar with strips of red pepper in a vertical fashion. Process for fifteen minutes. (pint jar is the standard container).

- Tomato Catsup**
- 2 tablespoons salt.
  - 4 tablespoons sugar.
  - 1 tablespoon powdered mustard.
  - 1 pint good vinegar.
  - 1 level teaspoon each of whole allspice, cloves, cinnamon and pepper.
  - 2 red peppers, seeded and sliced.
  - 1 gallon tomato pulp.
- Add 1 cup chopped red pepper (seeded) and 2 medium sized chopped onions to 1 gallon of red ripe tomatoes. Cook thoroughly, mash through sieve, measure the pulp. Add to it the spices, which should be tied in a bag. Cook for 1 1/2 hours, add vinegar, and cook until thick. Rapid cooking keeps the fine bright red color in the catsup. To avoid burning, stir constantly. Pour the catsup into the sterilized jars or bottles. Set the hot containers at once in a vessel of hot water having a false bottom to prevent breaking. Put the cork stoppers in loosely and process at the boiling point for thirty minutes, cork and seal tight. When cool dip mouth of bottle into melted paraffin, or cover the stopper with sealing wax. (1 pint square jars standard containers, 8 ounce commercial bottles of catsup are put up for market).

- Chili Sauce**
- 1 gallon chopped ripe tomatoes.
  - 1 cup chopped white onions.
  - 1 1/2 cup chopped sweet green peppers.
  - 1 1/2 cup chopped sweet red peppers.
  - 1 1/2 cup brown sugar.
  - 2 tablespoons ginger.
  - 1 tablespoon cinnamon.
  - 1 tablespoon mustard.
  - 1 nutmeg (grated).
  - 1 onion (grated).
  - 5 tablespoons salt.
  - 1 1/2 cup cayenne pepper.
- Peel the tomatoes and the onions. Chop the onions and the peppers fine. Boil all the ingredients except the vinegar together for two hours or until soft and broken. Add vinegar and simmer for one hour. Stir frequently. Bottle and seal while hot.

- Pepper Hash**
- 12 green peppers.
  - 12 red peppers.
  - 5 medium sized onions.
- Run these through the food chopper and drain. To one gallon of boiling water add one-half cup salt and pour while hot over the mixture. Let stand and drain. Add hot salt water again and let stand. Repeat three times, this removes the excess coloring matter from the green peppers and gives a better flavor to the whole mixture. When thoroughly drained, add 1 1/2 pt. vinegar to which has been added 1 cup water and 1 cup sugar, and cook until tender. Pack in sterilized jars while hot. The salt for this relish is added as desired. Glass top jars are better as others corrode easily.

- Peanut Butter**
- Use peanuts freshly parched to a light brown color. Remove the skins and put through the food chopper using the finest knife. It may be necessary to put the peanuts through the grinder the second and third time. Salt to taste. A little oil or melted butter may be added if the peanuts are not moist enough to spread well. Pack in pint jars, seal and process for thirty minutes.

## City Buys New Fire Truck



The City of Haskell has purchased a new high pressure automobile pumper for the Fire Department from the Southern Fire Apparatus Co., of Dallas, Texas. The truck is the latest and most modern type of fire fighting equipment and is equipped with a 90-horsepower Waukesha motor and is capable of pumping 500 gallons of

water per minute at 120 pounds pump pressure. During a recent demonstration the new machine threw a stream of water over the top of the dome on the courthouse. The purchase of the new truck will effect quite a saving to the property owners that carry fire insurance as it will cut the key rate 4 cents. There is

an additional cut coming as soon as the controls are changed from the old pump house and then Haskell will be a city of the first class, making the key rate 40 cents or lower. The Southern Fire Apparatus Company was represented before the council by J. E. Blaine and Dick Yeargin. The truck will be delivered in about 30 to 40 days.

**DUSTING COTTON BY AEROPLANE TO BE DAILY FEATURE AT STATE FAIR OF TEXAS**



One of the newest features added to the attractions at the State Fair will be an actual demonstration of dusting cotton by aeroplanes to kill the boll weevil and the boll worm. This will be a daily feature from October 8 to 23.

Lieut. Henry Toncray of Lone Oak, Texas, well known as the "Flying Ford Dealer" and an experienced cotton duster, will pilot the machine during the demonstrations, and will lecture on "The Advantages of Dusting Cotton."

A harmless powder will be used in the demonstration instead of the calcium arsenate, which is used for the cotton dusting.

Lieutenant Toncray has had wide experience in dusting cotton, having spent the past two summers doing the actual work on farms in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

# Cooking Chats with 6 Famous Cooks

(Courtesy of the Domestic Science Department, Perfection Stove Company)

## VEGETABLES FOR VITAMINES

(Editor's Note: This is one of the unusual cooking articles by 6 famous cooks.)  
**Vitamines! What are they? We hear about them on all sides. "They are necessary for normal nutrition, necessary for growth," it is said.**

Their chemical nature is not known. But it is an established fact, that when they are lacking in the diet, health suffers. Certain diseases are attributed to this lack—outstandingly rickets.

Vegetables, fruits and milk are rich in vitamins. Spinach and tomatoes contain a higher percentage of vitamins than any other foods.

### The Year Around

Can we have plenty of vitamins in the diet the year around? Certainly. And very easily, too, in canned vegetables and fruits, among other things. (Though canning lessens the vitamin content somewhat.)

Mrs. Sarah Tyson Rorer, the Philadelphia cooking expert, gives today a few simple rules for canning vegetables.

"Light your stove first. Put a wash boiler filled with water on one burner, a teakettle on another, and a large pan of water on the third. "Prepare vegetables by washing, and skinning where this is necessary." Mrs. Rorer says. "Wash the glass jars, adjust rubbers on them, and screw on the tops to test them.



### Seal It Quickly

"Then open jars, but do not remove the rubbers. Put them, with the lids in a pan, and dip over them from the boiler enough water to seal."

"Put the vegetables in a square of cheesecloth, and lower into the pan of boiling water for 15 minutes. Lift, drain, and put into the jars at once.

"Add a teaspoon of salt to each quart jar. Add enough boiling water to fill jar after vegetables are in. Screw on the tops, give half turn back, and place at once on the rack in the wash boiler or canner.

"Individual wire holders cost but little and are more easily managed than a solid rack. When the boiler is filled, cover, wait until the water again boils and turn down to low heat."

### Star Parasite Remover

Give in water or feed side chickens and turkeys of intestinal worms, blood-sucking Eels, Mites, Fleas, etc. Eggs; improves their health, reduces disease, increases egg production. Same batch better with steaming young chicks in spring hatch.

### Flour String Beans

Mrs. Belle DeGraf, San Francisco home economist, suggests a new and pleasing way of cooking string beans. String beans are very rich in vitamins. Mrs. DeGraf's recipe follows:

String and cut beans in two lengthwise. Cook in a boiling salted water in an uncovered saucepan about 25 minutes. Use only enough water to barely cover beans. Drain and season with 1/4 teaspoon salt and a dash of pepper and 1 tablespoon of butter. Set beans aside until sauce is made.

Put one yolk in a small saucepan, add 1 teaspoon of flour and 1 tablespoon of lemon juice; mix them and add 1 cup of stock. The stock can either be canned consommé or bouillon cubes dissolved in warm water or strained soup stock. Cook over a very low fire until sauce has thickened, then add to hot beans. Too fast or too long cooking will make this sauce curdle.

### Beans Au Gratin

Another good dish is one recommended by Miss Lucy G. Allen, principal of the Boston School of Cookery. "Drain a can of stringless beans, and place them on a clean cloth to absorb all moisture," Miss Allen says.

"When well dried, put half of them into a shallow baking dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper, a bouillon cube dissolved in warm water or strained soup stock. Cook over a very low fire until sauce has thickened, then add to hot beans. Too fast or too long cooking will make this sauce curdle.



### Glassed Carrots

Miss Allen also gives a recipe for glassed carrots. Carrots also have a high vitamin content.

Wash, scrape and cook five medium carrots. Cut in thin slices. Melt two tablespoons of butter in an oiled pan, and add two tablespoons of sugar. Add slices of carrots, and stir well until browned.

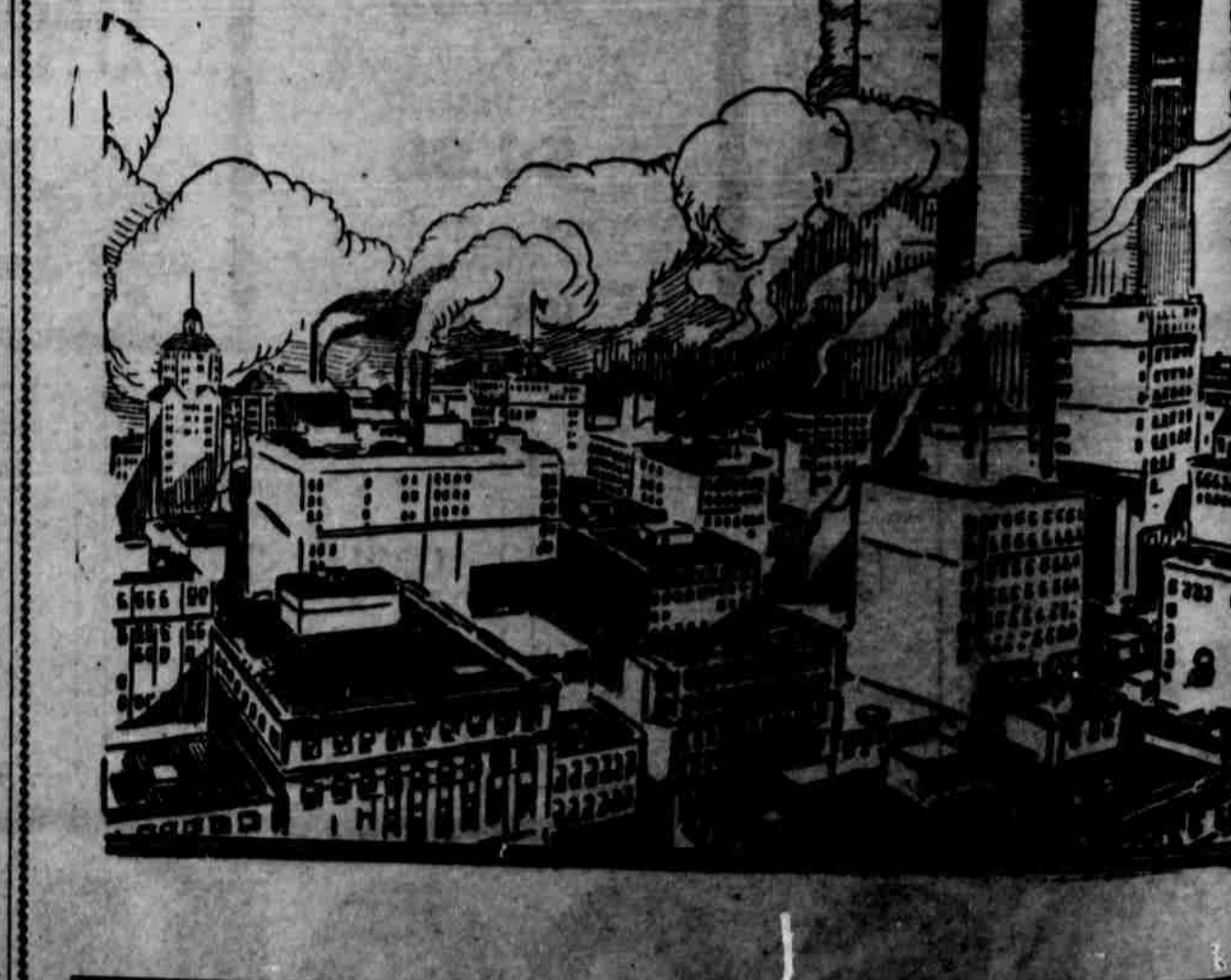

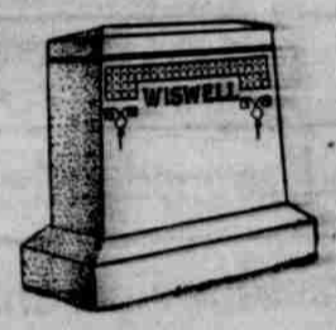
