Sen. Duncan to take helm of Tech System

The Texas Tech University System Board of Regents have announced that Texas State Senator Robert Duncan will become the next Chancellor

Senator Duncan

of Texas Tech University. The announcement comes after reports last week that three candidates were being considered.

"To be able to serve the great universities in the Texas Tech University System is a tremendous honor for my family and me," Duncan said after learning of his selection. "I love the people of West Texas and will


devote all of my energy to continue to grow the reputations for excellence of all of the universities in the system. I am deeply indebted to the Board of Regents for this opportunity."

Now that Senator Duncan has been named the sole finalist for the chancellor position, state law requires that 21 days must pass before final action can be taken by the Board of Regents on his employment. Senator Duncan's start date as chancellor is expected to be July 1.

Any decision about the timing of the Senator's resignation from the Texas Senate will occur after the Texas Tech Board of Regents officially approves his selection as Chancellor and approve the employment contract.

In a press release Mickey Long, chairman of the Texas Tech Board of Regents praised Duncan. "Although we looked nationally for candidates to fill this very important position, we are delighted that our selection has strong personal ties to this area and university," said Mickey Long, chairman of the Board of Regents. "Texas Tech is fortunate to have someone of Sen. Duncan's stature and reputation

KNOX CITY - Jim Dillon, Knox County Primary Election winner for judge, has officially dropped out of the race. Dillon is dropping out before the upcoming runoff election that will be held on May 27.

Dillon said he will simply not have time with his other business ventures to perform in the elected po-

Travis Floyd. Dillon initially won the primary election for county judge, but now feels that fellow Republican Floyd would be the better

Munday School Board holds recount, results tallied

MUNDAY — The Munday Consolidated Independent School Board of Trustees met in regular session on Thursday, May 15. The reason for the meeting, amongst other things, was to hold a recount for the results stemming from its general election on May 10. After the recount request by two of the candidates was granted, the recount was performed at 10 a.m. the following morning on May 16 and the results tallied.

The purpose of the recount was not only to increase accuracy and accountability since the election was so close, but to also review results and compile tabulation

on path to citizenship

MUNDAY — For years now, Rev. Susan Felty and the First United Methodist Church of Munday have been hosting an ESL program designed not only to teach English to members of the local Hispanic population, but also gain them legal citizenship in the U.S. One Munday mom, Maria Vega, who has called the United States home for over 21 years now, has elected to participate in the program and is about the

graduate and earn her citizenship this month. FUMC began the ESL program back in Jan. of 2005 and originally offered classes on both Wednesday and Monday nights. The first year saw 18 people sign up. However the Monday night classes were eventually cancelled as the Wednesday classes grew. The Wednesday classes are held in early afternoon at 1 p.m.

The program utilized the Lawbach Method of Teaching Reading and English. It consists of four textbooks that begin with Fonix ABC's and progress to beginning reading and eventu-

ally comprehension. Life skills and advanced map and street sign reading come next in the program before it concludes with learning

functionality in society. Mrs. Vega's ESL instructor at First United Methodist is retired Munday Elementary School teacher Debbie Pankhurst. Pankhurst was not only a kindergarten teacher in Munday, but taught all three of Vega's daughters, Maria, Anne, and Alexa. In addition to teaching Mrs. Vega and her three children, she also taught and guided Vega's brother successfully through the ESL program. Vega's husband, Alejandro Vega, an employee of Baker Farm, is very supportive of his wife's education.

Vega will eventually have to submit to an interview and questionnaire involving what she has learned to gain her citizenship. She will also have to complete an advanced test in order to gain that citizenship. The test will consist of history, government, and geography and contain written, oral, and comprehen-

shut down, so here we are," Wilde said. Even though there have been some industrial needs, most of Wilde's recent business has been coming from residential homes within the county.

"The late cold front came through and caused a lot of damage around Knox. From Truscott, to Benjamin, to Munday, we were getting calls from residents all over the county. Now that the warmer months are here, things are less chaotic now," Wilde continued.

"I am very happy to be serving the folks in and around Knox County and hope to be doing so for a long time," said Wilde, before

Box 39, Munday, Texas 76371, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a renewal of TCEQ Permit No. WQ0010228002, which authorizes the disposal of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 200,000 gallons per day. The permit also authorizes surface irrigation of 113 acres of non-public access agricultural land to the south of and adjacent to the facility. TCEQ received this application on November 25, 2013.

The facility is located immediately south of Farm-to-Market Road 1587, approximately 5.9 miles southeast of the intersection of State Highway 277 and Farm-to-Market Road 222 in Knox County, Texas 76371. The treated effluent is discharged to an unnamed tributary; thence to Lake Creek; thence to the Brazos River Above Possum Kingdom Lake in Segment No. 1208 of the Brazos River Basin. The unclassified receiving water use is minimal aquatic life use for unnamed tributary and Lake Creek. The designated uses for Segment No. 1208 are high aquatic life use and primary contact recreation. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revisions.

The TCEQ Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The Executive Director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ holds a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision. Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

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Should Texas establish DUNCAN From Page 1 Beef Checkoff forum?

AUSTIN - As petitioned by Texas cattle industry representatives and consistent with Texas law, the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) will conduct a referendum on the establishment of a producer-funded and managed state-level Beef Checkoff program.

Financed through a refundable assessment paid by beef producers, the program would be used for the promotion, marketing, research and educational efforts of Texas beef and beef products for consumers in Texas, the United States and internationally. Voting on the measure begins statewide on Monday, June 2, 2014 and closes at 5 p.m. on Friday, June 6, 2014.

As allowed under the Texas Agriculture Code, cattle industry organizations, on behalf of their members, petitioned TDA to conduct the referendum. Eligible beef producers may vote on whether they wish to pay a refundable maximum assessment of \$1 per head of cattle, which will be collected at each point of ownership transfer in Texas. The assessment would establish the Texas Beef Checkoff program, which would be managed by the Beef Promotion

and Research Council of Texas (BPRCT). Council members would be appointed by Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples based on producer nominees. If approved, collection of the assessment would begin on Oct. 1, 2014 and continue until the BPRCT notifies cattle collection points to cease collection. Beef producers, regardless of age, who owned cattle in Texas between June 6, 2013 and June 6, 2014 are eligible to vote in the election. 
