# Turbines being erected for planned wind farm

#### For The News-Courier

RED SPRINGS — IEA, the lead contractor for the 300-megawatt Green Pasture Wind Farm provides a report to commissioners and TxDOT officials at the wind farm laydown yard just north of here recently.

The IEA representative indicated that starting the first week in September, there would be approximately 130 concrete trucks traveling west on Hwy. 82 from FM 2069 as part of phase 1, pouring of concrete for the bases.

In addition, IEA indicated parts were arriving daily and being assembled and they expected to be able to assemble three complete turbines per week after finishing the first one this week. The turbines are expected to be up and running starting in 2015.

Austin-based Pioneer Energy is investing between \$400 million to \$450 million into the project. About a third of the wind farm will be located in Knox County and the remainder in Baylor County.

To put into perspective just how big a 300-megawatt wind farm is, each of an expected 100 to 150 turbines, depending upon its size, generates anywhere from 1.5 to 3 megawatts of power per year — enough to supply electricity for thousands of homes.







# Greyhounds knock off Team Spirit Water Valley, 47-24



KNOX CITY-The Knox City Greyhounds enjoyed success with their run-pass options behind Elias Nevarez as they surprised the Water Valley Wildcats, 47-24, in their home opener Friday night at Greyhound Stadium.

Coach Charles Steele felt evervone who wore a uniform had a part in the win. "This was a huge win for our program," he said. "They were a top 10 team and picked to beat us by 17 points. We showed a lot of heart and determination throughout the game.

"Every team has a defining moment in a season where they realize how good they can be. This game was our moment. Our expectations just went up to a new level."



STAMFORD—Two early turnovers put the Monday Moguls in a hole from which they could not recover as they dropped a 41-14 decision to the Stamford Bulldogs, winners of the state titles the last two seasons, here Friday night at Robertson Stadium.



# **Mac's Views**

Since six-man football is big in Knox County with two schools involved, I've had to get a refresher on how it is different from the 11-man game and wanted to share a little with others who might be in the same boat as I was.



First, the fields are shorter 80 yards long and 40 yards wide, making the 40 at midfield. Teams must make 15 yards to gain a first down. At least three players must be on the line of scrimmage at the snap. Unless the ball is kicked or passed forward, the ball can't be advanced until after an exchange is

made between the receiver of the snap and another player. All players are eligible to catch a forward pass. Field goals count four points, successful PAT kicks two points and a

run or pass one point. There's a mercy rule, too. If a team is 45 points ahead a halftime, the game is over. It's also over when the point spread eclipses 45 anytime in the second half. The scores you see sometimes look more like basketball scores.

"It's certainly nice to see Friday Night Lights return," said Sean Wilson, a BHS ex who played football there 2002-2006.
