

FIRST BALE OF COTTON CITY PURCH IS BROUGHT IN MON

The 1867 Tax Levy for the county was exampled Saturday by the Complications County the general levy for the county being assessed at 64c, based on an assessed valuation of property of \$0,500,000 made by Tax Assessor Mike B. Watson.


STAMFORD BOY KILLED IN FALL FROM TRAIN
