A disaster was averted last week because of some fast responses and dedicated work.

An electrical line snapped and ignited a grass fire last Wednesday on the Carroll Ranch in an area of Knox County near Truscott.

High, gusty winds added fuel and the wildfire spread quickly.

Things started happening quickly. Area fire departments were dispatched, the Knox commissioners were on their way with road equipment and the head of the Department of Public Safety Emergency Management called to report a hot spot on satelite, offering assistance if necessary. However, the fire departments had assessed the situation and had aleady called the Texas Forest Service.

cent contained by midday Thursday before a wind shift caused a flare up. That's when air tankers were called in to assist, extinguishing the wildfire after 2,100 acres had been burned. Units were stationed Friday as a precaution.

"My first response with a county emergency was made easy because all departments knew their jobs and quickly jumped into action working together," said Judge Stan Wojcik. "We should be proud of them.

### oner Ranch sold for \$735 million News on the go

VERNON - Professional sports mogul and rancher Stan Kroenke, whose holdings include the Los Angeles Rams football team, has been approved to purchase the iconic W.T. Waggoner Ranch for \$735 million.

The historic property, considered the largest U.S. ranch behind one fence, had been on the market for 18 months at an asking price of \$725 million.

The transaction will be the first-ever sale of the property, an approximately 535,000-acre estate which was established in 1849 and spans six Texas counties, including Knox, and almost 800 square miles. The ranch includes thousands of cattle, hundreds of horses and oil wells, and 30,000 acres of

#### farmland.

Kroenke, whose net worth is listed at \$7.3 billion by Forbes, said that he would continue to preserve and protect the Waggoner Ranch, which he called a "uniquely American treasure."


"This is an incredible opportunity and an even greater responsibility," Kroenke said. "We are honored to assume ownership of the Waggoner - a true Texas and American landmark - and are deeply committed to continuing the proud legacy of W.T. "Tom" Waggoner, his family and his descendants...."

Kroenke, 68, is owner of Kroenke Sports Enterprises, which includes the NFL's Rams, NBA's Denver Nuggets, NHL's Colorado Avalanche, major league soccer's Colorado Rapids and the Colorado Mammoth of the National Lacrosse League.

Dan Waggoner, who was born in Tennessee on July 7, 1828, started ranching in 1849, first settling in Wise County, near Decatur. He brought with him more than 240 longhorn cattle and six horses. It wasn't until about 20 years later that the ranch's growth truly began. Dan and his son, W.T. (Tom), began expanding the land in 1870, after driving a herd of cattle to market in Kansas and returning with \$55,000. That haul would become the basis for their ranch fortune. W.T. continued to cultivate the family's ranching interests after Dan's death in 1903. It was in 1923 that Tom formed what is today known as the W.T. Waggoner Estate.

SEYMOUR - 50th District Judge Bobby Burnett has requested the News-Courier to remind all citizens of Knox County of the importance of jury service since it is becoming more frequent in all four counties of the district for some persons to not call in with a valid excuse and then not show up after being notified by mail.

He stated that the law provides for a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$500 for failure to appear for grand jury service and a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$1,000 for failure to appear for petit (trial) jury service.

"Currently, the fine being imposed is \$150, but if that has to be increased to ensure compliance, we will not hesitate to do so," he said.

Judge Burnett added, "Our judicial system cannot function unless citizens are willing to perform their civic duty and serve as jurors.

Although this may at times be inconvenient, it is a small price to pay for the privilege of living in a democracy.

"It is important to note that if you receive a notice for jury duty and have a good reason for not appearing, you can contact the judge's office in Seymour during ordinary business hours at 940 889-6912. The problem we have is with those who do not show up and do not contact us prior to the time they are scheduled to appear."

Persons who are more than 70 years of age or are disabled and who wish to be permanently excused from jury duty may contact the district clerk's office at the courthouse and fill out the necessary form to accomplish this.


Munday suffered a 42-22 setback to Whitharral in the area round last season.

I've got a recipe for you this week I'll think you'll really like. It's a new twist on chili pie. I made it a couple of weeks ago and it was really good, and easy. Julie loved it, too. We had it for supper and she took some to school for lunch the next day. I added lettuce, tomatoes, sour cream and avocado to mine. Really good stuff. I hope you'll try it. Julie already wants me to make it again. And how about some really easy cookies for dessert?

### Easy Crescent Chili Pie

1 can Pillsbury<sup>™</sup> refrigerated crescent dinner rolls 1 can (28 oz.) chili with or without beans 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

1/2 lb. ground beef 1 cup corn chips

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Separate refrigerated crescent dinner rolls into eight triangles. Arrange in ungreased nine inch pie plate to form a crust. Brown ground beef, stirring frequently, until cooked; drain if necessary. Stir in chili. Pour beef mixture into pie plate. Sprinkle evenly with shredded cheese. Bake 14 to 18 minutes or until cheese is melted and crust is golden brown. Sprinkle with corn chips. Let stand five minutes before cutting.

### 5 Ingredient Peanut Butter Chocolate Chip Cookies

1 cup creamy peanut butter

1 large egg

1 cup firmly packed brown sugar 1 tsp. baking soda


1/2 cup milk chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix all ingredients except chocolate chips. When blended, mix in the chocolate chips. Using your fingers, form small balls (dough will be very wet and sticky) and place onto an ungreased parchment lined cookie sheet. You don't want to make them too big because they do spread. Bake for nine minutes. Let cookies sit on the cookie sheet for about 30 seconds to one minute before letting cool on wire rack. Makes about a dozen small cookies.



What's the difference between mist and drizzle?


The real difference is only a slight one, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "Mist is composed of tiny droplets of water, so tiny they are suspended in the atmosphere," he explains. "Mist reduces visibility, but not as much as fog, which it closely resembles. Technically speaking, during mist, visibility is one-half mile or more. Drizzle, on the other hand, is fairly uniform precipitation and is composed of small water drops that fall to the ground. The only real difference between drizzle and actual rain is that the droplets in drizzle are much smaller.'


So how much bigger are rain drops in drizzle compared to those in mist? Much larger, says McRoberts. "Drizzle contains drops that are .02 inch or smaller," he adds. "There are even levels of drizzle -- light drizzle (meaning visibility is about onehalf mile); medium drizzle (visibility less than one-half mile) and heavy drizzle (visibility less than one-fourth mile). Mist is thinner than fog and the drops are so tiny that many float in the air, reducing visibility to between one-half mile and up to 1.2 miles. For purposes of measuring, the U.S. Weather Service does not regard fog, dew or frost as precipitation. There is also Arctic mist, which is a mist of ice crystals and is a very light type of ice fog."

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



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
