Trump vs. Clinton Wojcik, Dick claim judge, DA posts race seems likely

Super Tuesday continued to point toward a general election this fall matching Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton.

Trump answered Republican doubters in a clearcut fashion, winning seven contests.

Trump's strong performance guarantees that he will extend a 100+ delegate lead over closest rival Ted Cruz, who won his home state of Texas, offering the biggest prize of delegates Tuesday, plus Oklahoma and Alaska.

Marco Rubio, who had continued sharp attacks of Trump, did keep a glimmer of hope alive as he did win in Minnesota.

Meanwhile, Clinton, apparently beginning to run a general election campaign with a 2-1 lead in delegates, won seven of the states.

Bernie Sanders did post wins in Minnesota, Oklahoma and Colorado as well as his home state of Vermont. Clinton already enjoys a huge lead among the party officials and others who serve as unpledged superdelegates, who have no reason to leave her now.

In Knox County, Cruz led with 305 votes as compared to 165 for Trump, 63 for Rubio, 42 for Ben Carson, and 15 for John The Knox County News-Courier

Stan Wojcik of Knox City, who was appointed last December to be the Knox County judge, will continue in that role this fall after winning the Republican primary Tuesday, posting a 493-195 margin over Augustin Rodriquez of Knox City, who had been the Knox County justice of peace before resigning to run for judge.

Meanwhile, Jennifer Habert Dick of Seymour claimed victory over Lina Trevino in the race for the district attorney's position for the 50th District, which includes Knox, Baylor, Cottle and Kent counties. The exact totals were not available.

Wojcik started his own business in Knox City, Air Ag, in 1984 and served several terms on the city's economic development corporation, served on the North Central Texas Water Authority Board and was a past president of the Knox County Appraisal Review Board.

'I appreciate everyone who turned out and exercised their Constitutional right to vote," Wojcik said. "For those who supported me in the primary, I thank you. I intend to work Knox County. To my opponent Augie Rodriquez, you can be proud of a race well

Dick, who has degrees from Oklahoma State and the Notre Dame Law School, is the Baylor County attorney and has served as an assistant since November, 2015.

hard and do what is best for Dick said. "I plan to work hard to prove myself to those who did not and to honor the trust placed in me by the citizens of all four counties in our district."

In Knox County, Dick enjoyed a 352-330 edge over Trevino, who is the Knox County attorney. Unopposed to outgoing DA David Hajek on the Republican ballot, MItzi Welch received 613 "I am incredibly grateful to votes for county appraisal everyone who supported me," and Johnny McCowan 180

On the Democrat side, Dean Homstad received 94 for sheriff and Iimmy Urbanczyk 19 for commissioner in his precinct. They are also unopposed. The Republican party delegates are scheduled to meet at 10 a.m. March 19 at the Knox County Aging Center in Knox City to select delegates for the state convention.

Critical details missing Thompson inks with HSU from Gitmo plan

WASHINGTON - U.S. Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon), chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, suggested that the White House's plan to close the detention facility at Guantanamo Bay (GTMO) was more press release than a plan.

"It is no substitute for the legally-required detainee plan the President must submit to Congress,"Thornberry said. "That plan is now over-

"Among the information missing is the proposed loca-

tion for a new detention facility. More than seven years after he first ordered the detention center at GTMO closed, I find it telling that the White House has either failed to work out these details or they know, but refuse to disclose them, to the American public.

"It suggests to me that the President is more intersted in fulfilling a campaign promise at any cost, than in transparently addressing the risk associated with bringing terrorists to the United States. And this should be worrisome- after all, this is See GITMO, Page 8

Student debt is not problem of American taxpayer

I don't understand the mindset of how a college student can argue to have their student loans paid off by the American taxpayer.

First of all, there are many ways to attend col-

lege. You can take numerous classes online and it's become much more affordable to progress toward a degree.

Sure, your large institutions and your private schools are ridiculously expensive, but it's a choice to either attend one of CHRIS those schools or a less expensive school.

And let's be real honest here. As someone who attended a large state school, let's not pretend what a huge majority of students do at least part of the time

College kids - I would say the vast majority of them on American campuses - party like rock stars probably three nights a week. Are we to overlook this when it comes to the burden of student debt?

I agree with those that say the cost of college is too high, especially at state schools. That is an issue which should be addressed and corrected. But free? No way.

The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems are amongst the richest in the world. Literally, these systems (dozens of universities across the state) could afford to pay for the education of every student attending system schools and still profit.

With that said, of course those two school systems aren't going to foot the bill for students. But to say there is not a way to reduce the cost of higher education is ridiculous.

Concerning student debt: How did this just now become such a huge issue? Students have been taking out loans for college for decades. Are students simply no longer working their way through school? If not, that's yet another reason I would be very hesitant on forgiving student debt.

There is a segment in this country that believes a college education is a right. That's dumb on several levels, the most important of which is that most jobs in this country do not require a college

For years there has been a shortage of welders in the U.S. Consider this: You take two students - one heads off to a four-year university and borrows the money to attend. The second student decides to learn the trade of welding.

The first student borrows \$20,000 a year for four years to pay for his education.

The second student is on the job in a few months and starts a career at \$60,000 for the first

The first student graduates and cannot find a job in his or her field and now must settle for a low-paying job and has to move back home in order to make any financial progress. The second student is now four years out of

high school, owns his own welding business, has three employees, and makes over \$100,000 a year. Which individual is winning at life in this scenario? That's easy.

My point is there is money to be made doing plenty of things without having to go the traditional route of college.

Current and former college students don't need free college, they need help in making an affordable plan that gets them from Point A to

Putting a couple of trillion dollars on the back of Americans who are already taxed too much is a horrible idea. And making it a right is even a worse idea, as we simply can't afford it.

Either of these are good served over biscuits or toast

Army SOS Creamed Ground Beef

1 pound ground beef

1 cube beef bouillon 1 pinch ground black pepper 1/4 cup all-purpose flour

34 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Brown beef in large skillet over medium high heat. Stir in flour, bouillon, salt and pepper. Saute all together for about five minutes or until flour is absorbed. Gradually stir in milk and Worcestershire sauce. Bring all to a simmer, stirring constantly. Cook until thickened, about five to 10 minutes. Serve hot

Creamed Chipped Beef on Toast

¼ cup all-purpose flour ½ tsp. salt

1 jar dried beef or 12 ounces beef lunch meat

¼ tsp. ground black pepper

Whisk milk, flour, salt and pepper together in a bowl until smooth. Melt butter in a large pot over medium heat. Gradually stir in milk mixture until thick. Add the beef; cook and stir until heated through, about five minutes. Pour


Hutchinson, a Knox City High School graduate and current athletic director of Lubbock Monterey High School, will challenge those attending to make choices that lead toward "success in life."

Music will be provided by current KC coach Jordan Carter and his father Tracy. Nicki Ivie will also be sharing the word of God through songs of praise and worship.


Adults are also encouraged to attend to hear the word of God.

ASBD receives transportation grant

AUSTIN - The Texas Transportation Commission awarded \$35 million to transit providers around the state, including \$45,000 to the Aspermont Small Business Development Center, to improve public transportation for rural Texans.

The funding will help complete construction of four bus facilities and replace 325 buses and vans in growing rural areas with a high percentage of people who rely on these transportation services.

"More reliable buses and vans help these rural residents maintain their independence and improve their overall quality of life by providing access to jobs, education, medical services and shopping," said TxDOT Deputy Executive Director Marc Williams. "Newer transit vehicles also are more reliable, safer and less expensive to maintain."

The \$35 million award includes funds from the federal TIGER (Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery) grant program as well as federal and
