If there had been plenty of moisture in the ground in early fall more varieties of vegetables would be harvested, but Rosborough says that it's not too late for onions, turnips, carrots, beets, lettuce, spinach and cabbage, either in frame gardens or, in the more central and southern parts of the state, in oper plots. These vegetables the frost-hardy and will mature before time to plant the spring

Here are a few suggestions for the late fall garden:

Onion plants will mature in 30 to 40 days; onion sets in 45 to 75 days. When the plants reach a height of four to five inches, thin them out until they are three to four inches apart. The thinnings may be transplan-

Turnips will stand light frost. The purple top variety is the best choice. Fertilize the soil heavily and plant in rows.

Carrots need a deep seed bed. Loosen the soil to a depth of 6 to 8 inches and sow three or four seed to the inch. Germination will be quicker if the soil is "firmed" over the seed with the

Spinach and beet seed have a hard outer shell and germination will be speeded up if the seed is soaked for 24 hours before plant-
