CUCUMBERS IN SOUP CREAM

Slice 3 or 4 peeled cucumbers into a 2 quart bowl

Combine: 1/2 cup cider vinegar
1/2 cup water

1 teaspoon salt

Few shakes pepper

2 tablespoons sugar

Place in refrigerator, covered, for two hours to chill and marinate. At serving time, drain off vinegar mixture. Gently fold in one pint sour cream. Refrigerate and serve cold.

EASY FRUIT SALAD

1 (15 oz.) can pineapple tidbits (in own juice)

1 (16 oz.) can Lite fruit cocktail

1 medium banana, diced

1 box (4 servings) Instant Vanilla

Pudding with Nutra-Sweet

Empty fruit (with juices) into bowl. Stir in dry pudding. Mix well, Refrigerate.

The recipes above are supposed to be for kids to try, so they should be just about right for me.

BARBECUED

CHICKEN WINGS

2 dozen chicken wings, disjointed and tips removed

1 cup catsup

1/3 cup Watkins Barbecue Sauce

1/4 teaspoon Watkins Cayenne (red) Pepper

Unpaid Taxes To Be Turned Over To Collection Lawyers

At the regular meeting of the board of directors of Briscoe County Tax Appraisal District on Thursday, May 7, Mrs. Carlye Fleming, chief appraiser, reported that work has begun in preparing to turn over all unpaid 1986 taxes to the tax attorneys, Perdue, Brandon & Fielder, of Amarillo. The attorneys are to receive these July 1, but the office will be sending out individual notices by June 1 to enable taxpayers to pay these taxes before the additional lawyers' fees must be added on July 1.

Mrs. Fleming also reported that the proof roll for the 1987 valuations has been completed by the office staff and that she was delivering it to the computer company that afternoon. Estimated values for all taxing

entities should be ready by May 15.

The 1986 collections through the month of April were Briscoe County, 94.9%; Silverton ISD, 95.5%; City of Silverton, 94.2%; City of Quitaque, 88.5%; Mackenzie Water Authority, 94.3%.

Following examination of the current month's bills, the motion carried to pay all bills presented.

Attending the meeting were directors L. B. Garvin, jr., Joe Mercer, Robert McPherson and Ray Teeple. Absent was director Paul A. Ramsey.
