

Gold is either found in veins or in a placer or gravel deposit. Placers are the result of shattered and eroded veins in the mountains. Streams carried the bowlders, cobbles and fine gravel, with the released gold, down to the valleys, where it settled and partly solidified. Some of the gravel and gold was deposited along and in the beds of streams. This is either hydraulicked or dredged. Gold in veins may be found in almost any rock, such as slate, schist, diorite or greenstone, granite and quartaite.

Probably the darkest side of the picture is yet to appear, as most accidents occur during the summer months. for which figures have not yet been totaled. In the first five months there were 2,202 accidents at grade crossings and 2,60% people were injured in addition to those killed.

What further steps can be taken? At present the railroads are doing all they can, according to R. H. Aishotn, president of the American Railway Association and so are the state automobile associations as well as such agencies as the National Safety Confer-

In view of the precautions that have been taken. Aishton thinks it is a question now of the motorist waking up to the situation.

One state, Connecticut, has taken drastic action, punishing motorists who are caught flagrantly crossing a track in the face of an approaching train, a method that may be duplicated in other and the cotton is opening very rapidly.

The general expect opinion is that the best means of prevention is to continue the program outlined at the safety conference last year, and to pound away at the danger through continual publicity. This program, in

1. Gradual elimination of grade crossings, through co-operation of railroads and State authorities.

2. Avoid grade crossings in laying out new railroads or highways. The Bureau of Public Roads has adopted this policy in new highway construc-

3. Safeguarding of grade crossings in every possible way, by signs, watchmen at crossings with heavy traffic and re moval of al physical obstructions, such as high banks and buildings, permitting clear view of the track.



In 1895, The Haskell National was consolidated with the First National Bank which occupied the present site of the new Haskell National Building and the bank was moved to the old First National building which was recently torn down to make room for their new

In 1913, the Haskell State Bank which occupied the building, where the time was consolidated with the Haskell National.

The men who piloted the Haskell National Bank in the beginning of its history as officers and directors did their work well and the institution today stands as a monument to their business ability. Some of these men have passed on to the great beyond, while others are still living, and useful citizens in Haskell County today. Others have moved away, and are living elsewhere. Among the names of the officers and directors found in the minute books used in the early '90's are: M. S. Pierson, H. G. McConnell, A. C. Foster, S. H. Johnson, J. L. Jones, N. S.
