District Directors DiscussTax Suits On Old Accounts

There was a discussion on filing suits to clear up old back taxes, some that have been on the rolls for several years, at the meeting of the board of directors of the Briscoe County Tax Appraisal District at 9:00 a.m. June 11.

Attending were Directors L. B. Garvin, jr., Joe Mercer and Robert McPherson, in addition to the Chief Appraiser, Carlye Fleming.

Absent were Ray Teeple and Paul A. Ramsey.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Garvin and the minutes were read by McPherson.

Mrs. Fleming was instructed to ask lawyers about the tax suits and to get something in writing from them. The financial report was presented by Mrs. Fleming, who stated that she has discussed with First State Bank officials about the possibility of putting the appraisal district funds into a NOW account.

The motion was made and carried that the funds be placed in a NOW account at the bank.

The 1986 current collections through the month of May included Briscoe County, 95.4%; Silverton I.S.D., 96.1%; City of Silverton, 94.5%; City of Quitaque, 89.4%; Mackenzie Water Authority, 94.6%.

Mrs. Fleming presented the proposed 1988 Appraisal District Budget in the amount of \$65,000, which is the same as the 1987 budget. It was discussed in detail by members.

Following the discussion, the motion passed to set the budget hearing for the taxing entities at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, July 9.

Mrs. Fleming stated that she would send letters to each of the taxing entities concerning the date of the budget hearing and will see that appropriate notices are posted.

It was reported that the Appraisal Review Board would hear taxpayer protests on Wednesday, July 8.

Following examination of the current month's bills, the motion carried to pay all bills presented at the meeting.
