Pair Of Rodeo Queens Named

Carrie Ann Grabbe, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Grabbe, was presented as the senior Rodeo Queen at the rodeo Saturday night. She received this honor for selling the most rodeo tickets, and the sponsoring organization, the Briscoe County Activities Association, appreciates her assistance.

First runner-up was Penni Fogerson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stan Fogerson. The other candidates were Keeley and Kim Burson and Julie Towe.

Christa Tucker was presented as the junior Rodeo Queen. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Garner Garrison, and received the honor for taking the most donations to the saddle project.

First runner-up was Christina Stephens, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Stephens.

The other candidates were Carrie Baird, Kimmie Blazier and Staci Hill.

Even though the Silvertown Owls don't have much of that, head coach Jack Shely thinks they'll have the size and strength to overcome it.

"It's kind of deceiving," Shely said. "As far as blazing speed, we don't have any. Neal Edwards is the fastest kid we've got. We'll have four or five that'll run right about 5.0 or under in the 40-yard dash. They're pretty quick for good-sized kids. But real, real quick people are going to give us some problems. Hopefully we can overcome it with our strength."

The Owls will bring their strength and size to bear on the District 1-A field where they tied for fourth in 1986. Silvertown was 5-4-1 on the year, including a 4-3-1 effort in league play.

Three of the 16 players on Shely's roster weigh in at 200 pounds or more, and eight weigh 165 or more. Shely hopes that Edwards can provide enough speed to go along with all that size.

"I won't say he is the best back coming back in the district, but he's certainly one of the best," Shely said of Edwards. "He's worked hard in our off-season program."

Edwards rushed for 1,333 yards and 14 touchdowns in nine games last season, and Shely expects to find a little relief for the 5-11, 145-pounder.

Ryan Smith and sophomore Kendall Minyard will battle for the quarterback position, and Clay Schott also returns at running back. Freshmen Bradley Brunson and Wayne Henderson are also expected to contribute.

The Owls open their regular schedule at Higgins on September 4, and will open their home season with Lefors on September 11. After that, the rest of the schedule will have only district games, with Amherst, Smyer, New Home, Whitharral, Texline, Three Way, Southland and Cotton Center.

Making up the Owl roster are Ryan Smith and Kendall Minyard, quarterbacks; Clay Schott, Neal Edwards, Bradley Brunson and Wayne Henderson, backs; Robbie McWaters, Jamie Frizzell, Bryan Ramsey, Frank Lowrey, Denny Hill, Fidencio Reyes, Ricky Clardy, ends; Brad West, Jon Pigg and Robby Weak, centers.

Complete Surrender of Nazis Is Expected Momentarily

HITLER HAS COMMITTED SUICIDE! MUSSOLINI HAS BEEN EXECUTED! ALL GERMAN ARMIES IN ITALY HAVE SURRENDERED UNCONDITIONALLY! BERLIN HAS FALLEN TO THE RED ARMY TROOPS

These are a few of the world shaking events of the past few days that are leading to the unconditional surrender of all German armies to the plunging American and Allied troops. Rumors have spread premature surrender news already several times, but when that news is official it will be announced by radio to the American people by President Truman.

Hitler, German SS leader, declared Saturday that Hitler was dead or dying and that he was in complete control of German politics. He offered to surrender to the United States and Britain. His offer was immediately rejected because it did not mention Soviet Russia. Tuesday when Hitler's death inside say the Russians was announced officially, Admiral Kert Donitz became the German leader. He announced that the German would resist until death. His appeal met with no success. He was not listening to the German soldiers and generals and they are surrendering unconditionally. Twenty-eight German divisions over one million men every front are surrendering unconditionally. Twenty-eight German divisions are in the Italian Theatre. Allied armies on every front are meeting very little organized resistance and it is only a matter of days until the war is complete, with or without armistice.
