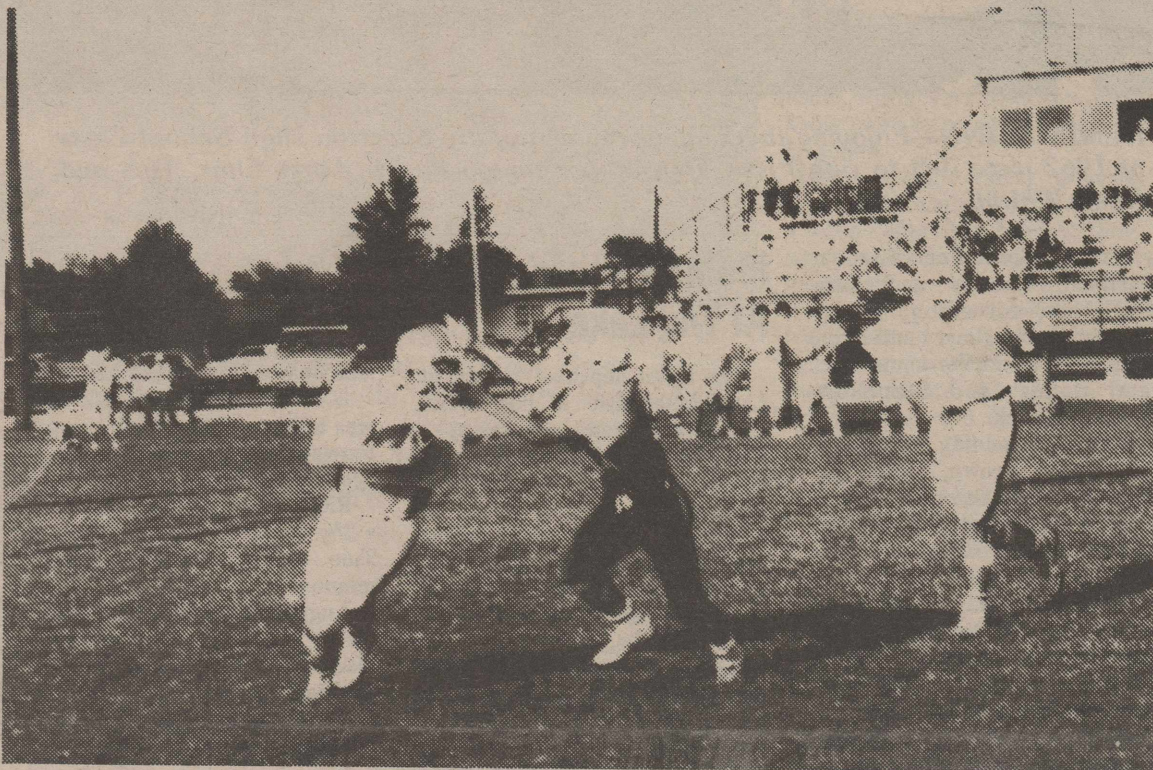

## Owls Travel To Higgins Friday Night

The varsity Owls will travel to Higgins to take on the Coyotes Friday night at 7:30. It is about a 3½ hour drive to Higgins, and school will be dismissed at 1:30 p.m. so that all who wish will have time to drive to the game.

The 1986 season wasn't a particularly enjoyable experience for Higgins, but it was profitable for the team. A year ago, they had no seniors and only one junior; the rest were freshmen and sophomores. The Coyotes finished the season 4-5, but every player who started last season is back this year, and Coach Larry Neighbors believes Higgins can make a run at the District 2-A six-man championship.

Coach Jack Shely and the Owls are hoping to make a run at the District 1-A championship this year, and if the showing of the Owls in their scrimmage against Miami here last Friday was any indication, the season will be an exciting one. The Owls have been picked to finish second in their district, but a lot of games are to be played between now and then, and the Owls will have a say about the final outcome. New Home was picked first in the district, with Whitharral rated as the third-place team, followed by Three Way, Southland, Amherst,

Texline, Smyer and Cotton Center.

Miami was picked to finish fifth in their district behind Vernon Northside, Harrold, Higgins and Guthrie, and the Warriors were beaten pretty badly by the Owls in scrimmage.

The non-conference game Friday night promises to be an exciting one, and even though it's a long drive, fans are needed to pack the stands to encourage the Owls.

## August Rainfall Exceeds Normal

August rainfall exceeded the month's normal by over an inch, and the 1987 rainfall total now stands at 20.92 inches, almost equaling the 45-year annual average of 21.22 inches.

Rainfall during August, as

recorded by Fred Strange, was 3.70 inches, and the August normal figure is 2.64 inches. Normal moisture at this time of the year totals 15.59 inches, 5.33 inches less than has fallen in 1987.

At this time, farmers are finished with watering their corn and probably won't be wanting much more rain on their cotton. There is some cotton that is late because of the June hail and there is some grain sorghum that is late because of being planted after the hail, and these crops likely will need some more water.

Right now, it looks like a late freeze would be just what the farmers need, and if the weather will cooperate the harvest could be better than expected following earlier severe storms.

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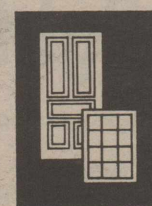

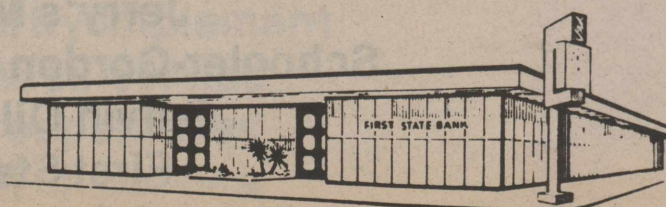
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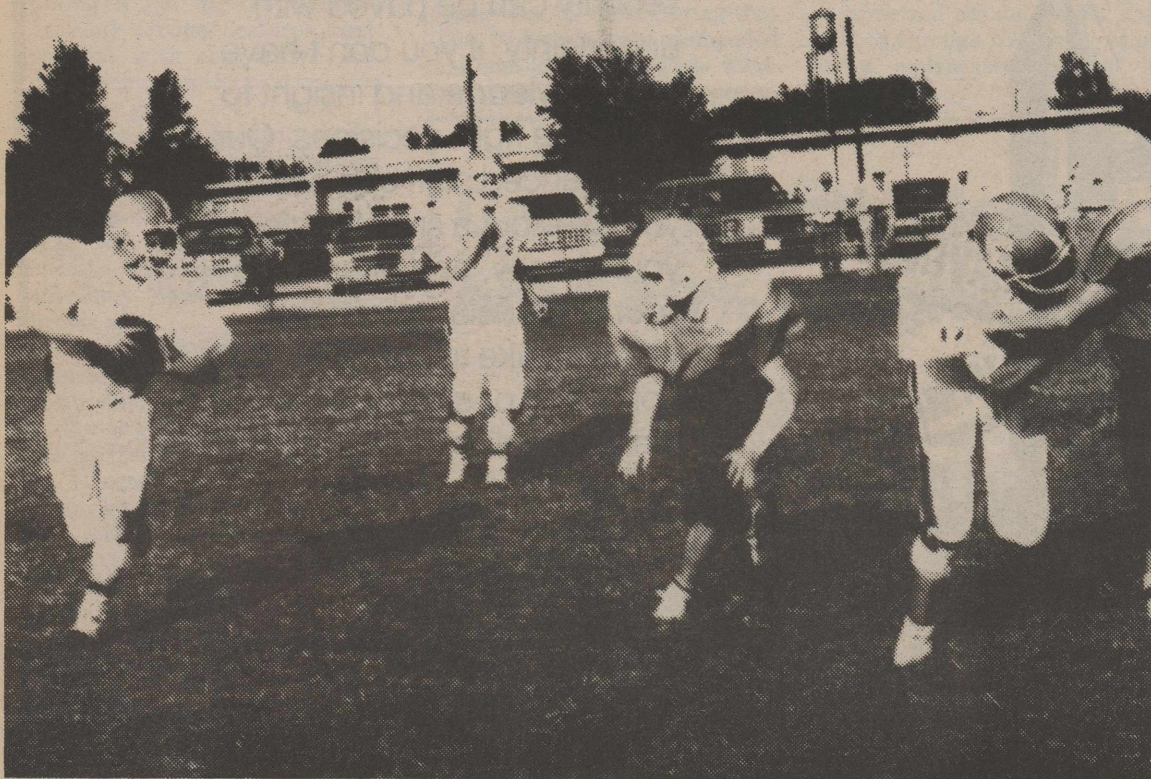




Neal Edwards carrying the ball for the Owls, with Kendall Minyard out front as a blocker against Miami.

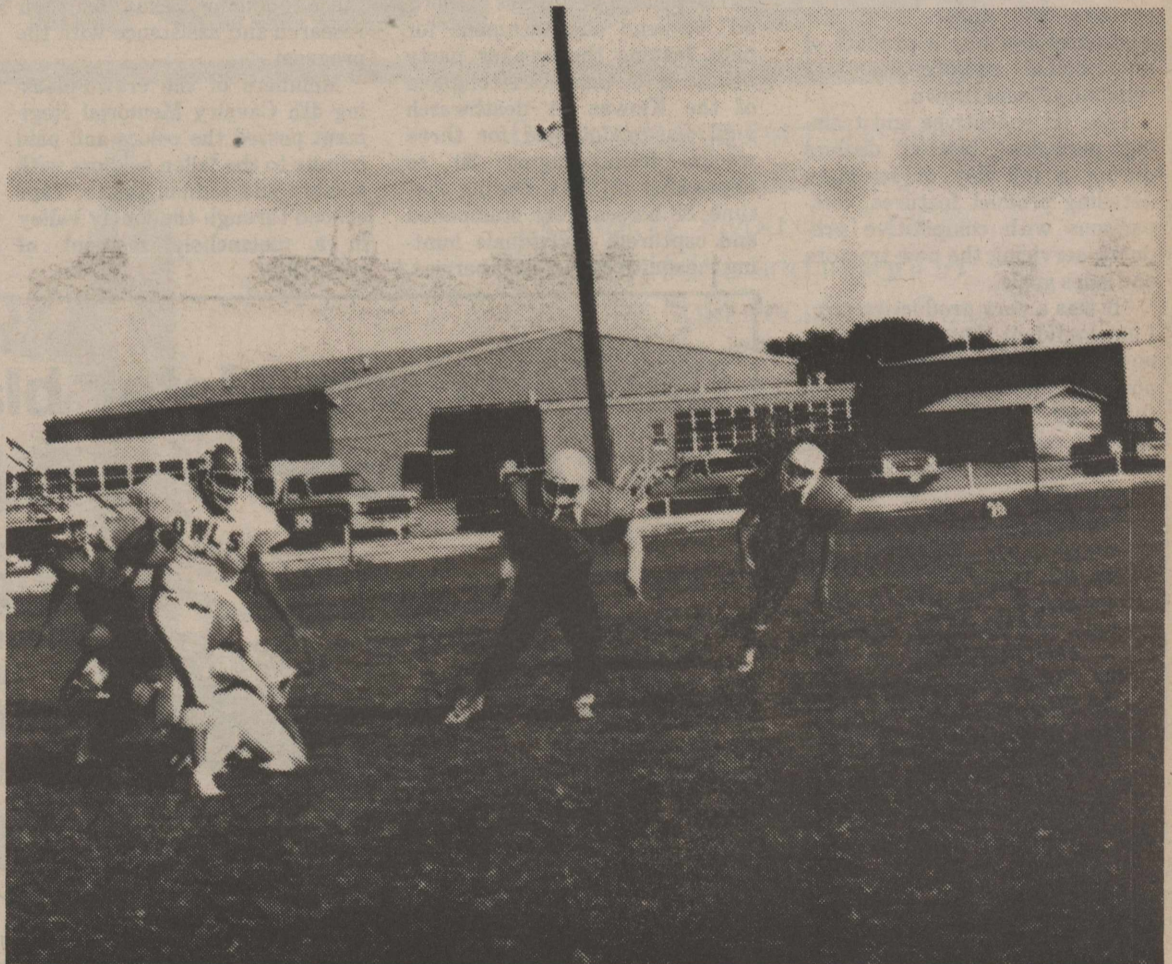

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## Marker Dedication Draws A Large, Enthusiastic Crowd

Lining the roadway of FM 1065, an estimated crowd of 500 history buffs attended the dedication of twin historical markers, "Camp Resolution" and "Masons

on the Texan-Santa Fe Expedition," in a remote location near Quitaque on Sunday, August 30.

One hundred and forty-six years ago on that date, the Texan-Santa Fe Expedition camped near the confluence of the Quitaque and Los Lingos Creeks. Nearby a small reconnaissance party was attacked by 100 or more Kiowas. Though the 16-shot Colt repeating rifle evened the odds, the five volunteer soldiers were overrun and killed. Lt. Hull was bleeding from thirty lance and arrow wounds. William Mabee's head was smashed by his own rifle, his brains scattered over the ground, and his heart cut out. All were scalped and mutilated.

Surrounded by hostile Kiowas, near starvation, and unable to find a wagon road onto the Llano Estacado to continue their trade journey to Santa Fe, the volunteer soldiers and merchants confronted their dismal prospects. They must either retreat to Austin by the torturous route just completed or split the command, inviting further disaster, and seek help in the New Mexican settlements.

The council of officers "resolved" to send a detachment for help, leaving the weaker party behind in the Caprock stronghold of the Kiowas. A deathwatch vigil was maintained for three weeks, from August 30 to September 18, 1841. During that time, 83 horses were stampeded and captured. Individuals hunting mesquite beans, hackberries,

or game were picked off or just never returned to camp. The "rescue" party arrived with guides and provisions, but only to lead them to further trials and tribulations ending in capture, a forced march of 2,000 miles to Mexico City, and imprisonment.

Four campsites along the Quitaque were thereafter referred to as "Camp Resolution." A joint effort of the Floyd County Historical Commission, the Grand Lodge of Texas, and the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, the dedication featured Curtis Tunnell, Executive Director of the Texas Historical Commission in Austin, as guest speaker.

Jack Kelly, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Texas, gave a stirring speech and unveiled the Masonic marker honoring members of the expedition who were Masons.

Nancy Marble, chairman of the Floyd County Historical Commission, unveiled the Texas State Historical marker and expressed appreciation to Bill Gray, Past Master of Floydada Lodge #721, and Marisue Potts, District X Representative of Daughters of the Republic of Texas, for their research and assistance with the program.

Members of the crowd-pleasing 4th Cavalry Memorial Regiment posted the colors and paid tribute to the fallen soldiers with a sabre and cannon salute. Taps echoed through the lonely valley in a melancholy moment of reflection.

Over 200 attended the reception in the Community Room of the First National Bank of Quitaque. On display were the historical paintings of Otho Stubbs, leatherart of Bill Gray, sculptures of Buster Jones, historical maps by Harvey Fletcher, and Quannah Parker books by Bill Neeley.

With the weather cooperating, the ceremony far exceeded the hopes of its planners, being graciously described by Curtis Tunnell, a veteran of many such occasions, as "one of the best and best attended marker dedications, anywhere in the state of Texas."

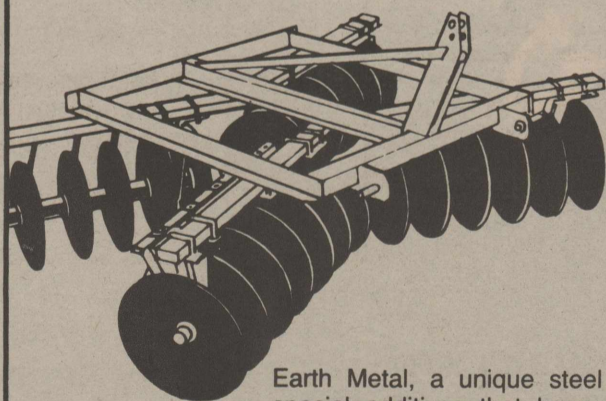

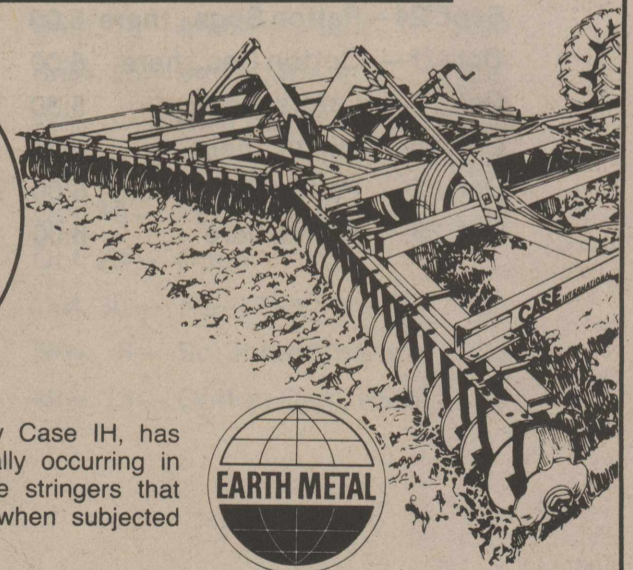

## Labor Day Signals End Of Summer

The Labor Day weekend is a sure sign of things to come. Among them is the fact that another summer is about to pass. It also represents the last three-day weekend before cooler weather sets in for many Texans, which has both local and state public safety officials concerned.

## Field Day Planned At TAEX Research Facility at Halfway

Research which can help Briscoe County farmers reduce fertilizer costs and make more effective use through application methods, as well as the latest scientific information on crop production and the control of weeds, will be featured during the 78th annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock/Halfway on September 8, County Extension Agent Lynda Fogerson reports.

The TAEX/High Plains Research Facility at Halfway, 14 miles west of Plainview on U. S. Hwy. 70, is host this year. The annual program alternates between the Lubbock center and its Halfway site, she explained. Tours will begin at 1:00 p.m. and conclude at 5:00 p.m.

Five major displays are planned on the motorized tours of the research plots and facilities. Doug Nesmith, research associate in soil fertility and field day chairman, said these will feature reports and demonstrations on types of cotton developed for new farming systems, effects of climate and soil types on grapes, effects of conservation tillage cropping systems on crop yields and weed control, adaption of chemigation to center pivots, and the amounts and methods of fertilizer application for maximum benefits.

The Texas Forest Service will present red oak trees to 250 landowners who take the field tours.

Other features of the field day include displays of equipment, farm supplies and information booths.

The field day is a cooperative presentation of TAEX, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the High Plains Research Foundation, Texas Forest Service and the U. S. Department of Agricul-

ture - Agricultural Research Service.

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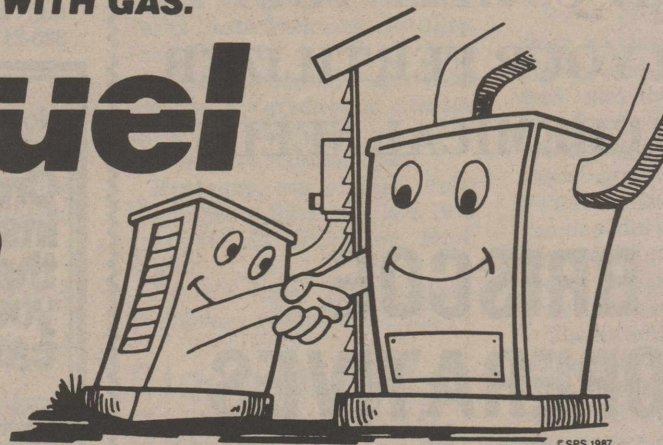
