He can be trusted to do the right thing when the self-styled wise are attempting to endanger the welfare of our country.

They say he hasn't the proper vision for a greater county and state, or in other words, that the farmer is ignorant of his interests. If this be ignorance or lack of proper vision, make the most of it, and, if we have another bond election, give us more, more of such vision or ignorance.

The farmer has the stamp of approval placed upon him. God in his act of creation created man and woman and placed them in the Garden of Eden—farmers. This is the only class of human beings of which we have any record, that he created.

All other classes are parasites. A parasite is the fellow who makes expenses for the farmer to pay.

This county is strictly a farming county. All are dependent upon the farmer and when he falls all fall.

We are for the welfare of the farmer first, last and all the time.

We were reared on the farm and are proud of it, and we still have a kindly feeling for the farmer.

Let us have good roads but have them in a way that the user of them pays for them according to the use he makes of them. It is not fair to make the farmer pay for them when almost every other class of people use them more than he does.

The requirement should be that each person pay for the building and maintenance of the roads according to the use he makes of them. It will only be a few years until this will be done in Texas and no one's property will be encumbered by bonds.

Bonds means bondage for the people bonded. If one class be bonded, all should be bonded. It is not fair or just to bond the farmer's land—create a lien upon it—and let the merchant's stock of goods go without a lien on it.

The merchant, if he desires can sell or move his stock of goods and there is no lien on it with which to pay the bonds.

The boll weevil, the leaf worm, the grasshopper, the green bug, the boll worm and other hordes of insects and parasites are working day and night to set his best efforts at naught, and each of these pests presents a distinct problem.

In this warfare, as in warfare among human beings, science must be brought into action in order to secure the desired results. Without scientific aid in fighting the pests which menace the farmer's crops, it is asserted by high authorities that in time human life would become extinct. The insects and parasites would completely overrun the earth.

It is some comfort to know then that under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture, earnest scientists are working diligently to find better means of controlling these pests, and are meet-

The district embraces a line of ten counties in the north panhandle region of Texas. Fifty towns of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, and New Mexico have been invited to send delegates, and at least 300 are expected.

**Spearman**—Tax-paying voters of Spearman have instructed their city council to invest the sum of \$80,000 in public improvements. This amount will be divided as follows: \$50,000 for a sewer system; \$10,000 for a new city hall; and \$20,000 for paying some city indebtedness.

**Abilene**—The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is protesting designation of the "Llano Estacado" of northwest Texas and eastern New Mexico as a "very dry and almost woodless plateau" such as was given recently by a national periodical. The organization has compiled figures which show that this area is one of the richest farming sections of the entire nation and is offering widespread refutation of the article.

**San Saba**—Everything is in readiness for entertainment of delegates from the pecan-belted Hills Country District of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce here on September 22. Many prominent speakers are on the program and a special sheep and goat raisers meeting has been arranged to be held in connection with the regular convention.

**Paducah**—Cottle County will have a two day free fair here October 4 and 5. A series of good will trips covering 23 communities of the trade territory are being made by the chamber of commerce, accompanied by the chamber of commerce band. The fair management is strongly favoring organized community exhibits rather than individual exhibits. The Cottle County Division of the Green Belt Poultry Association will hold their show in connection with the exhibition.

**Carlsbad, N. M.**—Guests at the Crowford Hotel here are entertained in a new 30-room addition to the hostelry, these rooms being arranged with new modern furnishings.

**Lockney**—Work on the \$30,000 municipal water extension to industrial Lockney is finished and the water has been turned into the mains. With the present system, the city is enabled to furnish water to the residential consumer at 10 cents per thousand gallons, and to the industrial consumer at 8 cents per thousand, with a minimum charge of one dollar per month.

**Winters**—The annual meeting of the Winters Chamber of Commerce will be held September 19. The gathering will be a "home" affair but will be outstanding for the reason of a greatly increased outline of activity and educational campaign.

**Wichita Falls**—Stimulus to the industrial and commercial life of Wichita Falls has been added greatly with the

announcement that the world's largest poultry ranch and a large show factory are to be established here. M. Johnson of Bowie plans to have a mammoth chicken plant in operation here by January 1, 1928. The Kraft Cheese Company, a national concern, will build a branch factory here that will produce products for national consumption.

**Diinmitt**—Unpresented building activities are underway here. Among the work is construction of a new school auditorium, costing more than \$3,000. Several business houses are included in the building program. Work is progressing rapidly on the Fort Worth and Denver terminal here.

**Lampasas**—Ranchmen have begun fall shearing in this section. The fleece is said to be heavy and the clip unusually fine. The fall clip is expected to be the largest in the history of the county.

**Muleshoe**—Construction has been started on a 25x80 foot brick and tile business house here. The work is expected to be completed within thirty days.

**Hereford**—Natural gas is to be piped into Hereford not later than December 1, 1928, according to contract signed with the West Texas Gas Company. A twenty year franchise was granted to them by the city commission.

**Quitaque**—A city hall, and a jail are to be erected here at a cost of \$4,500. The building will be 20x40 feet, fire-proof, and of reinforced concrete.

**Channing**—Mrs. Hubert Bishop has been placed on the staff of the Hartley County News, following the resignation of Alvin Daves, who has returned to college for the winter term.

**Claude**—Contract has been entered into which will give Claude natural gas by November 1. The rate agreed on is 75 cents per thousand cubic feet, less ten per cent if the bill is paid by the tenth of the month, and plus \$1 a month service charge.

**FLIGHT PRECAUTIONS**  
Col. Charles A. Lindbergh has given to the Associated Press, in response to its request, the following statement in connection with recent developments in transoceanic flying:  
"Transoceanic flights which have been accomplished demonstrate the feasibility of air transportation between continents. The trend of future development should be toward making such transportation practical under all conditions. The pioneering is over, but the perfecting is yet to be done."  
**Needs Years of Research.**  
"Regular transoceanic travel is no more practical today than transcontinental air lines were a decade and a half ago. Years of development and scientific research will be required before such regular transcontinental service can successfully be inaugurated. During this experimental period we may expect casualties; yet totally to restrict hazardous flights would be placing a ban on scientific progress. Such restriction would have the same effect on the future of transoceanic flying as the air mail would have experienced had it been abandoned by the Government during the heavy casualty period of its pioneering days."  
"The result of total restriction might be compared with the effect on aviation in general had legislation been enacted against all flying during the first few years following the flight of the Wright brothers, when, hour for hour, any flight was more dangerous than transoceanic flying is at present."  
**Precautions Urged.**  
"The pioneering and development of

almost every advance in the air is marked by loss of its explorers or its scientists; yet they would be the last to request that advancement of the cause for which they gave their lives be retarded.  
"Hazardous flights should not be prohibited, but they should be attempted only after careful study by experienced flyers, with the best of modern equipment and for a definite purpose. In the future expeditions should be organized and prizes offered under conditions promoting development of safer travel."  
"Safety of air travel does not rest

alone on the perfection of plane and engine, but equally important is a highly trained personnel, accurate weather information and other navigational aids, including means for radio communication in case of forced landing."
