Highlight of the evening was the Gold Star awards presentation made by County Judge Jimmy Ross to two top county 4-H members. Celeste Sperry and Penni Fogerson received a plaque and a Gold Star pin as the 1987 winners. They will be honored at the District Gold Star Banquet November 23 in Lubbock.

Gloria Dulin, representing Swisher Electric Cooperative, presented the Silver Spur award for outstanding leadership to Bill and Janinne Brooks, Silverton club leaders. Lighthouse Electric Cooperative of Floydada and Swisher Electric Cooperative of Tulia annually sponsor this award.

Briscoe County Activities Association received the Friend of 4-H Award for allowing 4-H to use the arena and Show Barn facilities for many 4-H events.

Jackie Mercer, secretary of the organization, accepted the award.

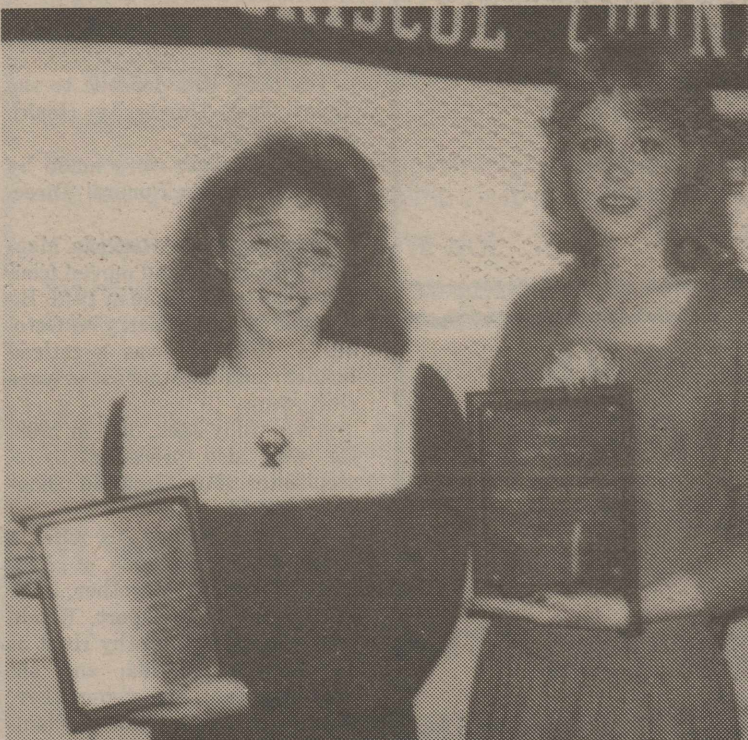

## Income Survey To Be Taken Of City Residents

The City of Silverton plans to conduct an income survey in the next few weeks in order to apply for community development funds from the Texas Department of Community Affairs. The purpose of the funds is to help small communities such as Silverton to obtain monies for public facilities. The city is considering water system and fire protection improvements if successful in their application and survey.

In order to be eligible for grant funds, at least 51 percent of Silverton residents must be below the U. S. Housing and Urban Development income limits. For Briscoe County, the family income limits are: \$10,250 (one person), \$11,700 (two per-

sons), \$13,200 (three persons), \$14,650 (four persons), \$15,550 (five persons), \$16,500 (six persons), \$17,400 (seven persons), and \$18,300 (eight persons).

The city is aware that many family incomes have decreased due to the depressed agricultural economy over the past year. Without the help of grant funds, it would be very difficult for the city residents to financially support the needed improvements for water system and fire protection.

Please provide your support to the volunteer, Mrs. Sybil Martin, who will be conducting this door-to-door survey. All information obtained will be reported to the Texas Department of Community Affairs by house numbers and will remain confidential.

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# Varsity Owls Earn Big 46-0 Victory

The Owls entertained a large homecoming crowd by 45-ing the Texline Tornadoes with 6:54 remaining in the third quarter. This came on the heels of an injury to one of the Texline players, who apparently received a broken leg on a pass play and was removed from the field by ambulance.

Silverton kicked off to open the game, and gave Texline a first down by roughing the punter. The possession ended when the Owls recovered a fumble, and began action deep in their own end of the field. On first down, Texline intercepted a Silverton pass on the 13, and made a first down on the six by virtue of a penalty against the

Owls. The ball went over on downs on the Silverton one with 5:52 remaining to be played in the first quarter, and this was the only time during the game that Texline got a close look at Silverton's end zone.

The Owls went to work, making a first down on a run by Neal Edwards to the 23, and Edwards ran for another first down at midfield. Kendal Minyard passed complete to Jamie Frizzell and the play carried to the Texline 22. Edwards scored on the next play with 3:38 still to be played in the quarter, Ryan Smith kicked the extra points, and the Owls held an 8-0 lead.

After the Owls kicked off to Texline, the Tornadoes were held to no gain but the Owls gave them a first down on a penalty. Good defense by the Owls held them at their own 16, from where they punted and killed the ball on the Silverton 31.

On first down, Brad Brunson ran for a touchdown with seven seconds remaining in the first period. Smith kicked the extra points, and the Owls led 16-0.

As the second quarter opened, Texline was flagged twice for

passes thrown past the line of scrimmage, and Edwards carried their fourth-down punt back to the Texline 23. Brunson carried to the 10, and the Owls moved to a first down on the five on a run by Clay Schott who carried the touchdown with 8:49 remaining to be played in the first half. Smith kicked the PAT, and the Owls led 24-0.

The Owls held Texline to no gain on their next series, and on first down after taking the Tornadoes' punt, Minyard passed to Frizzell complete for the touchdown with 6:57 remaining in the second quarter. Smith kicked the PAT, and the Owls led 32-0.

Again the Owls held Texline to very little gain, and the punt rolled dead at the Silverton 13. Brunson picked up a first down on the 31 and Wayne Henderson made another. Ricky Clardy went to the Texline 21, and Henderson picked up another first down at the 13. Brunson carried for a short gain, and Henderson ran the ball down to the one, from where Brunson scored on the next play with 1:40 remaining to be played in the first half. There was no PAT, and the score stood at 38-0.

Texline made a first down on a completed pass after the kickoff, but the Owls shut down their offense, and on fourth down Henderson carried the punt back to the Texline 34. Brunson and Henderson, both freshmen, each carried the ball before the first half ended.

The third quarter began where the second had left off, with Brunson and Henderson doing the leg work for the Owls, but on fourth down the team punted to the Texline three. The Tornadoes passed complete on third down, and this was the play on which Texline's player received the leg injury. The ball went over to the Owls on the Texline eight.

Henderson took the handoff on first down and ran down to about a foot outside the goal line. Smith passed complete to Frank Lowrey for the touchdown, kicked the extra point, and the game ended with the Owls on the long end of the 46-0 score.

Friday the Owls have an open date, and the team will be traveling to Three Way the following Friday. All of the games remaining are key ones for the Owls, because if they win the rest of them they will go into the playoffs as the runner-up team. If they lose, basketball season begins.

New Home (5-0) is leading the District 1-A pack, followed by Silverton (4-1), Southland (3-1), Three Way (3-2), Whitharral (2-2), Amherst (2-3), Cotton Center (1-3), Texline (1-4) and Smyer (0-5).

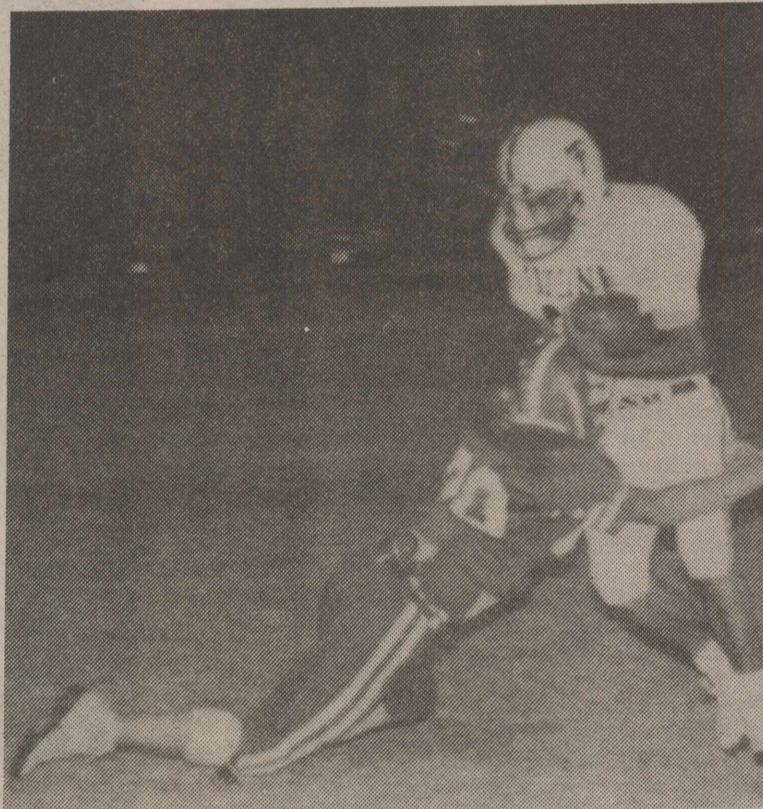
Silverton has scored the second most points this season, trailing New Home 280-273, but has allowed the fewest points in the district at 85. New Home is second, having given up 127 points so far.

The Owls also continue to lead in the Six Man Football Area with the least number of yards allowed its opponents. As of last week, the Owls had allowed 588 yards rushing and 416 passing, for a total of 1004 yards, just 167.3 yards per game. Lazbuddie was second with a 203.7 yard per game average, followed by New Home who has allowed 226.2 yards per game. Since the Owls

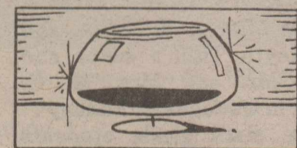
Wayne Henderson, one of Silverton's freshman Owls, was pictured as he threw the Texline ballcarrier for a loss in last Friday night's game.

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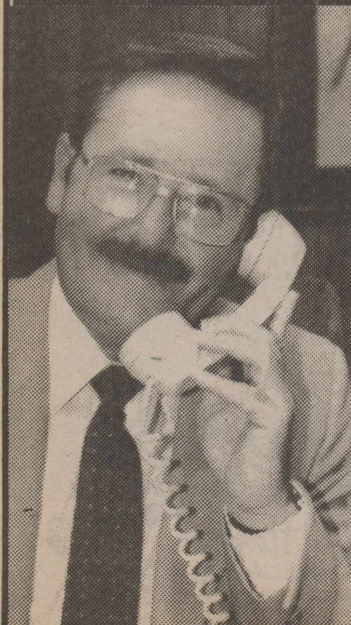
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# Junior High Is At Home Today

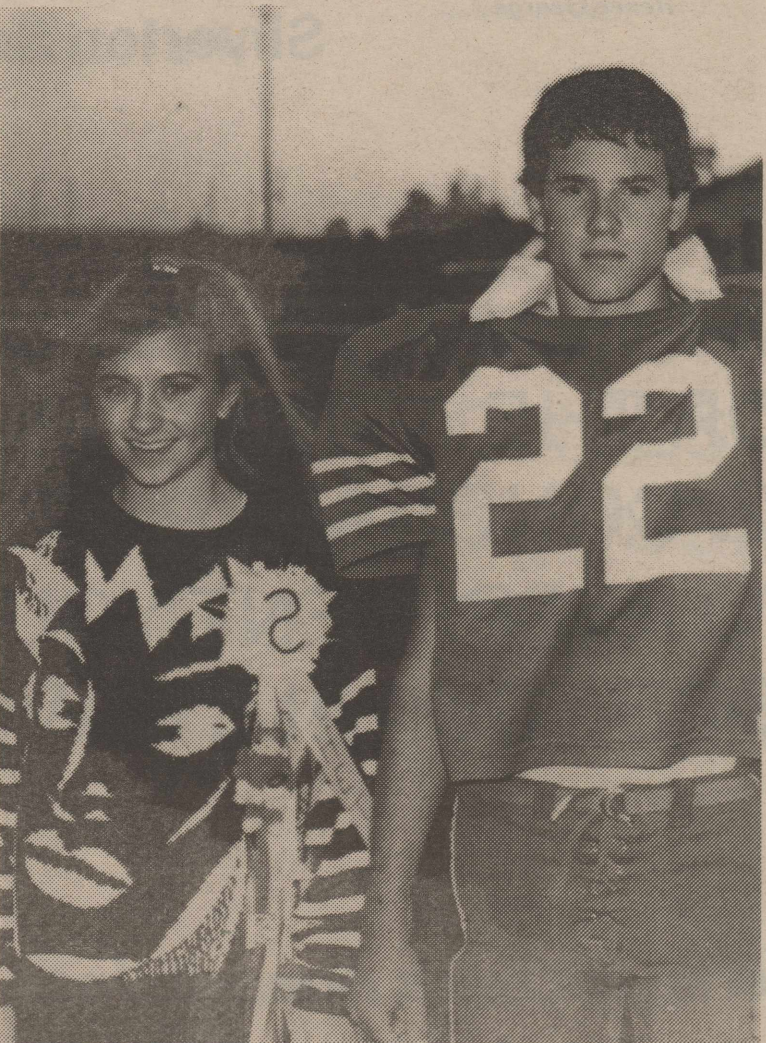
"We will suit up 13 for this scrimmage. We lost two to grades last six weeks grading period," Coach Childs said.

**Compulsory Hunter Education To Be Implemented in 1988**

The mandatory hunter education bill passed by the 70th Legislature, which authorized the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to require hunters of selected age groups to complete a hunter safety training class before hunting in Texas, will be implemented September 1, 1988. Equivalent courses taken by non-residents in other states will be recognized as being valid in Texas. The Texas course, now conducted by the TP&WD on a voluntary basis, already is recognized in other states that require non-resident hunters to complete a hunter safety course before being issued a hunting license.

The TP&WD is authorized to utilize volunteer instructors to minimize costs of the program and to charge a fee not to exceed \$15 to defray administrative costs. Fees collected will be deposited in the Game, Fish and Water Safety Fund (Fund 9). The department will determine qualifications for instructors and will recruit, train and certify them. It also may cooperate with educational institutions, local governments, individuals or organizations interested in hunter education and accept gifts, grants and donations to be used in administering the program.

Mrs. Pascal Garrison received word last week that Clovis Hill of Amarillo, formerly of Silverton, was in Mesa, Arizona helping his daughter move when he had a heart attack and had to undergo open heart surgery. 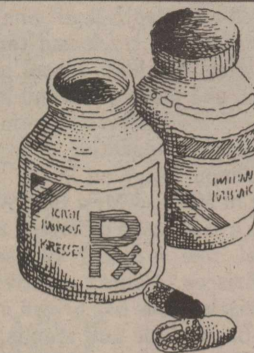
