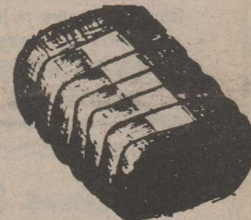
The food and nutrition project is the largest 4-H project in the county each year.

School Board Has Business Meeting

At the regular meeting of the board of trustees of the Silverton Independent School District held at 8:00 p.m. November 12, the discussion concerned the regular business items involving the Tax Assessor-Collector's report, business office report and the annual audit report.

Other business involved annual premiums for building insurance and the completion of the roof repair. Clark Roofing was hired to put a roof on the older part of the athletic building.

Special education policies were approved and the Texas Association of School Boards was hired to set up a policy manual for Silverton Schools. The policy manual will include all necessary state laws which pertain to education and should be ready for adoption early in 1988.

Sections I and III of Silverton's Annual Performance Report were approved. The report is available in the superintendent's office for anyone who wishes to read it.

The superintendent presented an update to the board on the Long Range Plan, the state

accreditation visit coming up this month and other pertinent issues that will affect the Silverton Schools in the near future.

One issue of special interest is concerned with educating the students and the community about AIDS. Before any policy is formulated concerning AIDS, the board believes that it is important for everyone in Silverton to have the facts. The present plan is to continue to send school personnel to workshops and to have a highly authoritative resource person to speak to the students and the community.

Other items of business, paying of bills, etc., were discussed before the meeting was adjourned.

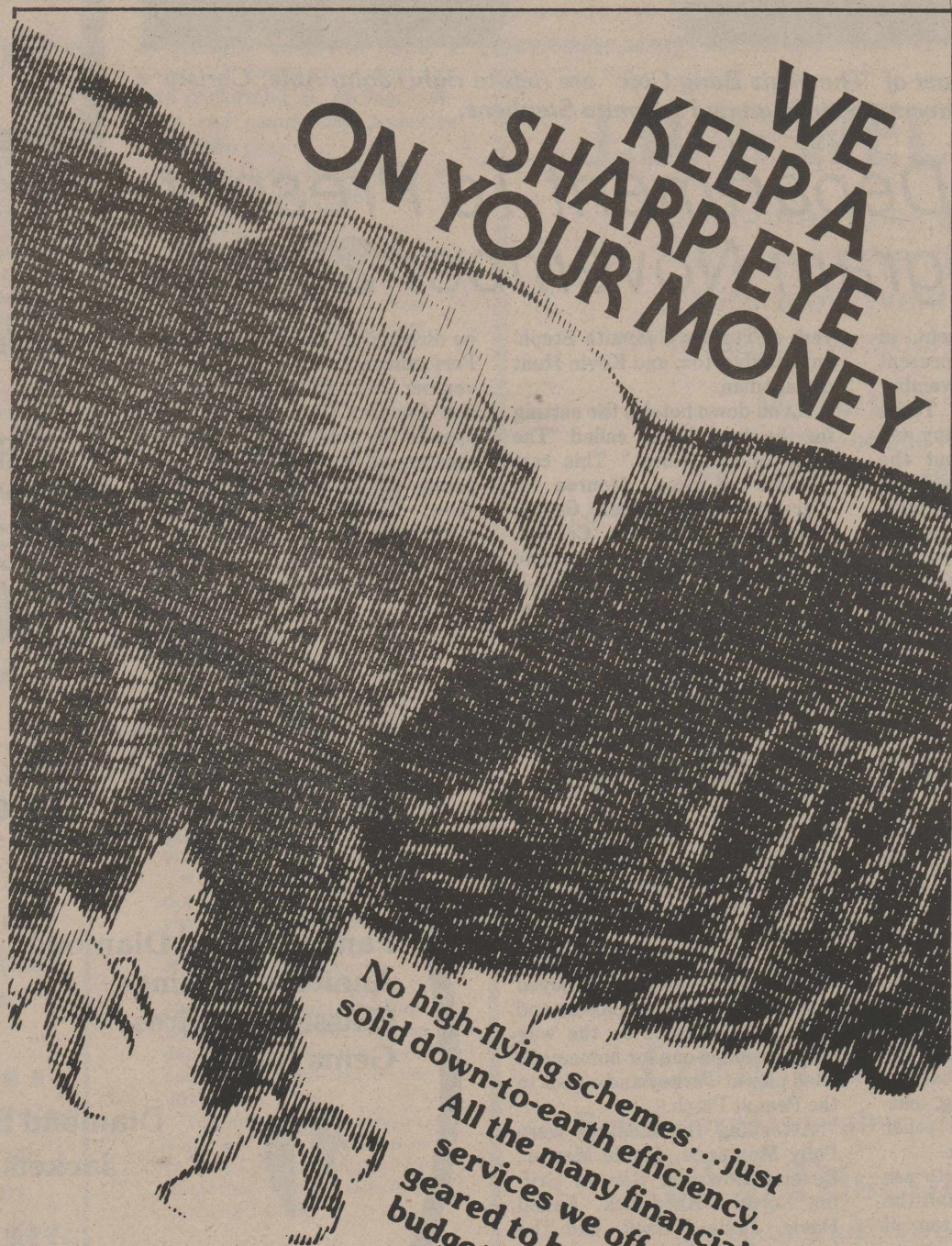

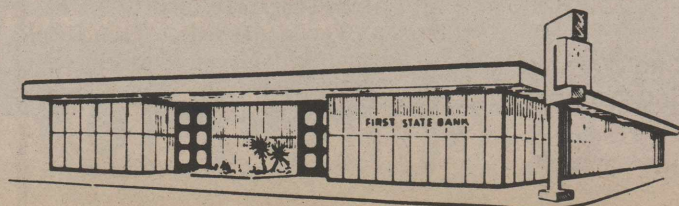

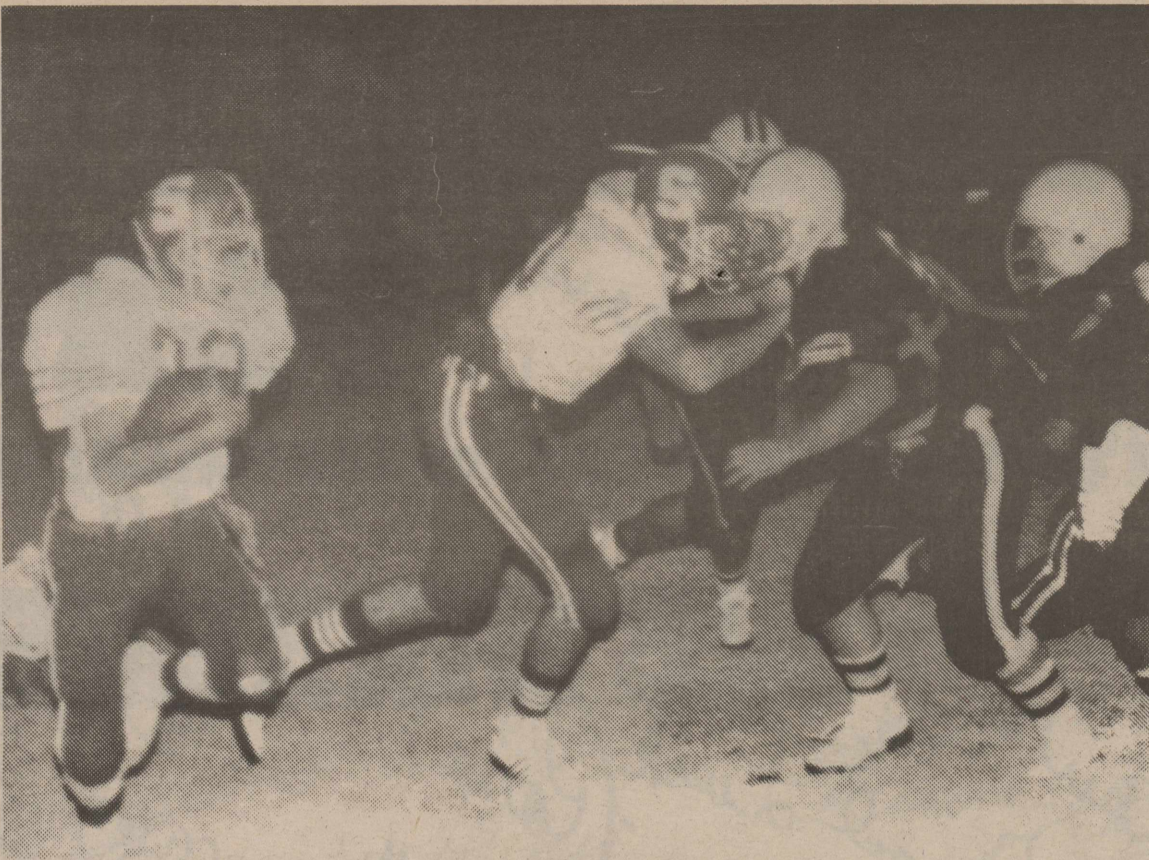

Owls Defeat Cotton Center In Last Regular-Season Game

Silverton's Owls earned a 36-8 victory over the Cotton Center Elks last Friday night, and will be in the state playoffs at Higgins this week.

Several of the players have picked up nagging injuries, but Coach Jack Shely expects all of them except Fidencio Reyes to be suited up for action at Higgins. All were able to play at Cotton Center except Reyes and Robbie McWaters, who made a touchdown he didn't get credit for in the write-up of the Southland game.

Silverton opened the game at Cotton Center by kicking off and holding the Elks to little gain. On fourth down, Neal Edwards intercepted a Cotton Center pass and ran about 60 yards for the first score of the game. Wayne Henderson kicked the extra points, and with 8:35 still remaining to be played in the first quarter, the Owls led 8-0.

The Owls held the Elks on their next series, and the ball went over on downs at the Cotton Center 38. Bradley Brunson carried to the 30, Clay Schott went to the 26, and Brunson went to the 23 for a first down.

Edwards carried to the 14, and on the next down the Owls received a penalty. Edwards gained four or five yards on the next play, and a pass completion from Kendal Minyard to Brunson was not enough for another first down and the ball went back to the Elks.

Cotton Center made a first down on the Silverton 35, but was forced to punt on the next fourth down. Brunson carried to the Silverton 29, Schott picked up a first down on the Cotton Center 18, and on the next play Minyard passed to Jamie Frizzell for another touchdown with 24 seconds remaining to be played in the first stanza. There was no PAT, and the Owls held a 14-0 lead.

With just 12 seconds remaining in the period, the Owls kicked off to the Elks who fumbled, and the ball was recovered by Henderson for the Owls. On first down, the Owls returned the favor and the Elks recovered on their own 12-yard line.

The Owls forced the Elks to punt again, and as the second quarter got underway, the Owls moved through two first downs

on runs by Edwards and saw the ball go over on downs with 4:31 remaining in the first half. The Elks fumbled on first down, and Schott recovered for the Owls on the Cotton Center 19. (The Elks left the ball lying on the ground quite a few times.)

This time the Owls moved in on a five-yard run by Brunson, a pass from Minyard to Edwards, and a run into the end zone by Edwards with 3:04 remaining in the second period. Henderson kicked the PAT, and the Owls held a 22-0 lead.

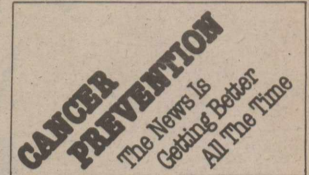

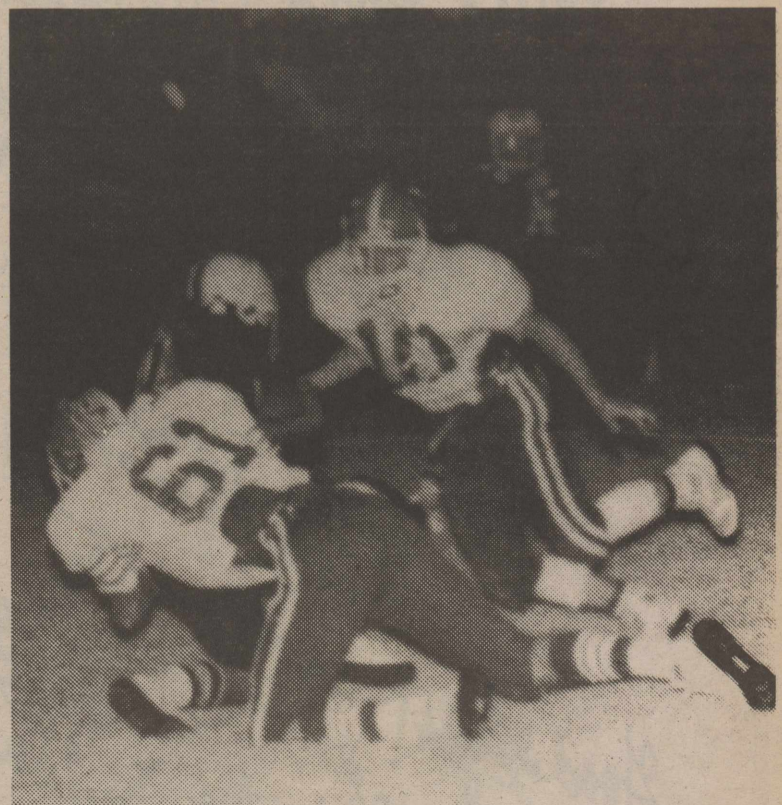

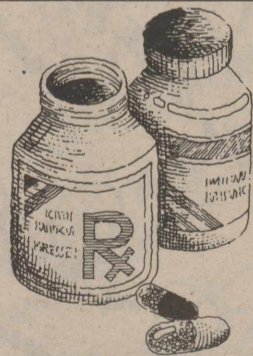

Sea dwelling cone snails are among the most deadly animals on earth. According to Ranger Rick magazine, these fish-eating snails have poison strong enough to kill a human!



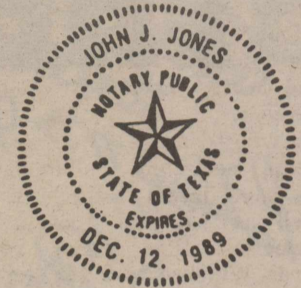

Windbreak Trees Being Ordered By SCS

Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District is taking orders for windbreak trees through March 1, 1988.

Several evergreen tree species and various hardwood trees and shrubs are available for purchase. Prices will vary from 50c to \$1.50 per bareroot tree, depending on species.

Windbreaks properly located and containing the right tree species will provide wind and snow protection for farm homesteads as well as livestock. One source stated that homestead windbreaks in the High Plains and Rolling Plains showed reduced heating costs as great as 15 percent.

Living windbreaks, or greenbelts, also provide nesting places for small insect-eating birds as well as food and cover for numerous High Plains game birds. Windbreaks for shelter or wildlife habitat are permitted under CRP contracts.

Advanced planning is very important for the successful establishment or renovation of shelterbelts. The installation of a drip irrigation system for wind-

break establishment is highly recommended. SCS employees want to help make your tree planting a success.

Technical assistance is available from the USDA Soil Conservation Service in planning and designing your windbreak, drip irrigation system, and windbreak management. Drip irrigation systems and information on installation is available through the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District.

A limited number of wildlife seeding packets for quail/pheasant, deer, turkey and squirrel are also available for farmstead plantings.

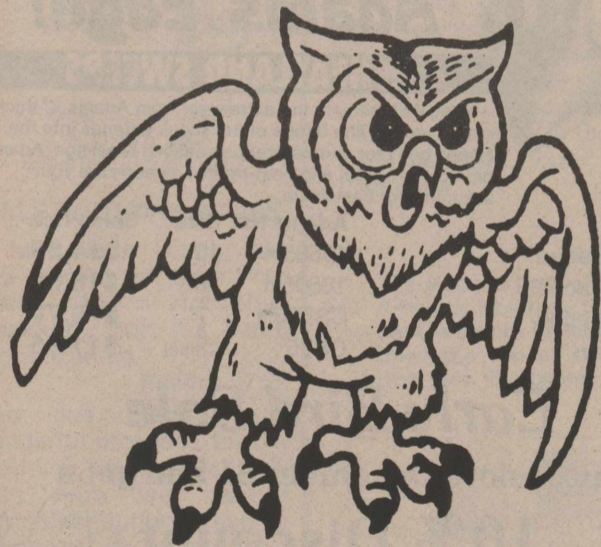
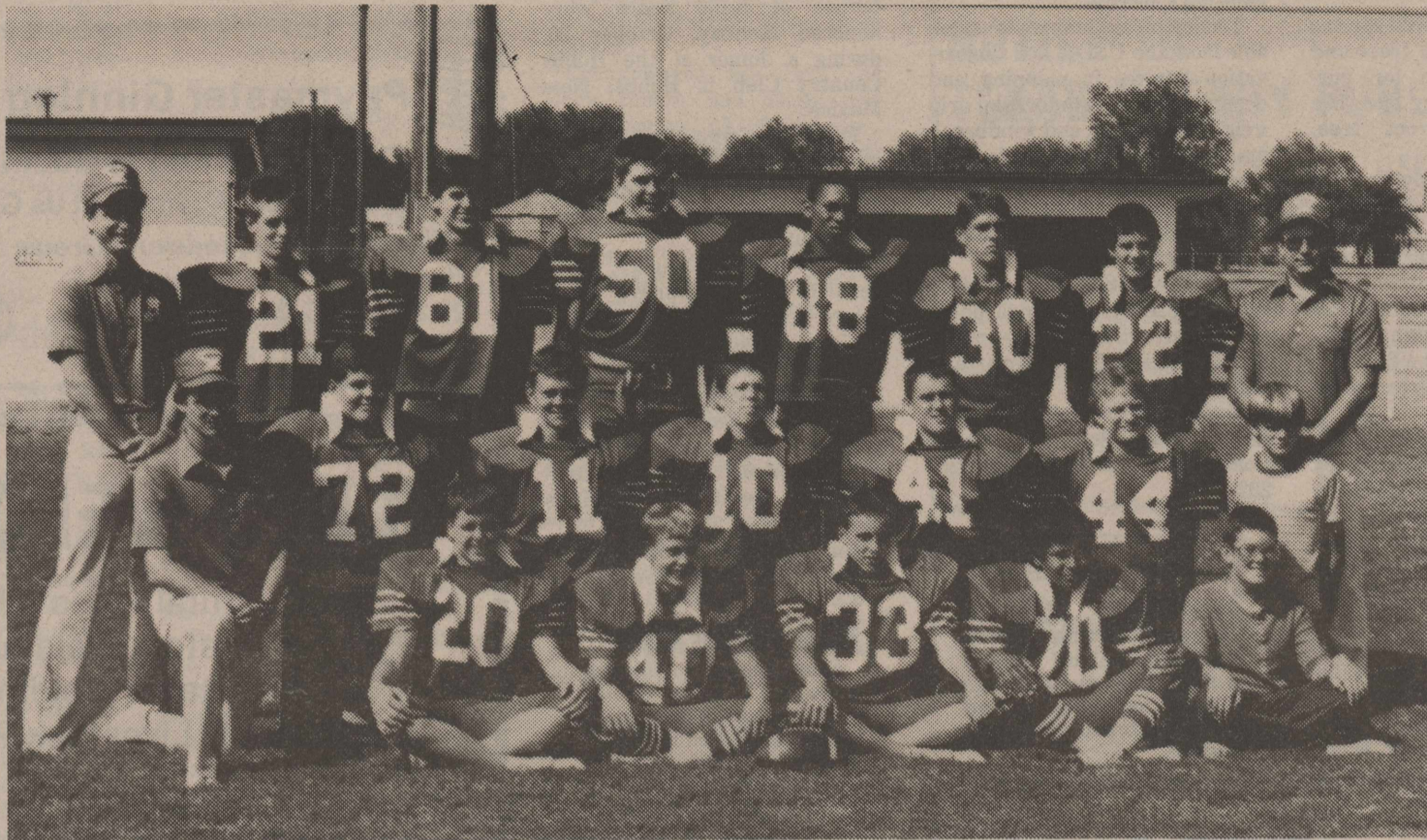
