## TAYLOR COUNTY VOTES MILLION FOR ROADS

Taylor county voted overwhelminly \$1,000,000 bond issue to complete its hard-surfacing program on cardinal highways and to criss-cross the county with lateral roads, Monday. The complete vote was 3948 for the bonds and one. Only four remote country boxes the two days. voted against the issue. The city of Abilene voted 2918 for the bonds and 106 against.

The county will spend \$700,000 as its share of concreting state highway No. 1, east and west: No. 30, north and south; and No. I-A. leading northeastward to a connection with Shackelford county's hardsurfaced system. The remaining \$300,000 will be spent on lateral roads.

The million dollars will supplement **PRICE** a bond issue of \$350,000 voted by the county in 1922. The concrete pavebond issue of \$350,000 voted by the ment on highway No. 1 east of Abilene to the Callahan county line is comp-

leted, and work is starting on a ten-mile county on highway No. 30. Grade and drainage structure contracts have been let on other stretches. Altogether 82 miles of federal and state designated

highway in the county will be paved with concrete.
