Runoffs Necessary In Briscoe County Commissioner Races

Almost 65% of Briscoe County voters went to the polls to cast their ballots in the Super Tuesday Democratic Primary, and in Commissioner's Precincts 1 and 3 the county races were close enough to force runoffs. The total voting Tuesday in Briscoe Coun-

ty was 900.

In Precinct 1, which is presently represented by Shafe Weaver who did not choose to seek re-election, Aaron Younger polled 52 votes followed by Alton (Tobe) Riddell with 49 and Eddie Rhoderick with 37. There will be a runoff between Younger and Riddell.

In Precinct 3, which is now represented by Beryl Long who also did not seek re-election, L. B. Garvin, jr. led the field with 122 votes, followed by Larry Comer with 117 and John T. Francis with 99. There will be a runoff between Garvin and Comer.

In the Briscoe County Tax Assessor-Collector's race, incumbent Fairy McWilliams polled 558 votes to win without a runoff. Waynelle Couch received 157 votes and Gloria Wood polled 170 votes.

In the Presidential Preference, Al Gore led the field with 258 votes followed by Dick Gephardt with 216 and Michael Dukakis with 146. Gary Hart polled 84 votes and Jesse Jackson got 62 Briscoe votes.

Incumbent U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen led by a wide 716-101 margin over Joe Sullivan.

In the race for U. S. Represen-

tative, Bill Sarpalius led with 368 votes closely followed by Randy Hollums with 301 and Ed Lehman with 161. This was Beau Boulter's seat for which he did not seek re-election.

In the race for State Senator, Mel Phillips led the field in the county with 303 votes, closely followed by Bryan Poff, 229, and Nancy Garms, 224.

The votes for County Democratic Chairman and Precinct Chairmen were not tabulated on election night due to there being so many receiving votes.

LIGHT VOTE IN REPUBLICAN PRIMARY

In the one Republican Primary voting precinct, a total of 21 votes were cast on Super Tuesday.

In the Presidential Preference, George Bush led with 7 votes, followed by Jack Kemp, 6; Pat Robertson, 5; Bob Dole, 2, and one uncommitted vote.

Beau Boulter received all 21 Briscoe votes for nomination as U. S. Senator.

For U. S. Representative, Jim Brandon received 7 votes; Alan Pickering, 6; Bob Price, 4; and Ron Buffum and Chip Staniswalis each received one vote.

For Railroad Commissioner, Ed Emmett captured 7 votes; Sam Ervin, 3; Dale Steffes and Ralph Hoelscher, two votes each.

For Justice, Supreme Court Place 1, Paul Murphy received 6 and George Barbary 5 votes.

For Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2, it was Ronald Block, 5; Nathan Hecht, 4; Camille Dunn, 2.

For State Senator, Teel Bivins outpolled Ron Slover, 15-4.

For State Representative candidate, Tom Christian, a former State Representative, received 10 Briscoe votes while Gary Ivey took 6.

February Cooler, Drier Than Normal

February of 1988 turned out to be both cooler and drier than normal across the Texas South Plains.

Temperatures averaged one degree below normal and ranged from 1.2 degrees above normal at Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge to 2.4 degrees below normal at Plainview.

Maximum temperatures averaged 0.4 degree below normal and ranged from 2.7 degrees above normal at the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge to 2.6 degrees below normal at Spur. The highest temperature reported during the month was 85 at Paducah on February 29.

Minimum temperatures averaged 1.7 degrees below normal and ranged from 0.3 degree below normal at Floydada and Matador to 5.8 degrees below normal at Friona. The lowest temperature of the month was one degree above normal at Silverton on the morning of February 11.

The average maximum temperature at Silverton was 54.5 and the average minimum was 23.0, giving a monthly average temperature of 38.8 degrees locally.

Precipitation averaged .20 of an inch below normal and ranged from .64 of an inch above normal at Seminole to .75 of an inch below normal at Paducah. Most of the precipitation was in the

form of snow although some was freezing rain or freezing drizzle. Snow totals averaged 3.9 inches across the area ranging from a low of one inch at Hereford and Snyder to ten inches at Brownfield and Lamesa.

Silverton's total precipitation measurement was .18 of an inch, considerably below the monthly average of .60 of an inch. Three inches of snow fell on Silverton during February.

Rain, Snow Bring .95 Moisture

Rain and snow have brought .95 of an inch of moisture to Silverton during the first eight days of March. This indicates an above-average month moisture-wise because the 45-year average for March is .93 of an inch.

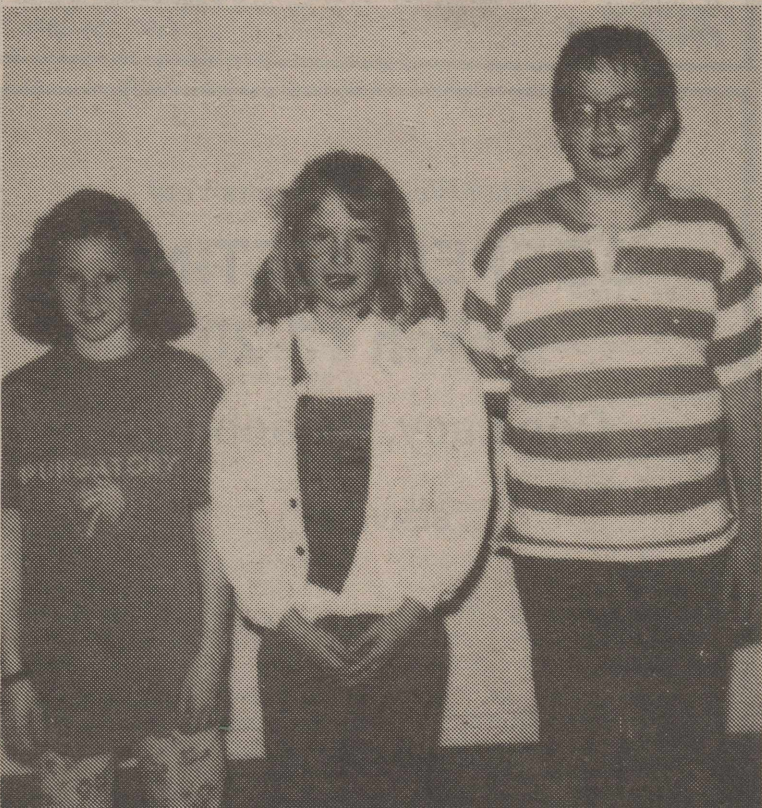
Rain and snow continued to be in the forecast at presstime for later in the week.

The money will be used for their loss prevention program.

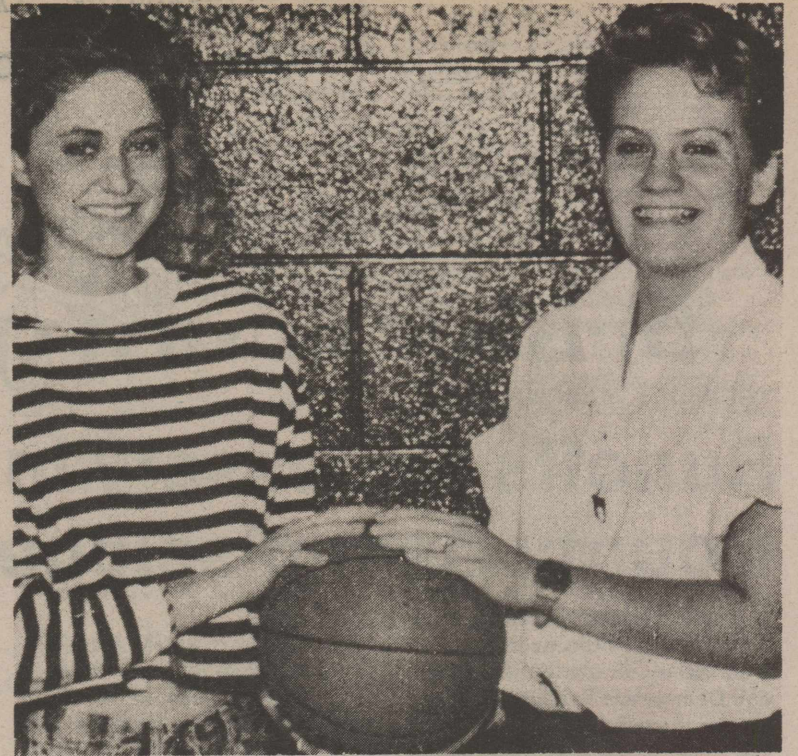
The Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies pay fire departments this amount when the department works at a fire in rural areas, involving property insured by them.

A crowd of 3,000 watched Avenger erase an early 8-2 lead built by the Owls in the first quarter. Avenger used a full-court man press to defeat the Owls. "Their press just killed us," said Coach Lyndel Norwood. "It's as good a press as we've ever seen. We had worked against a zone press, but Avenger used a man press. Our guards just couldn't cope with it. Our game plan was to get the ball inside to 6-7 Jackie Vaughn, but we couldn't get the ball up the floor consistently in the first half." The Indians broke it open early in the second period, and went on to win the game 59-49 . . . 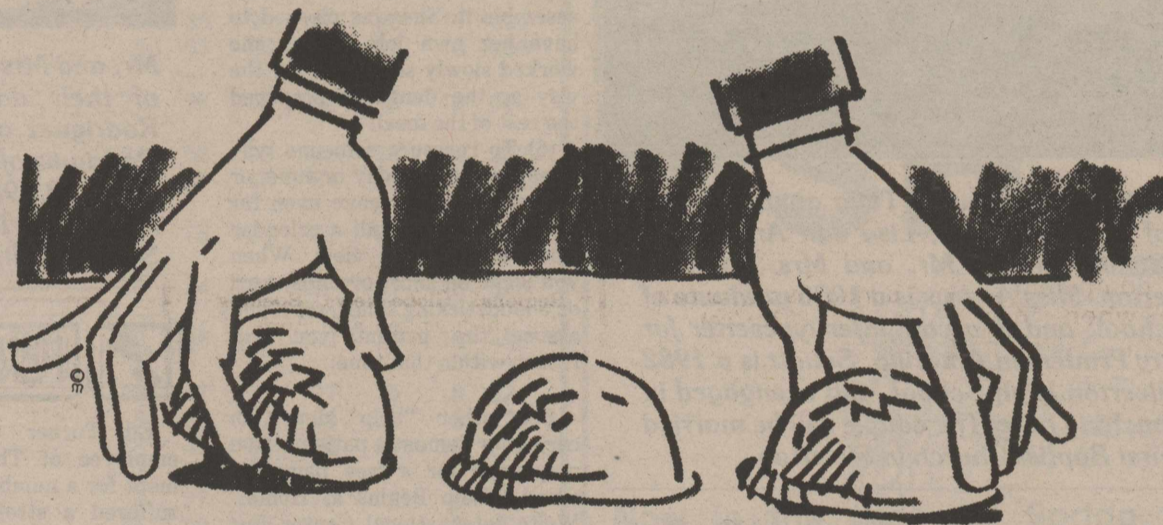
Amarillo Tuesday evening. She has been there for some time now undergoing treatment for injuries sustained in the tornado which struck here in May 1957 . . .

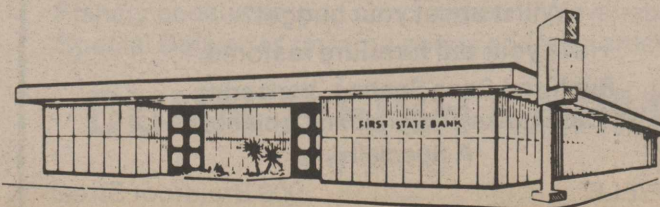

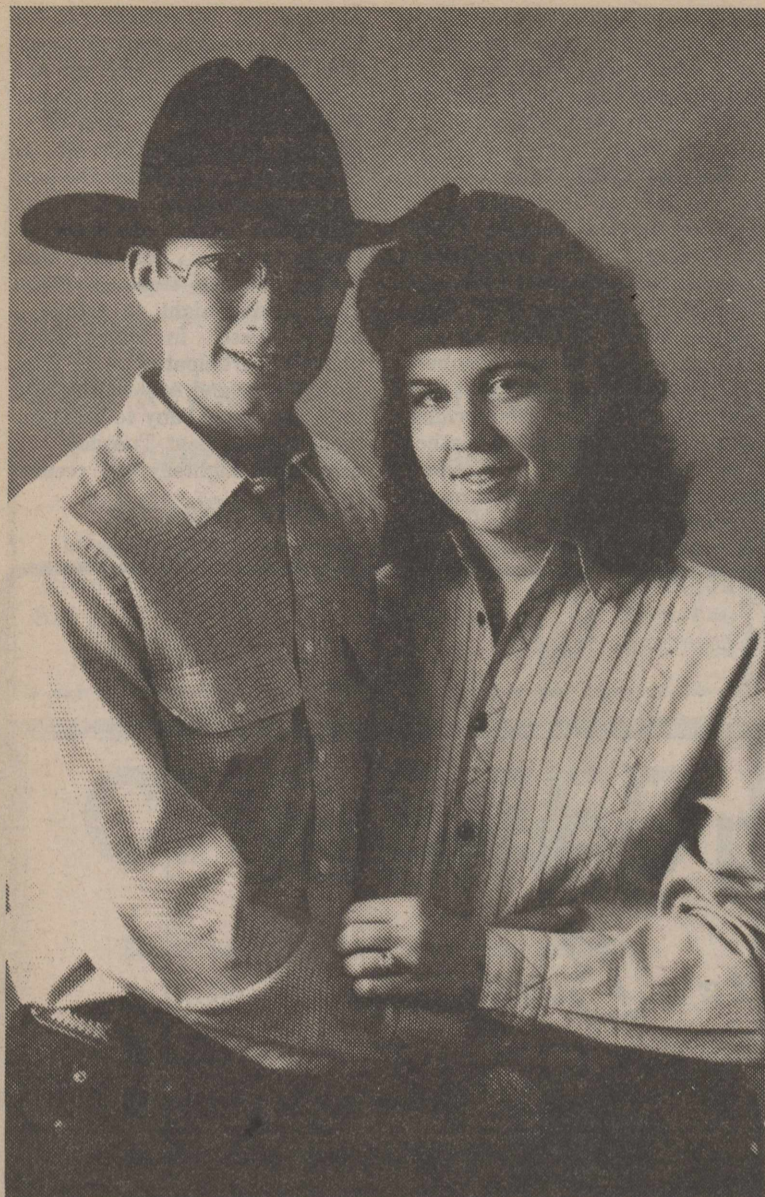

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Caring For The Elderly Or Bedridden

Our tips for this week are for the care of Dementia Patients. Dementia means partial or complete loss of mind.

(1) To keep your loved one in touch, read to him or her from a familiar book. It not only may spark past memories for him/her but may lift you as well.

(2) To help calm the patient while you are away, make a tape of your voice and possibly other family members, and turn it on when you go out. This sound can be soothing.

(3) To cope with memory problems you must realize their memory involves many shades of gray, and regardless of how "black and white" our recall is, we should not argue to prove ourselves right.

(4) To both assist and please your loved one, if they are still living at home, give a pet dog as a gift. It can serve as an alarm and a companion.

(5) If they are living in your home, assign them a regular duty. One woman said she set out all things that would go in that day's salad and let her mother assemble it. She was pleased to have her own job and as she worked slowly she wasn't in the way as the daughter prepared the rest of the meal.

(6) To reassure someone who loses track of the day or time, or panics when you leave even for short periods, install a calendar clock within easy view. When you leave on short errands, turn on a loud, ticking timer, set it and assure the patient you will return within that time.

Girl Scout News

Junior Girl Scouts are urged to attend the First Baptist Church Sunday morning worship service March 13 to celebrate the Girl Scout Birthday. Following the worship service, there will be a covered dish luncheon for the Girl Scouts and their families in the Fellowship Hall. All Girl Scouts are asked to wear their uniforms.

Sir Robert (later Lord) Baden-Powell, the founder of Boy Scouting, noticed a group of girls wearing the shirts and hats of the boys' uniforms with long skirts at a rally in England. When he asked them who they were, they replied, "We're the Girl Scouts." He asked his sister, Agnes, to help him start Scouting for girls, because with so many girls becoming Scouts assistance was needed.

When Baden-Powell visited Juliette Gordon (Daisy) Low in Scotland in August 1911, she had heard about the Scouting movement for girls. Daisy started many Girl Guide troops in London before sailing to America to begin the first American Girl Guide troop.

When Daisy arrived in Savannah, she phoned her cousin, Nina Pape, and said, "Come right over! I've got something for the girls of Savannah, and all America, and all the world, and we're going to start it tonight!"

So the word spread, and on March 12, 1912, 18 girls met at Daisy's house to form a Girl Scout troop. Daisy changed the name of the American Girl Guides to Girl Scouts in 1913. For the rest of her life, Daisy traveled and shared her ideas and dreams with millions of girls everywhere. Daisy died in 1927.

Juliette Low is remembered as a woman who worked for peace and good will. Her dream was to have young people make the world a friendly, peaceful place. She wanted young people to understand themselves and others. She wanted to give something special to the girls of the world, and that was Girl Scouting.

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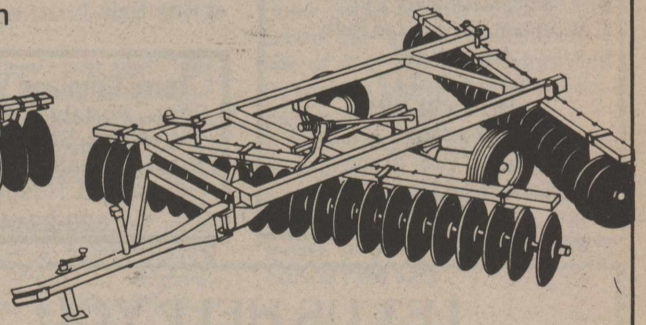
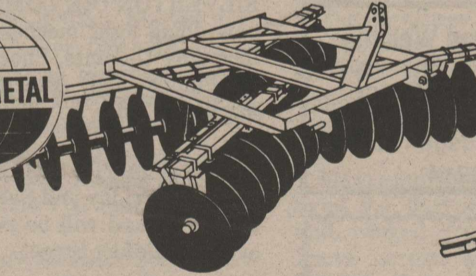
