

Mid-Plains To Refund Capital Credits Totalling \$604,267

At the regular board of directors meeting of Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. held Tuesday, January 19, 1988, the board voted to retire 100% of the Capital Credits for the year of 1980. This decision was based on the strong financial condition of the Cooperative and a commitment by the board of directors to continue a tradition of refunding capital credits each year since 1980. After this year's payment, the total capital credit

payments by the Cooperative to date will be \$1,990,000.

Checks totalling the \$604,267 will be mailed March 28, 1988 to the Cooperative's members who had telephone service with the Cooperative during the year of 1980. Members Capital Credits are based on net margins for the year and total billing of the Cooperative for services provided to the members. Each member who used telephone services provided by Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. in 1980 will receive back in cash approximately 47 cents for every dollar spent with the Cooperative in 1980.



A FACELIFT FOR YOUR HOME

If the coming of spring brings the urge to clean up and "fix up" your home, you may be trying to decide what can be done to make the most improvement with the least money.

All homes, just like machinery, need regular maintenance, to prolong the usefulness and reduce the cost of major repairs. Wheat Producers Cautioned To Watch For Wheat Leaf Rust

Although the threat of wheat leaf rust is not as great this season as it has been for the past several years, growers should be aware that the organism is present and that future conditions may be ideal for rapid development, says Curtis Preston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University

Wheat leaf rust is less threatening this season because there is less wheat acreage in South and Central Texas, more varieties are being planted rather than one predominant variety, more slow-rusting varieties are being planted and weather conditions have been rather dry, Preston says. In some areas, rust was more pronounced earlier this winter than it is now.

Producers are urged to keep an eye on their fields and watch for increases in wheat leaf occurrence, the agent says. There is still plenty of time for an epidemic to develop if weather conditions favor such an event,

Some producers may want to use fungicides this year, since wheat prices have increased and another highly effective fungicide is on the market. Chemical control may pay in many situations, but will not likely be cost-effective for everyone, Pres-

Producers who have a 40-bushel yield potential and reside where leaf rust represents a serious limiting production factor may want to consider fungicide use. They also should be certain they have a wheat variety that will respond to a fungicide, the agent says.

Growers should watch their wheat fields closely from now until heading time to determine the potential for leaf rust damage. The agent reminds that fungicides are available if yield levels and disease potentials warrant use of this practice.

Scientists at the University of Florida have found a real off-thewall reason why some common houseplants mysteriously wither and die. It seems that mercury added to some paints to retard mildew is highly toxic to some indoor plants. Because of their sensitivity, such plants could prove useful for detecting low levels of toxic chemicals in the indoor environment, International Wildlife magazine reports.

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
