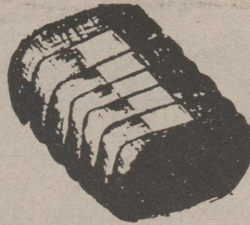

The Silverton School faculty chose her as the Girl Most Likely to Succeed this year and elected her to Who's Who as a sophomore. She entered UIL Spelling her first two years in high school and UIL Typewriting as a sophomore. A three-year member of the Future Business Leaders of America, she has served the chapter as reporter her junior year and as vice-president this year. She has been a member of the Future Homemakers of America two years.

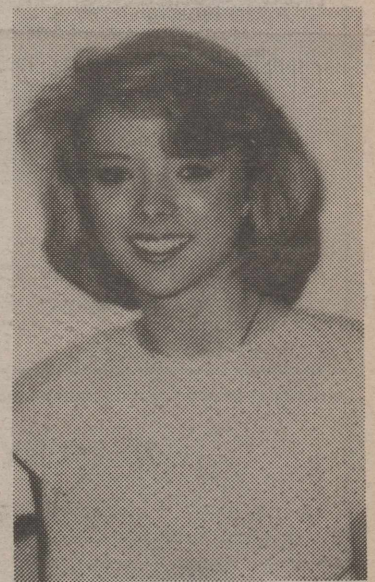

Appraisal District Has Regular Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of Briscoe County Tax Appraisal District was held Thursday, May 11, with L. B. Garvin, jr., Jimmy Ross, Joe B. Mercer, John Bowman and Robert McPherson, directors, present; none absent, and Chief Appraiser Carlye Fleming, Dave Gerdner and Dina Reitzel also present.

A computer presentation was made by Dave Gerdner of Lone Star Valuations in Amarillo and Dina Reitzel of NCR in Lubbock. Mr. Gerdner stated that they have installed computer systems in several appraisal districts in the Panhandle. He will mail a list of these districts so the local directors can visit them personally. With this system, the appraisal district staff could not only have all appraisals on computer, but all assessing and collecting would be more efficient, and mandatory reports would be much faster and more accurate.

Motion carried to investigate this further. Ross suggested that Mrs. Fleming prepare a justification regarding a computer. Several of the members expressed a desire to visit personally some of the appraisal district offices which have computers.

Since Verlin Towe was unable to meet with the board at this time, he was placed on the June agenda to go over the district's general liability insurance with members.

The financial and collection reports were given by Mrs. Fleming. She reported that 1987 tax roll collections through the month of April were: Briscoe County, 95.1%; Silverton ISD, 96.6%; City of Silverton, 92.3%; City of Quitaque, 76.5%; Mackenzie Water Authority, 92.2%. This represents 94.7% of the total taxes that the appraisal district collects for the taxing jurisdictions.

Bullock Says Texas Economy Recovering

State Comptroller Bob Bullock last week sent checks totaling \$120.7 million to 1,041 cities and 81 counties that levy local option sales taxes.

"The economy of Texas is recovering," Bullock said, "and the consumer confidence is reflected in the rebates going to local governments."

City sales tax rebates totaled \$111.4 million.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$9.3 million to the counties which have approved a half-percent county sales tax.

The largest allocation this month went to Houston, \$19 million.

El Paso County received the biggest county allocation, \$1.3 million.

May checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the Comptroller's office by April 21.

Silverton's rebate for this period was \$2,780.17, as compared to a year ago when it was \$2,097.77, a 32.53% increase. This brought the 1988 total to date to \$8,515.60, up 21.51% from the \$7,009.12 that had been received at this same time in 1987.

Quitaque's payment was \$1,833.23, down 14.25% from the \$2,138.14 received at this same time last year. This brought the 1988 payments to date to a total of \$5,089.73, down 0.54% from the \$5,117.16 that had been received at this same time in 1987.

Rebates received by other area cities and the percentage of their increase or decrease include: Claude, \$3,377.20, up 14.80%; Dimmitt, \$29,483.61, up 91.21%; Hart, \$1,661.74, down 5.82%; Nazareth, \$1,980.58, up 51.12%; Childress, \$35,287.00, up 9.60%; Wellington, \$10,055.70, down 4.96%; Paducah, \$7,633.48, up 15.53%; Crosbyton, \$6,630.48, up 8.10%; Lorenzo, \$2,579.80, up 11.37%; Ralls, \$7,184.47, up 16.61%; Dickens, \$1,331.60, down 35.22%; Spur, \$6,062.63, down 14.78%; Clarendon, \$10,974.24, up 18.85%; Hedley, \$1,149.05, up 27.93%; Howardwick, \$1,016.86, up 82.77%; Floydada, \$12,926.50, up 1.78%; Lockney, \$6,186.49, up 1.19%; Lefors, \$546.86, down 14.56%; McLean, \$1,920.85, up 4.62%; Pampa, \$149,659.74, up 36.07%; Plainview, \$204,598.75, up 58.54%; Estelline, \$460.11, down 66.91%;

"CHANGE MAKES ME FEEL..."

Are you frustrated with major events that can change your life? Do you have difficulty keeping up with the changes in your environment? Do you sometimes wish things could be done the way they've always been done?

Change means different things to different people in different circumstances. Sometimes change is exciting and sometimes it is scary.

At this time of the year, many families are facing changes—graduations, weddings, births. These events are milestones in both the lives of children and parents. They can be looked upon with excitement for the new doors they can open to young people and to the parents, or they may be looked upon with fear—fear of changing relationships, fear of "losing" a child.

Many changes are predictable, such as children graduating and leaving home. If we have prepared them and ourselves for this change, we should be able to accept it with a positive attitude as another stage of maturity for them and for us.

Some changes are unpredictable, such as death and disasters, and these require greater adjustments. HOW we react to change influences whether the change will affect us positively or negatively.

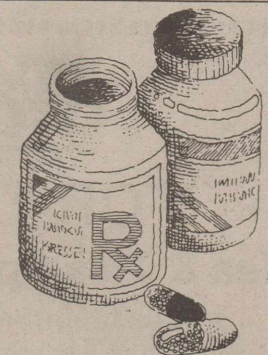

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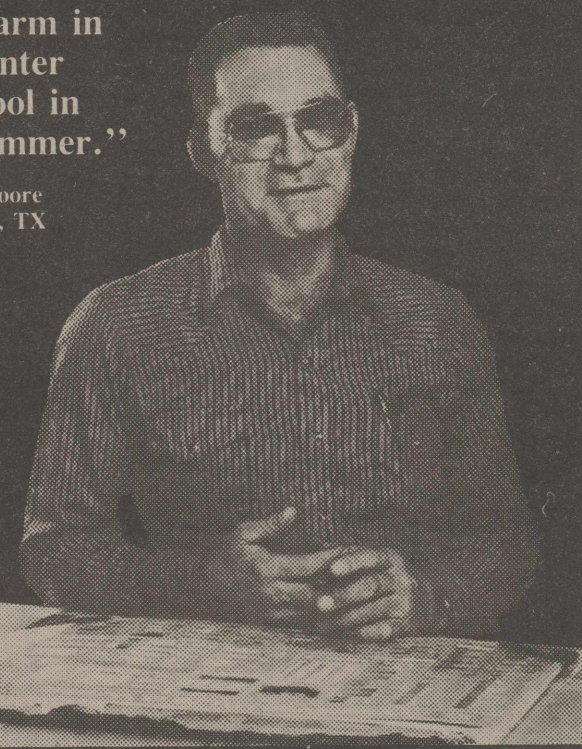

In spite of a lower base loan rate, the loan value of almost all High Plains cotton qualities will be higher in 1988 than in 1987, according to the calculations of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Smaller Commodity Credit Corporation loan schedule discounts, PCG notes, will more than offset the 1988 drop in the loan for the base cotton quality, Strict Low Middling 1-1/16th inches (41-34), 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire. The High Plains area loan for the base quality was reduced only 45 points (.45 cents), from 52.30 to 51.85 cents per pound, while cumulative grade, staple and micronaire discounts on qualities below that standard were lowered much more.

For example, a typical High Plains quality over the years has

been Strict Low Middling Light Spot, one inch staple (42-32) with 3.2 micronaire. That quality in 1988 will be discounted 505 points for grade and staple and 345 points for micronaire, leaving a physical loan price of 43.35 cents per pound. Last year's corresponding discounts were 590 and 400 points, fixing the loan value at only 42.4 cents.

Each year's loan program premiums and discounts are based on a simple average of the previous year's loan differences and the differences quoted in spot markets for that year. The sharp narrowing of loan differences this year, PCG says, stems from a scarcity of lower qualities in the exceptionally high quality crop produced in 1987.

A net decline in physical loan prices for 1988 is seen only in

Most of these benefits are placed in immediate circulation, thereby providing a significant economic stimulus to the economy of Briscoe County.

Lake Mackenzie Fishing Report

Fishing continues to be very exciting at Lake Mackenzie where the water temperature at a four-foot depth is now 65° and the water depth at the dam is 109 feet.

A lot of crappie, one-half to 1½-pounds, are being caught in the creeks, coves and shallows on minnows. Bass and yellow catfish are also providing lots of excitement. Spinner baits, anything chartreuse and crank baits are most popular with the fishermen at this time, says a spokesman at Cactus Cove Marina.

May 11 Randall Moore of Plainview caught a three-pound largemouth bass in Tule Creek on a deep diving crawdad.

That same day, a 3½-pound largemouth bass was caught in Tule Creek on a black plastic worm with chartreuse tail by Jerry Matlock of Plainview.

May 13, a 12½-pound yellow catfish was taken in Williams Creek by Mule Grantham who was fishing with big minnows.

Memorial Scholarships Available To Children Of American Vets.

According to Billye Kesler, Veterans County Service Officer for Briscoe County, the Adolph Coors Company and its local distributors, in conjunction with the Texas Veterans Commission, announced on March 1, 1988, that applications are available in Texas for the 1988 Coors Veterans Memorial Scholarships, which provide more than \$500,000 to the sons and daughters of American veterans.

Free Financial Counseling Service Available To Families

Farm and ranch families in Briscoe County can obtain free financial counseling service through a new project known as "Texas Volunteers for Rural Families."

This project, provided by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, uses trained volunteers who have agricultural and business experiences, and its services are confidential.

The volunteer counselors, trained by Extension specialists, will help families or individuals look at their financial situation and analyze available options. The individual or family receiving the financial counseling has the responsibility for making their own final decisions.

Among the areas on which the volunteer counselors can assist are procedures for family or business budgeting and financial planning, debt restructuring, record keeping, reorganization of a business to make maximum use of available resources, and computer applications.

The project is funded by an \$84,000 grant from ACTION—Center for Volunteers, Inc., which was announced earlier this year by U. S. Senator Phil Gramm.

Local volunteers who have received the financial counseling training are James and Geneva Griffin. Both have extensive experience in agriculture and understand farm budgeting and record-keeping through their years involved in ASCS and other related jobs. They have the ability to work with people and to keep confidential all information disclosed in their individual counseling sessions.

Persons wanting more information about the financial counseling service may contact Lynda Fogerson at the County Extension Office, 823-2131, Ext. 12, or come by the Extension Office in the Courthouse basement.

Briscoe County is one of only 13 counties in the Panhandle and South Plains area to have trained volunteers to provide this free service.

A free packet of materials, "Managing Your Personal Finances," is available to anyone requesting it. This packet includes worksheets and a variety of information on financial planning, budgeting, and record keeping.

Programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

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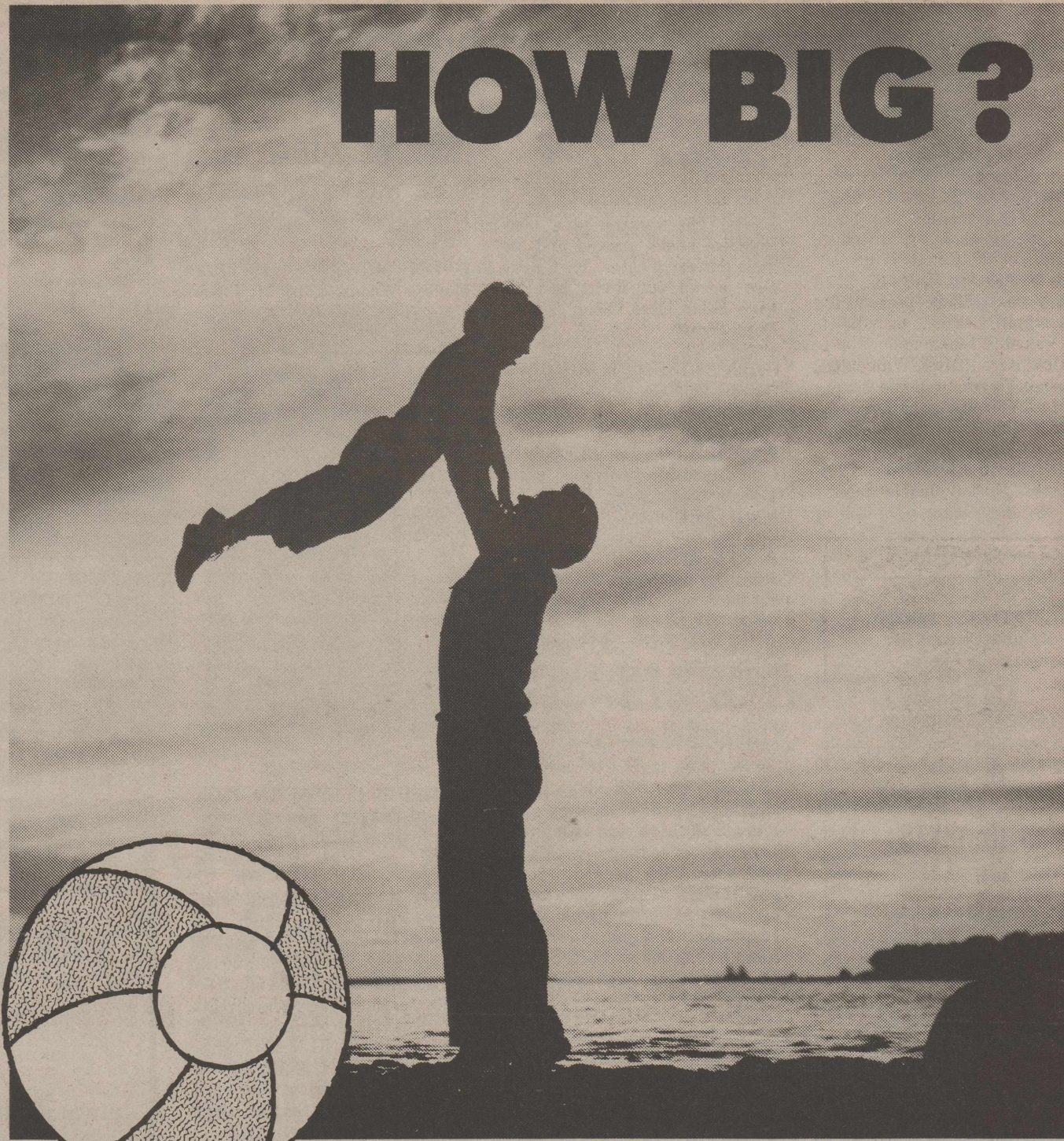
