## Briscoe County Celebration Being Held Here This Week

The celebration of Briscoe County's 96th birthday is being held in Silverton this week, and everyone is invited to take part in the activities which have been planned for those of all ages.

The Briscoe County Team Roping kicked things off Wednesday night with books open at 6:00 p.m. and introduction of ropers at 7:00 p.m. Roping began at 7:30 p.m. at Wood Memorial Arena. Finals for the five top teams will be held at the arena tonight in conjunction with the Kids' Playday, and this begins at 8:00 p.m. Admission will be 50c per person at the gate.

Events planned for the Kids' Fun Night are barrels, flags, steer riding, sheep riding and an egg race.

All fees will be put in a pot with added prize money to be paid back to the winners.

There will be two performances of the rodeo sponsored by the Briscoe County Activities Association, beginning at 8:00 p.m.

Friday and Saturday nights. Stock is to be furnished by the Rocking and Rolling N Rodeo Company of Dodge City, Kansas. Admission is \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children.

Rodeo events include calf roping, team roping, bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, ladies break-away roping, bull riding and a kids calf scramble for those 12 and under.

Junior and Senior Rodeo Queens are to be presented at the Saturday night performance of the rodeo. Drawings will be held that same night for a bit and spurs to be given away by the 4-H and FFA Boosters, an Oliver Brothers saddle, afghan and quilt to be given away by the Briscoe County Activities Association.

Dances will be sponsored Friday and Saturday nights by the Silverton Fire Department and Briscoe County Activities Association. Music will be by Silverton's own Caprock Country

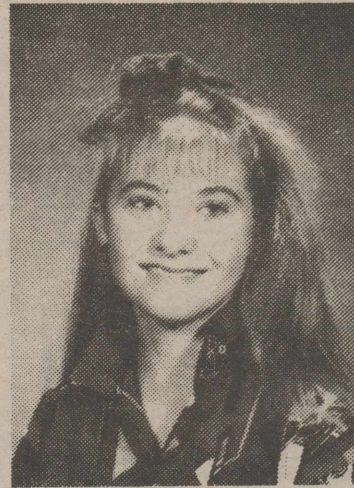
band.

The Little Miss and Mister Briscoe County contests will begin at 2:30 p.m. on the courthouse yard. Entrants are to be dressed in pioneer costumes, and winners are to receive \$50 savings bonds. This will be for boys and girls two through seven years of age who live in Briscoe County.

The annual parade will be held in downtown Silverton beginning at 3:30 p.m. Saturday, and this will be followed by a barbecue on the courthouse square.

Various booths will be open on the courthouse lawn during the Saturday events, and a huge tent will provide shade. The tent is being sponsored by the Silverton Fire Department, and donations are being taken to defray the rental cost.

Complete Surrender of Nazis Is Expected Momentarily

HITLER HAS COMMITTED SUICIDE! MUSSOLINI HAS BEEN EXECUTED! ALL GERMAN ARMIES IN ITALY HAVE SURRENDERED UNCONDITIONALLY! BERLIN HAS FALLEN TO THE RED ARMY TROOPS

These are a few of the world shaking events of the past few days that are leading to the unconditional surrender of all German armies to the plunging American and Allied troops. Rumors have spread premature surrender news already several times, but when that news is official it will be announced by radio to the American people by President Truman.

CLOTHING DRIVE BRINGS LARGE AMOUNT The request for used clothing to be shipped overseas to allied nations brought in hundreds of pounds, according to Mrs. D. T. Horlock, chairman of the drive. The clothing was all good, usable articles, ranging from baby's diapers to men's suits. It was loaded to Plainview Tuesday morning, where it was to be included with our load from that city and surrounding towns. After lunch, Dock and Wanda

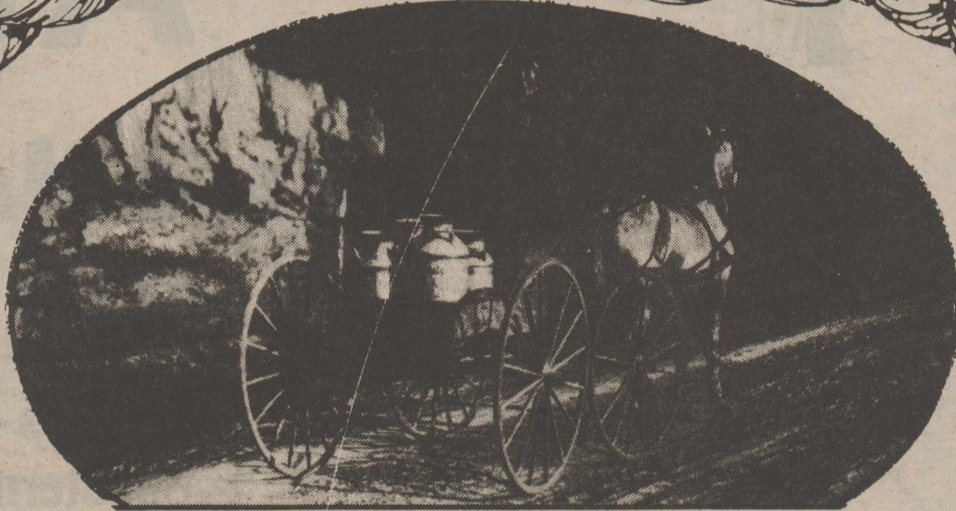

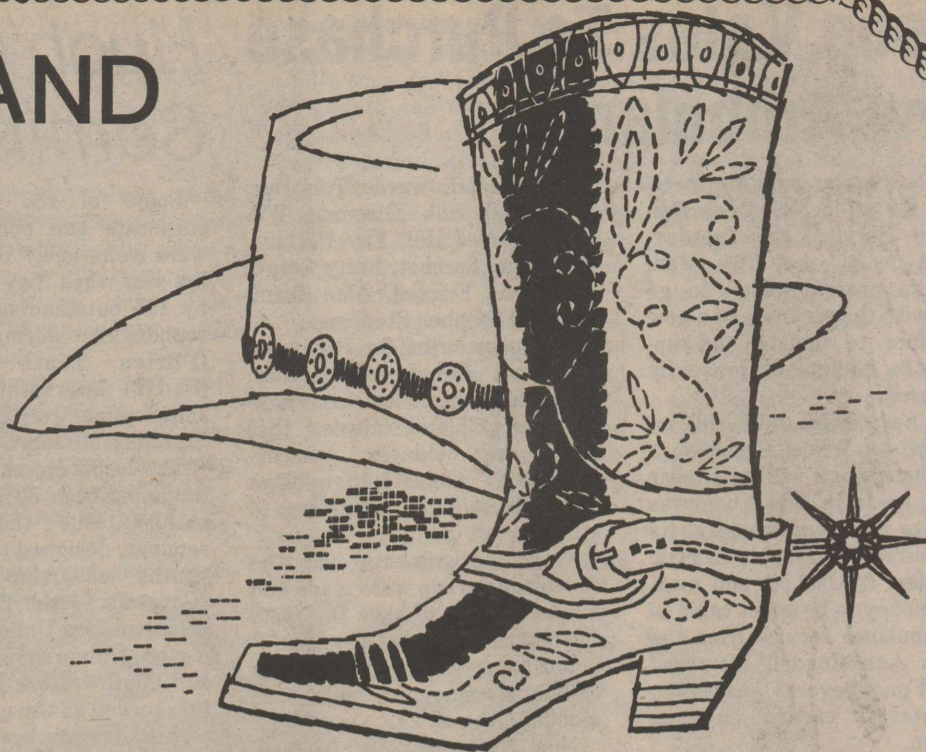

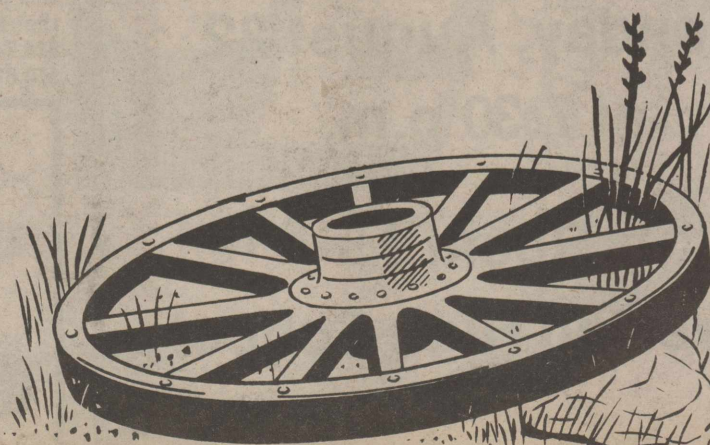

## Group Votes To Purchase New Ambulance

At the regular monthly meeting of Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service on Tuesday, August 2, at the City Hall, members present voted to go ahead with the purchase of a new ambulance to update and upgrade the equipment presently being used.

The new diesel unit will be prepared by Wheel Coach on a Ford chassis and will be similar to the modular unit that was shown to members recently. Its basic purchase price is a little more than \$45,000.00, and most of the money to be spent came to the ambulance service from the Martha Ann Cogdell Memorial Trust Fund several years ago and interest earned on that donation.

Delivery time for the new unit will be from 120 to 140 days, and it should arrive before the end of the year. The group postponed the decision on whether to equip both ambulances with the Life Pak heart monitor/defibrillation equipment, since this equipment would require the outlay of about \$7,000.00 more.

The new ambulance will require the expenditure of about \$5,000.00 to equip it with radios for keeping in touch with hospitals and other equipment that must be a part of the unit, bringing the value of the new unit to near \$50,000.00.

It is hoped that a buyer can be found for the old unit, but used ambulances don't bring much money and the ambulance service is not counting on anything from the sale at this time.

Vice-President Emmett Tomlin presided over the meeting in the absence of President Anthony Kingery. Also attending

were James Edwards, Tom Burson, Fred Hill, Diamond Williams, Janice Hill, Fay Perkins, Mary Ann Sarchet, Betty Stephens, Lynn Frizzell, Alan Grimland and Stephen Stephens.

Ambulance runs for July were reviewed, and members were told about an in-service workshop on athletic injuries that would be held in Amarillo Saturday, August 13. James Edwards said he would try to attend.

Work assignments for the rodeo and parade were made and it was decided to have the units cleaned and waxed at a station.

The group will be sponsoring a mobile mammogram unit here Monday, August 29.

New EMTs were given their protocol books, and everyone received educational material on MAST and EG Tube that will be covered in a continuing education class for re-certification next month.

## Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Seminar Held Last Week

Some of the nation's top corporate and political leaders were voluntarily occupying the hot seat when they were queried by 195 outstanding high school sophomores during the Hugh O'Brian Youth Foundation (HOBY) Internatioanl Leadership Seminar July 29-August 5 in St. Louis, Missouri.

The sophomores traveled to St. Louis from 50 states and 20 nations. The theme of the seminar, designed to nurture the youths' leadership ability, was "Gateway to the 21st Century: Opportunities Unlimited." Washington University in St. Louis and Southwestern Bell Corporation served as the university and corporate hosts, respectively.

The students attending the St. Louis seminars were selected as the top representatives from the 83 HOBY State Seminars, which include students representing 11,000 public and private high schools in the United States and the federal district of Washington, D. C., as well as Canada, Mexico and the Bahamas.

In addition to a luncheon address by Katherine D. Ortega, treasurer of the United States, the prestigious event featured 15 seminars on topics ranging from

corporate ethics and social responsibilities in business, to detailing what government agencies in America and abroad are doing to protect citizens against terrorism and other crimes.

There were also seminars on world hunger, challenges to the constitution in the 21st century, and the U. S. presidency and the democratic process.

Unlike most seminars where speakers address the audience during the entire program, HOBY panelists spoke for approximately five minutes. For the remainder of the two-hour seminars, the speakers responded to challenging and sometimes controversial questions posed by the students.

Among the participants for the week-long event were Sanford N. McDonnell, chairman emeritus, McDonnell Douglas Corporation, and Stanley C. Pace, chairman and chief executive officer, General Dynamics Corporation, who served as panelists for a corporate ethics seminar; Louis Harris, president of the Louis Harris & Associates, Inc. polling firm, discussing conducting business in the 21st century; Charles T. Manatt, a Washington, D. C., attorney and past chairman of

the Democratic National Committee, and R. Gordon Hoxie, president, Center for the Study of the Presidency, discussing the U. S. presidency and the democratic process; and Steven L. Pomerantz, section chief, Counter-Terrorism Section, FBI, William L. Webster, attorney general for Missouri, and George R. (Buzz) Westfall, prosecuting attorney, St. Louis County, discussing crime: an international dilemma.

Other panelists included U. S. Rep. Richard A. Gephardt (D-Mo.), Murray Weidenbaum, Edward Mallickrodt Distinguished University Professor and director of the Center for the Study of American Business, Washington University, and Sam Kusumoto, president, Minolta Corporation, discussing balancing world trade; and Pasco M. Bowman, U. S. Circuit Judge, U. S. Court of Appeals, 8th Circuit, and Thomas F. Eagleton, University Professor of Public Affairs, Washington University, discussing challenges to the constitution in the 21st century.

This year marked the 30th anniversary of The HOBY Foundation, which is supported by the nation's top corporations and civic organizations and has alumni of more than 55,000 young leaders.

The Hugh O'Brian Youth Foundation was founded by Hugh O'Brian, star of motion pictures and television, who, in 1958, traveled to Africa to visit Dr. Albert Schweitzer at his famous clinic in Lambarene, Gabon. This meeting served as a catalyst for the creation of the Foundation, an organization that seeks out, recognizes, and rewards potential leaders among high school sophomores from around the world.

## Sales Tax Rebate Checks Mostly Higher

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that payments to cities and counties that collect local sales tax increased again this month.

"The Texas economy is steadily improving," Bullock said. "Cities and counties across the state are still seeing the benefits."

Bullock sent checks totaling \$113.5 million to 1043 Texas cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

Checks totaling \$10.4 million were sent to 81 Texas counties that collect the one-half percent optional county sales tax, Bullock said.

The largest city allocation, \$19.8 million, went to Houston this month with El Paso County receiving the largest county allocation, \$1.5 million.

August's checks represent taxes collected by monthly and quarterly filers in June and reported to the Comptroller's Office by July 20.

Silverton's rebate check for this period is \$2,759.08, bringing the 1988 payments to date to \$14,747.82, up 38.12% from the \$10,677.43 that had been received

at the same time in 1987.

Quitague's payment was \$1,985.31, giving that city a total for 1988 of \$9,505.90, up 38.12% from the \$7,775.15 that had been received by this time last year.

The Cancer Society says all women between the ages of 35 and 40 should have a mammogram. Women between 40 and 50 without symptoms should have a mammogram everyone to two years. They also recommend that women over 50 years have an annual physical and annual mammogram.

The cost of the screening mammogram is \$50, and payment can be made by cash, check or credit card (Visa, Mastercard of American Express). The examination takes only about 15 minutes and is performed by a female technologist. Participants are requested to wear appropriate

ate clothing to allow easy disrobing from the waist up.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

After the examination, the films are interpreted by a radiologist. The results are then forwarded to the woman's physician. The physician provides the results of the study.

A spokesperson from Women's and Children's Hospital states, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer when the cancer is the size of a grain of rice has a 90 to 97 percent survival rate. A woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has about a 50 percent survival rate in five years."

Personnel of the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service are encouraging local women to follow the example set by First Lady Nancy Reagan, in having a breast mammogram as a preventive measure to detect any potential suspicious growths.

## State Comptroller Recognized By Defense Department

State Comptroller Bob Bullock was officially recognized last week by the U. S. Department of Defense for his support of national military reserve programs.

"Bob Bullock is being honored with this award for his contributions as a patriotic citizen and for his support of the guard and reserve forces," said Cmdr. Irvin Williams of the Austin Naval Reserve Center.

# Weather Continued Wetter And Cooler

The weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of July 1988 turned out to be wetter and cooler than normal.

Temperatures averaged 2.3 degrees below normal and ranged from 0.2 degree below normal at Lubbock to 3.5 degrees below normal at Jayton.

Maximum temperatures averaged 4.1 degrees below normal and ranged from 1.3 degrees below normal at Lubbock to six degrees below normal at Seminole. The highest temperature reported during the month was 100 at Spur on the 19th and Paducah on the 24th.

Minimum temperatures averaged 0.5 degree below normal and ranged from one degree above normal at Lubbock to two degrees below normal at Crosby-

ton. The lowest temperature reported during the month was 50 at Muleshoe on the 21st.

Precipitation averaged 1.76 inches above normal and ranged from 7.59 inches above normal at Seminole to 0.29 inch below normal at Muleshoe. Occurring mostly with thunderstorms, the rainfall happened throughout the month on about a weekly interval.

Silverton's average daytime maximum temperature was 86.8 degrees, and the average minimum overnight temperature was 64.2 for an average monthly temperature of 75.5 degrees. The total precipitation in Silverton for July was 3.08 inches.

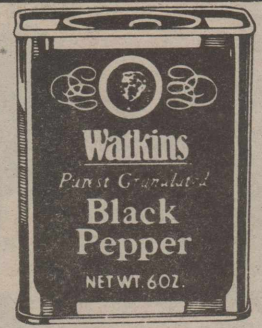
