#### Silverton Received No Rainfall During October

Weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of October 1988 turned out to be dry with slightly above normal temperatures. In Silverton, it was very dry because no measurable precipitation was received.

Temperatures averaged 0.4 degree above normal and ranged from three degrees above normal at the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge to 1.5 degrees below normal at Spur.

Maximum temperatures averaged 0.8 degree above normal and ranged from 3.6 degrees above normal at the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge to 2.4 degrees below normal at Tulia. The highest temperature reported during the month was 96 at Matador on October 18.

Minimum temperatures averaged exactly normal and ranged from 2.4 degrees above normal at the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge to 2.6 degrees below normal at Muleshoe. The lowest temperature of the month was 33 at Muleshoe on October 24.

Silverton's average maximum temperature was 74.1 degrees and the average minimum was 43.9, for an average October temperature of 59.0 degrees.

Precipitation was almost totally lacking with four stations reporting none and six only a trace. The few stations that did record rainfall received only enough for an area average of 0.04 inch and that was 1.96 inches below normal. The range was from 1.36 inches below normal at Friona to 2.51 inches below normal at Paducah.

To a chilled, halved grapefruit add a topping of cooked cranberries and a thin sprinkle of mint leaves. on Texas agriculture, and these surveys should help us summarize where the industry stands at the end of 1988," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"Information from these confidential surveys conducted by mail, telephone or in person will also help producers make their plans for the coming year.

"Sound production and marketing decisions require good, reliable information and some advanced planning, and our reports provide producers with solid facts and figures they can incorporate into their plans," Findley added.

The Texas service will be trying to keep survey costs at a minimum this year because of budget cuts, so Findley is urging producers to return their mailed questionnaires as soon as possible.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since one producer represents similar operations of the same type and size. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley noted.





# Owls Fly Past McLean **And Into State Playoffs**

Silverton's Owls knew what they had to do last Friday night at McLean, and they went right to work to get it done beginning at the opening whistle when they took the kickoff and moved right down the field for a touchdown.

In the coin flip between Higgins, McLean and Silverton which followed the game, McLean lost in the "odd man out" and Higgins and Silverton were left to represent the district in that order because of Higgins' win over the Owls.

Higgins gets Lazbuddie, and the game has been set at Groom at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

The Owls will travel to Amherst to meet Bovina, for the second time this year, at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

Word is that Bovina has gotten much better during the season, and has gotten some injured players back into the lineup that were out when they played in Silverton early in the season. It was in the Bovina-Silverton game that Neal Edwards received his knee injury toward the end of the first quarter when he had already made about 85 yards rushing. Last Friday night, Edwards looked to be near his old form as he rushed for 190 yards on 26 carries.

The Owls made 21 first downs as compared to 12 for the Tigers. Silverton rushed for 323 yards and added 98 yards of passing for a total offense of 421 yards, while the Tigers made 74 yards rushing and 71 yards passing for an offense of 145 yards. The Owls lost the ball via the fumble route

McLean opened the game by kicking off to the Owls. Bradley Brunson picked up seven yards on first down and the team moved to a first down at the McLean 15 on a pass from Kendal Minyard to Brunson. Edwards carried the touchdown with 7:44 remaining to be played in the first period. There was no PAT and the Owls held a 6-0 lead.

Silverton's kickoff was taken by McLean at the Tiger 35, but a loss of four yards on the series was the best the tigers could do, and they punted to the Silverton

The Owls also were unable to move the ball in spite of a completion from Minyard to Edwards for seven yards, and punted away. McLean ran for a first down on the Owl 39, then for another to the Silverton 5. They scored with 2:55 still showing on the first-quarter clock, but there was no PAT, and the score was knotted at 6-6.

After Will Rowell carried the kickoff out to the Silverton 26, the Owls went to work on runs by Edwards and Rowell. Wayne Henderson, who had a good night rushing, picked up a first down on the McLean 33, and on the next play, Rowell went all the way for the touchdown with 1:24 remaining in the first quarter. Henderson kicked the PAT, and the Owls moved into a 14-6 lead.

The Owls kicked off to the Tigers, and as the second quarter opened, Silverton's defense held and forced a punt to the Silverton 28. Rushes by Rowell and Edwards picked up a first down on the McLean 34, and an aerial from Minyard to Denny Hill moved the ball for another first down at the McLean 22. Rowell, who also had a good night rushing, picked up four yards, and Edwards scored with 7:18 left in the first half. Henderson kicked the PAT, and moved the Owls out front 22-6.

After the Owls kicked off to McLean, the Tigers took over at their own 35 and started throwing the bomb again. The Owls were called for pass interference, giving McLean a first down on the 39. Defense by Jamie Frizzell, who was sizzling as usual, set the Tigers for a four-yard loss, but on the next play they passed for a first down to the Silverton 25. On the next play, Edwards intercepted a Tiger aerial on the Silverton one. Then on Silverton's first down, Mc-Lean recovered an Owl fumble in the end zone for a touchdown. There was no PAT, and the Tigers had narrowed the score to

Rowell picked up four yards

McLean 10. Edwards carried the touchdown with 3:04 remaining in the first half. Henderson kicked the PAT, and the Owls moved into a 30-12 lead.

The Owl defense held the Tigers on their next series, and on fourth down when the punt came to the Owls, they fumbled and McLean recovered on the Silverton seven.

From here it was just a chip shot into the end zone, and the Tigers scored with 19 seconds remaining until halftime. They kicked the PAT and narrowed the lead to 30-20. It was nervous time all over again, because it was beginning to look like the Owls were trying to shoot themselves in the foot.

Silverton kicked off to open the second half and allowed the Tigers to pick up a first down on the Owl 16 before shutting them down and getting the ball back on downs on the eight. Henderson picked up 10 yards on first down, and on fourth, needing inches, the Owls moved to a first down on their own 24. A pass from Minyard to Henderson moved the ball to the 36, and McLean was penalized for roughing the passer to give the Owls a first down on the McLean 32. Silverton's next offensive series bogged down in penalties, and the ball went over to McLean on the Tiger 19 with 4:09 remaining in the third quarter.

The Owl defense held and forced a punt which carried to the Silverton 17. Henderson and Edwards combined talents, complimenting one another, for a first down on the 34, and with Rowell's help moved the ball to the McLean 23. Edwards picked up 14 yards as the fourth quarter opened, and a pass from Minyard to Brunson was good for a first down on the Tiger two. Henderson carried the touchdown with 9:04 remaining in the game, the PAT was blocked, and the Owls had moved into a 36-20 lead.

The Tigers came back with a passing attack and picked up some penalties against the Owls which moved the ball to the Silverton 13. They scored with 6:07 remaining on the clock, kicked the PAT, and had narrowed the score to 36-28.

Again the Owls came back to answer the score with Edwards and Henderson picking up a first

down at midfield, and the team moving ahead on a pass from Minyard to Frizzell. Edwards moved the ball for a first down on the McLean one, and Henderson scored with 2:48 still to be played. There was no PAT, and the Owls led 42-28.

On McLean's next series, defense by Frizzell and Henderson held the Tigers to a loss of two yards, and the ball went over to the Owls on the McLean 30 with 1:24 still to be played. Henderson ran for seven yards and Edwards picked up a first down on the McLean 12. The Owls were charging hard for another score and the Tigers seemingly had given up as time ran out in the game.

The celebration that followed was as wild as the one that followed the bi-district game at Higgins last season. No one was in any hurry to leave, because a pre-arranged meeting was to be held between the coaches of Higgins, McLean and Silverton to determine which of the three teams that had tied for the district championship would represent the district in the state playoffs. When the Higgins coach arrived, Coach Jack Shely took his "lucky coin" and joined McLean's Coach Miller (brother of Silverton's ag teacher and assistant coach, Ronnie Miller) for the flip. Each coach tossed his coin into the air, the coins hit the ceiling and came down with all three lying heads up. On the second toss, the coins of Silverton and Higgins lay heads up and the McLean coin was tails, eliminating the Tigers. It was a hard way for the Tigers to end their season after having been undefeated in district play going into the game with Silverton.

Groom beat Lefors 58-12 and Higgins beat Miami 67-24 Friday night, and the final standing in District 2-A was Silverton, 4-1, 7-2; Higgins, 4-1, 6-2; McLean, 4-1, 6-3; Groom, 2-3, 3-7; Miami, 1-4, 3-7; Lefors, 0-5, 3-7.

So the Owls now advance into what will be the most important game of the year. They need all the help and support fans can give them this week and on the road to the playoff game. Make plans now to follow them to Amherst, to pack the stands with red and white and cheer the Owls on to another victory.

# Junior High Owls End Season With Victory Over McLean

Silverton's Junior High Owls made a very exciting game of it when the McLean Tiger Cubs came to call Thursday afternoon of last week.

Steven Cavitt ran to the McLean 26 on first down after the Owls had received the kickoff on their own 37, but on the next play the Owls lost the ball via the fumble route and McLean recovered. The Cubs gained a first down on the Silverton 28, then the Owl defense tightened and on fourth down, needing 11, the ball went over to the Owls on their own 16.

The Owls came back with runs by Cavitt and Casey Frizzell, and Cavitt picked up a first down at midfield with 1:04 remaining in the first quarter. Frizzell raced to the 20, and a pass from Cavitt to Frizzell moved the ball to the McLean 13. On the first play of the second quarter, the Owls picked up a first down on the McLean 8. A pass from Frank Ramirez, jr. to Lance Smith was complete for a touchdown with 5:26 remaining before halftime. Cavitt ran into the endzone for the PAT, and the Owls held a 7-0 lead.

The Tiger Cubs came back and in spite of defense by Cavitt, Ramirez, Frizzell and Wil T Bomar, picked up first downs on the Silverton 33 and two. After holding the Cubs to no gain for three plays in a row, the Owls allowed them to score with 2:21 remaining in the second quarter. They passed for the PAT, and even though it was complete, Cavitt was able to hold the receiver out of the endzone. Thus the Owls still held a slim 7-6 lead.

McLean kicked off and Cavitt took the ball in the endzone and brought it out to the Cub 23. Frizzell passed to Cavitt for a first down on the Silverton 39, and on the next play, an Owl fumble was recovered by the Cubs on the 35. On their first down play, the Cubs fumbled, and the Owls recovered on the Silverton 22. Back in business again, Cavitt went to work and picked up seven yards for the Owls and on the next play McLean intercepted an Owl aerial on the 25.

The Cubs charged toward the goal with Smith preventing a longer gain on the Owl 15 with 15 seconds remaining in the first half. The Cubs scored with two seconds remaining on the clock, there was no PAT, and McLean held a 12-7 lead.

Silverton kicked off to open the second half, and defense by Bomar, Stan Gamble and others held the Cubs to a first down on the Owl 15 and caused the ball to go over on downs on the seven. Frizzell ran for eight yards on first down and passed to Cavitt for a first down on the 22 on the second play. Cavitt ran for 10 and a pass from Ramirez to Bomar picked up a first down on the McLean 33. Then a Silverton pass was intercepted on the McLean 33 with 1:35 remaining in the third quarter.

Defense by Bomar, Cavitt, Ramirez and Frizzell held the Tiger Cubs, and the ball went over on downs to the Owls on their own 35. Cavitt picked up three or four yards on first down and Ramirez passed to Frizzell on second down. Frizzell picked up the first down on the 25, and then completed a pass to Cavitt for a touchdown with 4:19 remaining in the game. The pass for PAT fell incomplete, and the Owls were in the lead again, 13-12. And that was where it ended, with McLean charging hard for another score and Frizzell, Ramirez, Gamble and Bomar working hard to stop them. The Owls got the ball back on downs with 18 seconds remaining, and Ramirez killed the clock.

The Junior High Owls have had a successful season, and have gotten a lot of experience that will carry them over into next year. They will be sending some good players into high school and will have a few back to play again next year.

The eighth graders are Cavitt, Frizzell, Bomar, Dusty Martin, Lance Bradford, Smith, Gamble and Ramirez. The seventh graders are Zane Henderson, Matt Francis, Braden Towe and Lance Holt. All of the boys have gotten to play in most of the games this year.




#### SINGING GROUP RETURNS FROM CONCERT ABROAD


