Senator Earl B. Mayfield To Speak Tomorrow Morning

SENATOR MAYFIELD WILL BE DISTINGUISHED VISITOR DURING THE HASKELL COUNTY FAIR

Senator Earl B. Mayfield, will be one of the distinguished visitors during the Haskell County Fair. He will deliver an address at the Courthouse at 10:30.

His address will be of particular interest to the farmers for the reason that he will deal with agricultural problems and come up before next session. Senator Mayfield has always been at the battle of the farmers. Only recently he made a firm protest to the agricultural department concerning crop estimates, which brought about an investigation, that promises the department estimates, that have been so disastrous in the decline of a few weeks ago.

Senator Mayfield will be introduced by Mr. W. H. Murchison.

Miss Bass Will Judge Women's Work at Fair

Miss Blanche Bass who is in charge of the home demonstration work of Floyd County will assist in judging the women's work at the Haskell County Fair this year. Miss Bass is a sister of J. Horace Bass, Superintendent of the Haskell Public Schools.

The women's department promises to be one of the most interesting in the Fair this year. Miss Gunn, Haskell County's new home demonstrator has been doing some good work along this line since she took up her new duties.

SHOWS COTTON STALK WITH 202 BOLLS

Mr. W. H. Day brought a stalk of cotton to Knox City which has 202 well developed bolls on it. All of these are about ready to open. He says this is a fair sample of stalks thickly growing on five acres of sub-irrigated land of his in the river bottom 10 miles west of Knox City and just out of Knox County in Haskell. Mr. Day says many who have seen this field say it will average two full sized bales to the acre for the five acres. There are 60 acres in the farm but not all is as good as this. The stalk now on exhibit in Knox City is about four and a half feet high and has a spread when standing of about five feet. It is quite difficult to walk through the field where this crop is now ready to gather. D. J. Smith rents the land on which this cotton is grown and it has received an average amount of cultivation.

BUSY WEEK IN DISTRICT COURT

This week has been a busy one in District court, four cases have been tried since Monday morning and another will probably go to the jury this morning.

George Morris, charged with selling liquor, was found guilty and his punishment assessed at one year in the penitentiary. A motion for a new trial was overruled and the defence gave notice of appeal.

Truman Dabney, charged with burglary, was given a 4 year suspended sentence.

Pete Collier, charged with transporting liquor was found guilty by the jury and his punishment assessed at one year in the penitentiary.

Brant Wingham, was found guilty and given two years on a liquor charge.

Joe Mann, charged with burglary is now being tried. This case is a companion case to the Truman Dabney case.

A special venire has been ordered in the Favor's murder case which has been set for October 12.

A venire of 100 men has been ordered in the Conner case. Conner is charged with rape. The case is set for October 25th.

A special venire has been ordered also in the King murder case, which has been set for October 27th. Joe and Walter King are charged with the murder of nightwatchman Beauchamp, here last year.

HASKELL INDIANS PLAY SATURDAY

As announced in last issue, the game which was originally scheduled at Hamlin has been transferred to Haskell as the Saturday feature for the Fair. The game will begin at 9 o'clock Saturday morning and will be played in front of the grandstand on the fair ground.

Coach Dodson reports all his men in good shape for the fray. Unless injuries or sickness develop before Saturday the strength of the entire squad will be available for the game.

The Hamlin game brings the first real test to the Indians as it is the official opening of the inter-scholastic conference race for this district. Reports come that Hamlin will bring a well drilled team and expect to carry back a victory over the Indians. Local supporters believe the reserve and unleashed power of the Indians to sweep the Hamlin team before them. It is generally conceded that the squad never did get going during the encounter with Seymour. Coach Dodson will start his favorites in the game and will attempt to take one touchdown each quarter from the Hamlin outfit.

The big parade will be held this morning at 11 o'clock, beginning at the High School Building and through the business section. The Main entrance gates will be opened at 11 o'clock.

The baseball game between the Fort Worth Cats and the West Texas All Stars will be held at Fair Park this afternoon at 2:30.

Friday morning, Senator Earl B. Mayfield will deliver an address at the Courthouse.

Friday afternoon, the big automobile races will be held on the Haskell County Fair race track.

Saturday morning, a football game will be played in front of the grandstand between the Haskell Indians and the Hamlin team.

Saturday afternoon, the second day of races will be held, with some of the fastest drivers participating in both Friday and Saturday's events to ever take part on any dirt track in Texas.

The big carnival on the Midway will be going to amuse the public for the entire three days.

If the weather is favorable, the officers and directors are expecting one of the largest crowds ever recorded in the history of the Fair Association as nothing has been left undone or expense spared in the way of securing attractions that will please the public.

HASKELL SCHOOLS WILL BE REPRESENTED IN PARADE
