

Commissioners Attend To Routine Matters

Briscoe County commissioners held a rather lengthly meeting Monday, recessing for lunch and continuing the meeting afterward to include approval of bills and line items.

County and District Clerk Bess McWilliams told the commissioners that the amount of hospital and doctor bills the county had paid in connection with a sheriff's investigation had been reimbursed by the defendants.

A road problem in the county was discussed. Several of the commissioners had looked at the problem and said they believed it could be remedied.

The County Historical Commission was reappointed, and for 1989 will include Carrie Dickerson, Murry and Johnnie Morrison, Delene Tyler, Fred and Jackie Mercer, O. C. and Faye Rampley, Joe and Vaughnell Brannon, Fairy McWilliams, Wayland and Flo Fitzgerald, Sharon Pigg, E. A. and Norma Birdwell, Jarus and LaTrella Flowers, Maynard Wilson, Stan and Lynda Fogerson, Jerry Smith and Glenda Francis.

Renewal of the maintenance agreement with GTE was approved, as was the contract with the appraisal district for collection of current and delinquent accounts.

Bond for County Attorney Sharon Pigg was approved.

County holidays approved were Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veterans Day, two days at Thanksgiving, two days at Christmas and New Year's Day.

A Grievance Committee was appointed, consisting of Josephine Cagle, Ronnie Carpenter, Elton Cantwell, Bryan Burson, LaRue Garvin, Mary Frances Ivory, Faye Rampley, Mike Smith and David L. Foster, Gary Chandler was selected as an alternate. This committee was drawn from the Grand Jury wheel for the last term of the district court.

Donations were approved for the Silverton and Quitaque fire and ambulance services and the county library at the same amounts as paid during the previous year. The ambulance services will receive their money annually in the future rather than monthly as in the past.

Employee salaries were reviewed and it was noted that

salaries of most employees are too low. Medical insurance for county employees was discussed. The commissioners approved all salaries to remain the same with the exception of the county road hands, and commissioners were given the authority to give \$50.00 a month raises to these employees as they deem appropriate.

District Judge David Cave met with the commissioners to discuss medical insurance for the district court reporter. Briscoe County's share of this expense was approved.

County Attorney Sharon Pigg presented the budget for her office, and asked \$13,090 in annual salary, \$9,000 for a full-time secretary who would also be a part-time law librarian and \$600 for office supplies. Commissioners approved the salary and a full-time secretary, but did not wish to hold her office expenses to \$600 a year due to there being a multitude of things needed for the office. The late J. W. Lyon, jr. and Tom West used their own office furniture while in the county attorney's office, and this left no furnishings in the new county attorney's office.

Mrs. Pigg stated that there is office furniture available in the courthouse which she can use and this is of no concern to her at this point. She stated that the county law library is in terrible disarray, the files aren't in order, and it will take a lot of work to bring these into usable condition. She stated that she plans to be in the office every Monday unless she is in court, otherwise she will be in the county attorney's office the first day of the week she is available. She also plans to be available half days on Saturdays and on Sunday afternoons, since the county attorney often is needed to handle matters which occur on the weekends. She plans to attend the commissioners' meetings and to make herself available to the county whenever

Treasurer Janice Hill was authorized to roll-over maturing certificates of deposit and to buy a new certificate of deposit. She urged the commissioners who have funds remaining in their precinct accounts to put their money into certificates of deposit to earn higher interest.

Subscription Rates Going Up

Subscription rates to the Briscoe County News are going up. This is due to postage on subscriptions being high, and the further the papers are mailed the higher the postage is.

Local subscriptions will be \$11.50 per year in Briscoe and adjoining counties. Subscriptions mailed elsewhere in Texas will be \$13.50 per year, and subscriptions mailed to other states will be \$14.50.







COTTON TALKS

The prospect of a 9.2 million bale carryover at the end of the 1988-89 marketing year has given cotton interests a common New Year's resolution: Find a way under the current farm program to make U.S. cotton competitive in both domestic and foreign markets.

In the final months of 1988 the American Textile Manufacturers Institute, the American Cotton Shippers Association and the officers and board members of the National Cotton Council's Producer Steering Committee (PSC) each developed proposals to that end. The job now, according to Donald Johnson, executive vice president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, is to consolidate the suggestions of all groups into a single proposal acceptable to all segments of the industry and to the U.S. Department of Agricul-

Johnson attended a January 3 meeting in Nashville, Tennessee, at which the full PSC agreed that the malfunction of the pricing process in current law for the most part is the direct result of the procedure used by USDA to determine the adjusted world

price (AWP).

The AWP is the price at which cotton can be redeemed from the government loan or sold by producers without sacrificing net income. It therefore determines the price at which current farm law makes U. S. cotton available to world markets.

Since passage of the 1985 farm act the AWP has been calculated from an index of world prices published in "Cotton Outlook" by Cotlook Ltd. of Liverpool, England. Cotlook compiles its index from price quotations supplied by cotton producing countries throughout the world.

The problem, Johnson explains, is that the "quotes" used by Cotlook do not reflect the actual price at which the quoting countries are offering cotton for sale. "That means the rigid pricing formula now being used by USDA, in effect, allows our competition to set an artificially high price at which U. S. cotton can be exported."

Among corrective measures considered by the PSC, most favorable comment was heard on the application of AWP adjustments based on U.S. spot market quotes, New York futures and/or actual world market trading prices. However, pending further study the committee stopped short of endorsing explicit actions and adopted a broad resolution urging USDA to use whatever discretionary authority it has to achieve the desired result. The NCC Executive Committee met later in the day and approved the PSC recommendation.




