## Bullock is Urging Abolishment of Tax Permit Fee

State Comptroller Bob Bullock is urging the Texas Legislature to abolish the $\$ 25$ annual sales tax permit fee.
"The fee is inherently unfair to small businesses," Bullock said in a letter to the House Ways and Means Committee, which is considering several bills to repeal the fee.
Bullock said the fee has generated tremendous hostility at a time "the state can ill-afford to tread on the cooperation and confidence of the business community."
"As someone said about Prohibition, it was a noble experiment that didn't work," Bullock said.
