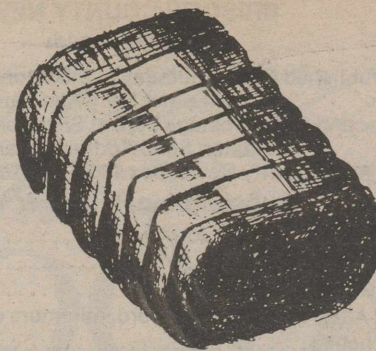
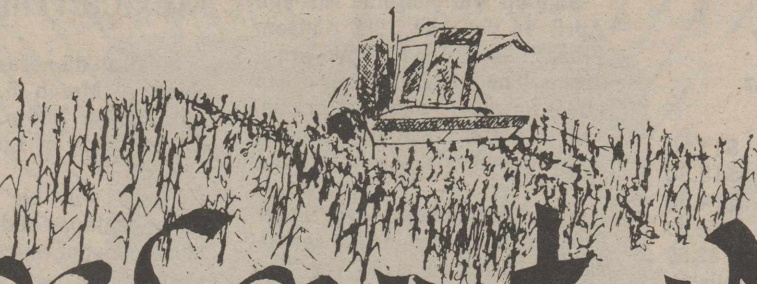

Plan Now For Severe Weather

I spoke with School Superintendent David Cavitt Monday about legislation that is pending in Austin at this time, and he told me that he has strong feelings about most of it.

His number one concern is that we don't want the Legislature to mandate things for the local school district without providing funding. Doing this (as HB 72 did) places a burden on local taxpayers and forces local tax increases to foot the bill.

Secondly, he is hoping the Legislature will pass a finance package that will help the smaller school districts. We need more state support for expenses created by previous legislation that has already been enacted.

A lot of other bills are pending that concern education.

HB 85 needs support so that retirement benefits for educators can be strengthened. The retirement fund is in good condition and can stand the changes that educators desire to see made, Mr. Cavitt believes.

HB 484 would eliminate the TEAMS testing for first graders. This is a good bill, Mr. Cavitt said. He doesn't believe TEAMS testing is appropriate for first-grade boys and girls.

One of the issues you might want to discuss with your representatives is whether you would like to see the school year lengthened. This is under discussion. The school calendar needs to be set early, but board members' hands are tied if there is indecision as to whether the number of teaching days will be increased by the state for next year.

SB 20 would ban corporal punishment (spankings) in Texas schools.

"We don't need a bill to base school funding on student performance," Mr. Cavitt said. "This wouldn't particularly hurt our local school, but I just don't agree with this. Also, we need flexibility to maintain local control of our schools. This has worked very well for many years in the Silverton Schools."

Several of our administrators and faculty members attended a meeting in Lubbock recently and visited with State Representative Warren Chisum and State Senator Teel Bivins about local concerns. "We need input from local citizens to these representatives," Mr. Cavitt said. "They know me and how I feel about specific issues, but they want to

Although tornadoes, severe thunderstorms and floods can strike virtually any part of Texas at any time, spring seems to bring an increase in violent weather.

You can take precautions to assist yourself and your family in the event of a tornado.

Periodically hold a tornado drill so that family members know what to do and where to go if the National Weather Service issues a tornado warning. The safest part of a house during a tornado traditionally is the basement, but be aware of the potential for flooding if there is heavy rain in the area. Interior bathrooms, hallways and closets on the ground floor also offer protection from tornadic winds. Avoid windows and outside walls. Take along blankets or sleeping bags to protect yourself from falling debris and shattering glass, which are frequently the cause of death and injury during a tornado.

Make certain you have a portable radio and several flashlights (and fresh batteries for both) as well as bottled water,

hear from the other citizens."

You are urged to call or write your elected representatives to express your views on impending legislation which concerns education. Mr. Cavitt said he would be happy to discuss the issues with anyone who wishes to have additional information, and would be happy to appear before any club or group to discuss the needs of our school.

extra prescription medications and a first-aid kit in your shelter area.

Remember, if a tornado strikes, electricity, gas, water and sewer service may be disrupted for several days.

Mobile homes and automobiles are dangerous places to be during a tornado. If you live in a mobile home, make sure all family members know where the nearest substantial shelter is. If you are in your mobile home or car and can't get to a better shelter: go outside, lie down in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert and cover your head with your hands. Be aware of the possibility of flooding in low-lying areas. Do not hide under your mobile home or car because both can easily be picked up and carried away by a tornado.

Your local (city or county) emergency management office can provide you with additional information on severe weather precautions. The Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service, the Texas Insurance Advisory Association and the Federal Emergency Management Agency are sources of information and publications on various weather phenomena for local governments.

Long-Term Agreements Must Be Signed by Friday

A sign-up for Long Term Agreements will continue through Friday, March 3.

These agreements are intended to solve conservation problems on a portion of the farm, and the contract period is from three to five years.

Producers interested in a Long Term Agreement cost-sharing program should go by the ASCS office before closing time Friday.

Failed Acreage Should Be Certified to ASCS

If you have wheat, oats or barley for grain that has failed due to reasons beyond your control, the total acres of that crop must be certified, and you must file a disaster application BEFORE plowing, grazing or baling the acreage.

Failure to certify and file before making any other use of the crop will result in the crop being ineligible for program benefits.

Court Decisions May Cost Local Governments

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has alerted local governments that recent court decisions may cost them \$60 million or more in refunds of bank franchise tax money they got in 1985-87.

In a letter to cities, school districts, counties and special districts, Bullock said that banks seeking refunds will look to the local government entities for that money.

The problem comes from court decisions invalidating parts of

the franchise tax law which covers all corporations. The Legislature brought banks under the franchise tax for the first time in 1985 and earmarked the tax money for local governments.

The 1987 Legislature "repaired" the tax law so that the taxes paid in 1988 and the \$40 million expected in 1989 should not be affected, Bullock said.

Bullock told local officials they can expect to see refund requests starting next month.

Many Texans Have Lost Or Forgotten Money

State Treasurer Ann W. Richards said Monday that more than 110,000 Texans have \$60 million in lost or forgotten money coming to them this year.

The 110,000 are named in the 1989 version of the Texas Treasury Unclaimed Money Fund List which will be published statewide on Sunday, March 5 in 19 newspapers.

Silverton's list includes these names: Russell C. Ashley, Norma Birdwell, Norma Lee Birdwell, Mrs. Una Burson Estate, Dorothy D. Crosslin, M. A. Graham, Steven G. Jasper, E. Lee, Gary and Cathey Weaks.

Quitaque's list includes: Billie Tibbetts and R. F. Turner.

"Each year we try to locate as many people as we can and return this money to them," Mrs. Richards said. "Last year about \$22 million was given back to rightful owners."

All listed accounts, other than those from safe deposit boxes, are worth at least \$50 with the largest account worth more than \$177,000. All safe deposit boxes are listed regardless of the value of the contents.

Generally, accounts on the list are from checking and savings accounts, utility deposits, oil royalties, and corporate stocks.

Most accounts must be dormant from three to five years

Your final payment will be 13c per pound. Payments will be in cash, and will be made beginning February 16, 1989.

before they are turned over to the state.

"There is no set time to make a claim on these accounts," Treasurer Richards said. "Money turned over to the State Treasury can be claimed at any time in the future by the original owner or his or her heirs."

Persons who find their names on the list can call the Texas State Treasury on its toll-free telephone line at 1-800-654-3463 or they can write the State Treasury at P. O. Box 17728, Austin, Texas 78745. The toll free line opens at noon on March 5.

During the first few weeks after the list is published, the toll-free line is often tied up by the volume of calls. The lines, however, are kept open for an extended period and there is no time limit for making a claim.

The Unclaimed Money Fund List was first published shortly after Mrs. Richards first took office in 1983 and she has made collecting and returning unclaimed money one of her top priorities.

Since she took office in 1983, the Treasury has collected more than \$209 million in unclaimed funds, which is almost 83 percent of all such funds ever collected in the State of Texas. About 95 percent of all funds returned in the 27-year history of the program have been returned during the six years of the Richards Administration.

Money that is not claimed by owners is used by the state for education and general state services such as highways and law enforcement. Last year, for example, \$30 million in non-tax revenue was turned over to the Foundation School Fund and the General Revenue Fund.

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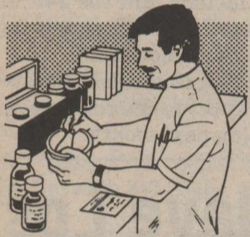

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1989 Farm Program Signup Underway

Sign-up will continue through April 14 for the 1989 Cotton, Wheat and Feed Grain programs. The 0/92 provisions are in effect for wheat and feed grains, and intentions are not binding under this provision as they were in 1988.

Your participation level under 0/92 will be determined at certification, based on acres certified for harvest and acres certified for paid CU.

Payment on CU agreeage will be guaranteed at no less than the estimated deficiency payment rate for the crop.

"Actively engaged in farming" and "person" determinations must be made by the County Committee for each payee before advance payments can be issued.
