

Warning Issued **Concerning Bats**

After the recent discovery of a bat on the courthouse steps, Judge Jimmy Ross has been in contact with Dr. William Rosser, Regional Veterinarian, Texas Department of Health in Lub-

Dr. Rosser urges extreme caution when a bat is found in the daytime hours. Bats are nocturnal, and if they are found on the ground or sidewalk, they are sick, possibly with rabies as they are carriers of rabies.

Young children should be cautioned about the danger associated with picking up or touchpart of the county.




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Next Blood Drive Will be May 16

My daughter lives in Lewisville, and says she can now pay her utility bill with her VISA card. Is this available all over the state?

The program in Lewisville just started in March, but similar programs have been underway for more than a year in several other suburbs around Dallas. The program is not yet available in every city.

The charge card method of payment can be used in Lewisville on a case-by-case basis for paying utility, water and solid waste removal bills, as well as for court fines and fees.

The credit card payment plan is intended for those "hardship" cases where utilities are at risk of being cut off for nonpayment, or when it is impossible to pay a fine by cash or che

The charge is processed like a cash draft against the credit card. Fees are based on the amount of the bill. Customers are informed of the fee before they sign the receipt.


The Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation can help. It is suggested you call them first to see if there are any special circumstances surrounding your title that will need to be cleared up first, such as a lien or conflict of ownership. The phone number is (512) 465-7611.

In most cases, you will need your Vehicle Identification Number, located in your car on the driver's side near where the windshield meets the dash. You will also need Form 34, available at most car dealers or financial institutions. Send the notorized form along with a check or money order for \$2.00 to:

Sales Tax Rebates Continue to Increase

Sales tax rebates in Silverton continue to rise, following the statewide trend. The April check of \$972.88 represented taxes on sales in February, and brought this city's rebates for 1989 to \$6,110.95, 6.55 percent more than had been received for the same period in 1988.

There was no rebate received for this period at Quitaque, and that city's 1989 rebates now total \$3,053.80, down 6.22 percent from the amount that had been received at this time last year.

For the county as a whole, this represents a meager 1.92 percent increase in sales tax rebates, indicating that this area is barely holding its own in that respect.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently that statewide sales tax rebates for the first four months of 1989 are up 13.4 percent over last year's tax allocations for the same period.

While Bullock says that "the economy is in good shape, which is being reflected in our state and local sales tax collections," this is not especially true in Briscoe County.

Sales tax rebates in area cities and the amount by which it was higher or lower than for the same period in 1988 include:

Stocking Important For Farm Ponds

Texas boasts more than 840,000 fish ponds or stock tanks which provide a wealth of enjoyment and recreation. But a good fishing pond does not come about by accident.

A good fishing pond requires planning, knowledge and a lot of hard work. And now is the time to decide how you will manage your pond this year, said Curtis Preston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. By the time the water temperature gets up to 60 degrees F., you need to have your plan in effect.

A key step in pond management is proper stocking of fish, said Preston. Many people believe that it is not necessary to stock fish in a pond as fish will be stocked by waterfowl. This is highly unlikely. First, the chances of a fish getting stuck to a duck's foot are small, and for a delicate fish egg to do so is almost impossible. For a duck to fly to another pond with a fish or egg attached to it and survive exposure to the air is even more unlikely.

Fish will swim into a pond during times of overflow from another pond or stream. But if you want a good fishing pond, you must stock it.

For most ponds or tanks of less than one acre in size, only channel catfish should be stocked, said Preston. For ponds larger than an acre, a combination of largemouth bass, bluegill and channel catfish have given the best results. Crappie or "white perch" do well in large reservoirs but often become overcrowded and stunted in small ponds and tanks.

More information on stocking combinations and sources of fish for stocking is available at the County Extension Office.

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Home Gardeners Need to Plan Insecticide Applications

ound the corner, and with it the need for early preparation against insect pests that are sure to be around.

First, gardeners should inspect insecticides left over from last year to determine if they are still good, said Curtis Preston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Product age and storage conditions must be considered.

If properly stored, most products should have at least a two-year shelf life once they begin to be used, Preston said. Dusts sometimes have a tendency to absorb moisture if the bag is not sealed tightly after each use; they should not be used if

Place bags containing insecticides in a clear, polyethylene bag and seal it with a rubber band to keep moisture out, Preston said.

If dusts are two years old or older and there is any doubt about their storage, dispose of them according to label directions and buy new insecticide, Preston said.

Although liquid materials are not as likely to absorb moisture,

storage is still important, Preston said. Caps should be resealed tightly on the product after each use. Do not use liquids which are cloudy or milky in color or which have sediments on the bottom of the container.

Do not store pesticides on a shelf in front of a window, especially if the window gets strong afternoon sun, Preston said. Do not store liquids in an area subjected to extreme temperature fluctuations. Extremes from summer to winter temperatures may not hurf the active ingredient in the insecticide, but it may damage the ability of the product to mix properly in water.

Preston said if liquid materials are at least two years old and have not been stored properly, monitor vegetables closely after spraying to determine if the pesticides are controlling insects.

It's important to anticipate pesticides that will be needed for the crops to be grown, said Preston. Select insecticides by considering the plants and the period for insect control before repeating the application. This also will affect time from application until a safe time for

Finally, know exactly what is being sprayed on plants and the amount, Preston said. Don't jeopardize plants by spraying first and then checking for possible plant damage.

Where should I invest our tax return?

My husband and I have done some estimating and figure we'll be getting a pretty good tax return this year. I think we should invest some of it, but I'm not sure where to start. What would you suggest?

It is difficult for me to counsel you on where to invest your money without knowing several details, like how much money you want to invest, if you have any money set aside in case your investment does not prosper right away, and what your family income is like.

There are many other factors as well which a competent financial advisor would take into consideration. Your bank or credit union should be able to help you find someone trained in this

field.

On your part, I would strongly suggest you read all you can about various investment strategies, and at least gain a basic understanding of how they work.

Some tried and

true investment advice you may have heard is, "Don't put all your eggs in one basket." Some investments are a lower risk than others, but staying diversified is your best shield to protect your money. No matter what investment you choose, be sure you would still have money to fall back on if you were to lose the entire investment.

My credit union and I are still arguing over a problem I had with my checking account last summer. I'm getting frustrated and would like to resolve this situation. Is there anywhere else I can turn to settle this matter?



Mid-Plains Telephone Annual Meeting Held in Tulia

The annual meeting of the members of Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. was held Friday evening, April 14, 1989, in the Ezra Jones Cafeteria at Tulia High School. President Clint Robinson called the meeting to order and the invocation was given by Steve Barrett of Kress. The members of the board of directors and guests present were introduced by Vice-President Emery Goodin.

Service awards were presented by Manager Danny Johnson. Five-year awards were presented to Ann Thompson, Plant Records Clerk, LaTonda Stout, Capital Credits Clerk, and Kenneth Littlefield, director. Receiving a ten-year award was Larry McCaslin, installer-repairman. Curtis Day received a 25-year award. He is the combinationman and works primarily with the new digital switching in Kress.

President Clint Robinson and Auditor Wade Wilson reported that the cooperative is in a very strong financial position. The year of 1988 was another very successful one. Capital credit checks recently were mailed to the members for approximately \$570,000.00. This brings the total of capital credits returned to the members to more than \$2.5 million. The president stressed that by continuing to upgrade the equipment, the cooperative is able to continue to provide the best possible service of the industry.

In the manager's report to the members, Danny Johnson reviewed the digital office located in Kress. Since the installation, the cooperative has been able to record and rate the toll for the four exchanges that use the switch. This has increased the revenue of the cooperative. Presently, AT&T is the only long-distance carrier that is regulated in Texas. Their efforts are toward becoming deregulated. When deregulation is accomplished, it is expected that toll rates will decrease. Unless useage increases with the lower rates, the revenue of the cooperative will

One way to regain the revenue is to route the other exchanges into the Kress office and rate all of the toll used by the members of the cooperative. This is a long-range plan.

Since the conversion to the digital office, about 10% of the members are using the enhanced services now available. These services are call-waiting, call-forwarding, touchtone, and speed calling.

Three incumbent board members were returned to their positions as a result of the election that was a part of the business meeting. Those returned were Earl Reynolds of Cleta, Emery Goodin of Goodnight, and Clint Robinson of Kress. The other members of the board are Elton Cantwell of Bean, J. L. Whitmire of Elkins, Melton McGehee of Gurley, Victor Harman of Redmon, R. D. Friemel of Umbarger, and Kenneth Littlefield of Vigo Park.



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
