By The Associated Press Russian troops slashed at the rearguard of Adolf Hitler's retreating German armies seven miles west of Mozhaisk Thursday, while in London Air Minister Sir Archibald Sinclair declared the British Army now was organizing "the greatest possible striking force for offensive operations on the Euro-

Sinclair gave no indication whether a British counter-invasion was imminent. London newspapers and other critics for weeks have been clamoring for action, and British officials have frequently mentioned the restiveness of the 2,000,000 Army regulars and 2,000,000 home guards long held in readiness to combat any attack on the island kingdom

WASHINGTON. (AP)—The Navy rushed its Atlantic submarine hunt Thursday with the added responsibility of protecting sea lanes of the entire hemisphere, now united against the Axis in a solid diplomatic front.

Speed As Usual

Business as usual—that's what some people are saying about American industrial production in 1941. According to them, industry didn't change quickly from making consumer goods to making weapons.

Such criticism indicates a lack of understanding of the facts, however. Business was anything but usual during that year. America had no armament industry. Before it could begin making weapons in quantity, it had to build new factories, new tools, develop new skills. It had to start from scratch. But it did start and start quickly to meet defense requirements. The 254 per cent increase in military plane production in 1941 over 1940 can never be called business as usual. The 23 per cent increase in steel production, 72 per cent in motor truck output—these are anything but "usual," in America or anywhere else in the

The record of the past year shows that progress on war orders has been fast. New plants have gone up in record time. Many specific orders have been finished ahead of schedule. The keynote of the whole production job has been speed—speed as usual. That's the only "as usual" there has been in the entire program.

An airplane every four minutes . . . two ships a day . . . a tank every seven minutes. That's the war work schedule President Roosevelt has set for American industry. That's what 125,000 planes, 75,000 tanks and 10,000,000 tons of shipping mean in terms of actual production. Some idea of the size of the job ahead may be had from the fact that the airplane goal is six times our 1941 output.

Even though it's a big job, industry's past record indicates that it's not too big to handle. It will take hard work, of course, and long hours. We'll all have to get along with fewer of the comforts and conveniences we accepted so casually in peace time. We'll all have to make sacrifices and do our share. But, with a continuous flow of materials and the co-operation of all groups concerned, the job can

be done. And it shall be done. That is the important fact. The industrial system that in former years gave us the highest standard of living in the world can now give us the most weapons. In peace time that system was the envy of our enemies. Now in war time it will be their final destruction.





Secretary Joe Dey of the USGA said the setup would be the broadest ever undertaken by his organization and was expected to attract the largest entry list ever compiled for a nationwide competition.

Not only will the tournament and its qualifying eliminations raise money for war relief, but the whole show is planned to further the physical fitness program sponsored by the Office of Civilian Defense.





By William E. McKenney America's Card Authority In winning the national open team-of-four title at Richmond, Mrs. A. M. Sobel of New York won under all ratings, the title of the outstanding bridge player of 1941.

For a number of years Mrs. Sobel and Mrs. R. C. Young of Philadelphia have been rated as the two outstanding women bridge players of the world. This year Mrs. Young won the national open pair title.



Both were members of the national mixed team-of-four. They finished second in the national women's team-of-four, and playing together, they were second in the national women's pairs. But Mrs. Sobel won the eastern pair championship, and this gives her the rating not only of the world's No. 1 woman player, but first place among men and women for 1941.

Here is an example of Mrs. Sobel's ability to defend a hand well. Mrs. Sobell, sitting West, chose the jack of diamonds for her opening lead. Both dummy and East ducked. Declarer led a top trump and East was in.





Stock Medicine Chest; War-Time Casualties May Increase In Home

WASHINGTON. (U.R)— War-time casualties in the home will be something new to the American housewife, and the OPA Consumer division has recognized that fact by preparing a list of items each medicine chest should have.

The basic items of the emergency kit are tannic acid jelly for burns, something to relieve pain, remedy for fainting, plenty baking soda to be used as an emetic or relief of indigestion, a mild laxative, bandages, sterile gauze in sealed packages, adhesive tape, thermometer, a pair of scissors, and a pair of tweezers.
At first glance this may seem an

imposing list, OPA officials admit, but knowledge of the uses to which these things could be put is sufficient to convince the housewife of their need.

Stock Plenty of Aspirin Some suggestions as to specific types of medicines that ought to be obtained are:

Tannic acid jelly for burns "and nothing else." Under no circumstances should greasy of oily oint ments be used, because a physician will have to remove the oil to treat the burn and that is a dangerous and painful process.

Aspirin (five-grain tablets) is a good drug for the relief of pain, but it should be used in small doses

Aromatic spirits of ammonia is recommended for faintness. It should be bought in small quantities and kept well stoppered be cause it evaporates.

Bandages, gauze and adhesive tape should be purchased in small quantities and should not be allowed to become soiled. Gauze should be in sterile, sealed pack-
