Temptations must come to all alike—to saint and to sinner to the high and low, the just and the unjust. The purpose of temptations is to make strong and victorious all who overcome. Into every mind come thoughts that stir emotions of high resolve or base intentions.

Where these thoughts come from we do not know, but daily the mind is tempted by thoughts that suggest noble deeds, or on the other hand, dishonorable actions. To build character or conquer the forces which would drag us down depends upon the kinds of thoughts to which we respond. Every person in times of stress or great emergencies must take stock of self, to find one's way out, and determine the course of action necessary. An illustration of this is shown in the life of Jacob when he wrestled until the breaking of the day-signifying the conquering of self and arriving at the con-scioussness of a great light, or illumination. The result was the changing of his name to Israel, meaning "Prince of God".

The disclosure by a high Washington official that American reinforcements and war equipment are moving into the Western Pacific affords encouragement, although in these hard days results in battle are much more comforting than advance notices

Time is a most important element, and the hope must be that sufficient aid will arrive in the immediate future from America or sure, especially on the Malay Peninsula where the position is increasingly serious for the Allies. 
