Sinks Two Enemy Ships; Batters Others In Attack

British And American Pilots Blast Japan Bombers Over Rangoon

The United States Asiatic Fleet, removed intact from its Philippine base ahead of the Japanese occupation in a masterly display of seamanship, has come through with flying colors—hardly even a scratch on its paint-in a new major encounter with the Japanese

The Navy Department announced Saturday night that a flotilla of destroyers, now based presumably in the Dutch East Indies and cooperating with the Indies Air Force under the Allied Supreme Command sunk at least two ships and battered others with torpedo and shellfire in a night attack on an

The surprise maneuver, which took place in the Straits of Macassar between Borneo and Celebes. was so successful that not a ship was lost. In fact, said the Navy only four men were injured, and only one of those seriously.

The latest Dutch attack, in which a large transport was capsized and two 11 ships hit without the loss of a single plane, and was one of a series of striking Allied aerial op-

Pilot Jacket Is Warmest; As Well As Good Looking

Army pilots, landing at Sloan reward for all. duty, wear short sheepskin-lined jackets. They are snappy equipment, and the civilian is apt to wish he had one for his own use.

Those jackets, however, were not designed for beauty and effect, but rather for warmth. This winter has seen on the Russian battlefront the proof of the need for warm clothing; while in the air service it has always been a necessity, regardless of the season of the year, to wear warm garments, especially at high Since 1929 the Army has conduct-

ed exhaustive experiments on every type of winter clothing. Frank G. Manson, Chief of the Parachute and Clothing Division at Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, tried rabbit, bear, beaver, and even the wolverine, on the basis of wear, moth resistance, and warmth. He found that the sheepskin had no equal. Eliminating all other furs, the

Air Corps began testing fur-tanned, electrified sheep shearling and continued the development of that material. Now it is used excdusively for Air Corps winter clothing. It is produced in varying pile lengths, depending on whether it is to be used for moderate or extreme cold temperatures. The skin part of the shearling is treated and tanned in such a manner that it emerges flame-proof, wind-proof, and acidproof. It serves as an outer shell for the garment.

A natural insulating system is provided by sheep shearling wool. It is easy to spot an insulated house in the winter because snow remains on the roof. Snow does not melt on a sheep's back so the natural insulating qualities of wool

are apparent. Only other material used in Air Corps winter garments is wolf fur. The parka hoods of their Alaskan suits have small strips of wolf fur around their edges. Ice will not accumulate on this type of fur. It is sewn to the edge of the hood to prevent ice from forming when the moisture from the breath

May Get Aluminum From Kentucky Clay

LEXINGTON, Ky. (U.P.) - Aluminum may be extracted from Kenclay if experiments being made at the University of Kentucky are successful.

Arthur W. Hixson, of Columbia University, recently announced a chemical process for taking aluminum silicate out of common clays and has made his method available to the Chemical Foun-

dation of the United States The cost of producing aluminum from high-grade bauxite ranges from \$30 to \$40 a ton. Prof. Hixson said the same grade of certain types of clay found in eastern Kentucky for \$31 a ton.

Intensive Training Faces Bombardier Cadets At School

Coming to Sloan Field directly from a cadet replacement center where they will be "processed" receiving preliminary training in such things as military courtesy, discpline, drill and the like, bom-bardier cadets will find themselves starting on an intensive whirl of training which will continue twelve

At the replacement center, they also will receive their equipment and uniforms. Since these are the same as those worn by officers, all that's necessary when the cadet completes his course is to pin on his insignia and gold shoulder bars and he blossoms into a Second Lieutenant.

Wide Variety Of Studies Training time at the Bombardier College will be divided between air training and ground study. While the actual set-up of the course which teaches young men to operate Uncle Sam's famous bombsight is a strict military secret, it is known to include a wide and comprehensive variety of studies, among which are aerial gunnery and navigation, as well as plenty of time spent in ac-tual bombing practice.

In addition to their studies and bomb dropping, the bombardier cadets engage in a rigorous course of physical training designed not only to keep them in the peak of condition, but also to develop those specific muscles brought into play

in their work.

The cadets first become familiar with the operation of the bombsights through the use of a bomb trainer. This is a device which simulates the action of a plane and enables the student to practice use of the sight without ever leaving the ground.


· McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

There is one title in bridge which cannot be defended. It is the National Amateur Pair Championship the winners immediately become national masters and, therefore ineligible to compete in the ama-

teur event the following year.

I had the pleasure of playing against Raymond Farber when I was in Greensboro, N. C., and was not a bit surprised when he and his partner, Hal Oliver, were



announced as the winners of the National Amateur Pair Championship at Richmond. Farber plays a splendid game and if given an opportunity to compete in national tournaments, would have a good chance of carrying off one of the titles. Here is an example of Farber's play.

Farber, sitting South, responded to two spades with three no trump in order to show 1 1/2 honor tricks. North's leap to six looked natural enough, since he could count four honor tricks in the combined hands outside of the spade suit, which in itself was probably good for five tricks.

East took the ace of clubs on the first trick and returned the jack, which South won. Let me note in passing that this is the sort of hand on which many players will now claim twelve top tricks -five spades, five hearts, the ace of diamonds, and the king of clubs. Then a defender has to remind the claimant that it is possible for both hearts and spades to be adversely stopped, and a bitter argument ensues on the law governing "deals not played out.'

Farber realized that a bad break in either major suit could beat him. He therefore first cashed the spades, where he had four tops.

For the last six cards. South held five hearts and one diamond. East had to save four hearts and two diamonds. His discard of the three of clubs, three and ten or diamonds, made it clear to Mr.

Farber that he held four hearts.

The next lead was the ace of hearts, followed by the ten, which





Sloan Field Encircled By Thousands & Of Wells In Vast Permian Basin

Bombardier College In Center Of World's Most Extensive Oil Province

"It will be interesting to officers and men of Sloan Field to know that they are operating a bombardier training college right in the center of the greatest oil field in point of area in the world. The officers and cadets will wing their way over thousands of oil derricks, and see thousands of men and machines busy bringing to the surface the oil that will propel the giant bombers.

There are producing oil wells over an area covering roughly a 150-mile radius from Midland, even extending over into New Mexico at the southeast tip of the state. Called Permian Basin

This area is called the Permian Basin, deriving its name from an mmense land-locked sea which exsted some 350 million years ago. As that sea dried up it deposited source rocks which have been found to be especially prolific for the accumulation of oil. The chief production has come from deposits of the Permian age, although cil is found in much older formations underlying the Permian beds. These deeper strata include the Pennsylvanian, the Silurian and the Ordovician, all laid down eons before the existence of the Permian sea

Nearly 20,000 oil wells, ranging in depth from several hundred feet to more than 9,000 feet have been drilled in the Permian Basin, and new pools, particularly in the deeper horare being discovered with great regularity.

Oil was first discovered in West Texas in Mitchell County, in 1921, but the real start of West Texas bid for top ranking among the world's great fields had its inception in 1923, when the late Carl Cromwell and Frank Pickrell, pio neer wildcatters, drilled in the first well in the Big Lake field in Rea-gan County, south of Midland. Three years later the Permian Basin was firmly established as an oil empire with the bringing in of the mighty Yates Field in Pecos County, and the Hendricks Field in Winkler County. 


