American Warplanes Down Dive-Bombers

Britons Wildly Cheer Arrival Of Second AEF Vanguard In Northern Ireland; Another Jap Ship Sunk

By Roger D. Greene, Associated Press War Editor.

American battle forces dominated the news on farflung war fronts Tuesday as Britons wildly cheered the arrival of a second AEF vanguard in Northern Ireland, and, halfway around the world, U.S. planes and submarines slashed at the remnants of a once-powerful Japanese invasion armada off Dutch Borneo.

In the Philippines two American pursuit planes shot down two Rising Sun dive-bombers and disabled a third in the last 24 hours, and American torpedo-boats engaged

Pressing home Japan's first major defeat in the sevenweeks-old conflict, American and Dutch forces already had sunk or damaged 34 Japanese warship and troop transports in the shark-infested Strait of Macassar. The running battle continued into its fifth day Tuesday.

Japanese warship, believed to be a battleship, was sunk in Macassar Strait.

Imperial Tokyo headquarters acknowledged that four Japanese transports were lost in a battle last Friday during landing operations at Balik Papan, rich oil center on the east cost of Dutch Borneo, facing Macassar Strait.

Skidding On The Parallels

Drawing historical parallels is like sliding down the front walk on a frosty morning-it's fun, but it's danger-

The parallelism between the present German retreat on the Russian front and that of Napoleon in 1812 is so attractive, so neat, and so alluring to wish-thinkers, that a great deal of good white paper has been spoiled in exploiting it. Look how easy it is:

Napoleon and Hitler each invaded Russia at almost the same time of year, hoping for a quick campaign which would lav the enemy low before the rigors of winter.

Napoleon took Moscow in early September, but the city was burned and he had to withdraw. His retreat, disrupted by poor discipline and bitter weather, harassed by Cossacks and army pursuit, became a disastrous rout, and an army of more than 400,000 men had been pulverized to fewer than 25,000. Nevertheless, Russian pursuit stopped at the Nieman river.

Hitler, invading at the same time, carried not merely a column into Russia, but a front from the Baltic to the Black Sea. He. too, advanced with success, but failed to take Moscow or Leningrad. He, too, was overtaken by winter and retreated, losing considerable quantities of material.

But there are differences that seem more important than the similarities. For instance, by Jan. 10 it was all over with the Grande Armee, whereas it is now late January and the German line is only now falling back on Smolensk, roughly the half-way point. 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
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

If West held both the six and five of spades, then her false card, intending to discourage another lead which North could ruff, would give her a second spade loser anyhow. If she had one remaining small spade, the false card would also give up a trick for no apparent purpose. Finally, South decided that with a singleton spade, North would have doubled four hearts.

South shifted to the ten of clubs. West won with the queen and led trumps. When South was in again, he led the other club still hypnotized with the notion of avoiding the spade lead which he thought would give Mrs. Rutherford an extra entry to dummy.

But now at last the object of the false card was disclosed. Mrs. Rutherford won with the jack of clubs, took out trumps and reached dummy with the jack of spades to cash two more clubs for dia-mond discards. Thus she lost only one diamond and made her con-




