A three act comedy play entitled "Rube and His Ma" will be given at Rose Chapel house Thursday night June 10th. No admission will be charged.

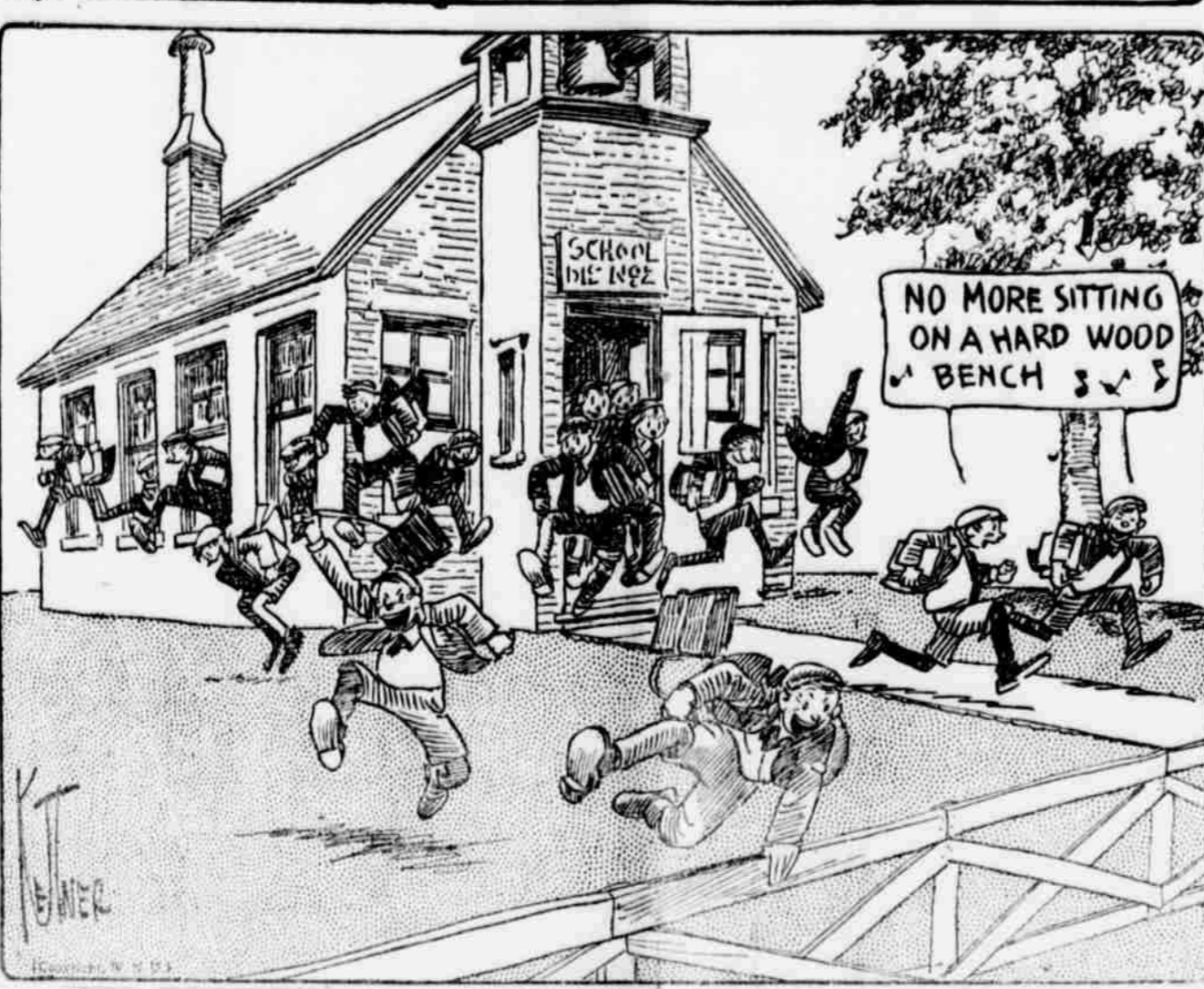
Christian Sunday School Wins In Recent Contest

Insects and pests of various kinds are making their appearance in many sections of Haskell county at the present time and farmers are advised to keep close watch for signs of damage, remembering the old adage "an ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure."

Local infestations of the grasshoppers are to be found in many sections of the county and these pests are being successfully controlled by the use of the poison bran mash, the formula for which was run in a recent issue of this paper can also be obtained from all drug stores in the county as well as from the county agent.

The web-worm or "Careless worm" is reported in some fields of the county and it is evident that damage may be expected from this insect to cotton.

Where migrating the beetles can be stopped with a fair degree of satisfaction by plowing a double furrow with the landside next to the area to be protected. If post holes are then dug at intervals in the bottom of these furrows, the beetles will collect in them and can be killed by the use of Kerosene or with a blow torch.

Melion lice or "honey dew" will soon appear doing damage to melons. For these, spraying with nicotine sulphate often called "Black Leaf 40" or dusting with nicotine dust has proven effective.

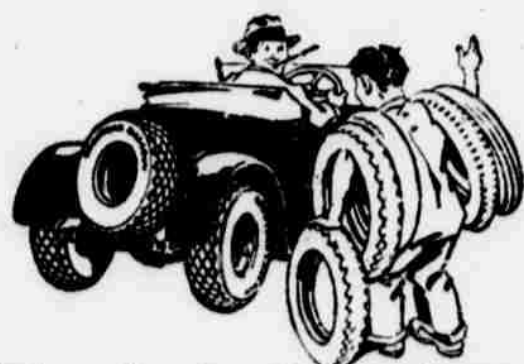
