"But the federal coordinator has recommended not less than 1,510,600 barrels daily for March. In the face of such licenses, and forms for p. m. (9:10 p. m. CWT) were received Tuesday morning.

The Bureau of Mines, is issuing the order and supplies, and in li-censing Mrs. Noble to issue the licenses, warned that these porvisions are part of the war-time acts of Congress and must be closely adhered to by all concerned. It further warned that violations of the provisions of the act, or any rules thereunder shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$5,000 or by imprisonment of not more than one year, or by both such fine and imprisonment

The licenses are issued to manufacturers, to distributors, to storage firms; to those who use the explosives, or have possession of them for any purpose. In other words, all sives must be licensed. Stores and dealers, foremen on jobs, or warenouses in which explosives are stored must have these licenses.

The forms provide for an itemized and accurate record of all explosives received, sold and used in the county; showing the kind, the ingredients; date of sale, storage or use, and other information.

# They Have Forgotten Pearl Harbor

Washington had his sunshine patriots and Lincoln his copperheads. Today we have a new and equally obnoxious breed-alse front patriots. They erect with loud talk and a great fan-fare of activity a magnificent structure of patriotism. But it falls flat with the first stiff breeze because it has a false front.

Specifically these big talkers and small doers noisily buy defense bonds and stamps one day and very quietly cash them the next. Obviously this sort of thing is about as helpful to our war effort as is Herman Goering.

For instance, the Cleveland postoffice reported defense stamp sales of \$274,093 one week but it gave back \$75,900 to persons who did not wish to keep these stamps or trade them in on defense bonds. This was a net sell-out of Uncle Sam, General MacArthur, Admiral Nimitz, the thousands of front line fighting and the millions on the home front of 27 per cent.





# McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

At any time that you follow suit capable of providing. with, or discard, your lowest card of a suit, you say to your partner, "I have no reason to ask you to lead this suit!" Many beginners think this response means "Don't lead this suit!", but the notion is erroneous. The "negative response" of the lowest card means, "I have no reason to direct your play-use your own judgment.'

The "positive response" is the play of an unnecessarily high card, when making no effort to win a trick. It says, "Partner, continue this suit, or lead this suit when you get in," or "I have a stopper in this suit," according to circum-

Some players believe that the positive response always shows a high card in the suit. This is not necessarily so. The response is a command to partner, "Please let me direct the defense at this

Usually you ask for the lead of a suit only if you hold stoppers in it, but not always. Sometimes it is very vital to command your partner to lead a suit because your side has no tricks in it and nothing to lose, while some other lead might wreck a stopper.

When your partner has led a low card and you must make an effort to win the trick, you do not have the opportunity for indicating your wishes. But you do have a chance to give him an idea of your top strength in the suit.

An important principle here if you are going to play a card from a sequence, play the lowest of the sequence. Note that this is just the reverse of what you should do in leading.

The blind lead of a queen shows that you do not have the king but that you do have the jack (unless the suit is very short). In following suit with a queen, on the other hand, you positively deny having the jack, but you may have

By following with the lowest of a sequence, you frequently enable your partner to infer that you hold the higher cards, by observation of what card is forced from declarer's hand to win the trick (or by the fact that he does not win



When Congress voted the wage-hour law, the nation understood that one of its aims was a limitation on hours. to snread employment. The goal now is to get more-not less-work from every American.

It may be contended that the 40-hour week is no restriction, that all an employer has to do is to tell the men to work, say, 48 hours—and pay them time and-a-half for the extra 8 hours.

This 50 per cent pay increase adds to the manufacturing cost. It means a bigger war bill which the nublic-all of us—has to nav. And this in the hour of peril when we are all being told that we must sacrifice.

The government urges the employer to work longer hours as a natriotic contribution, then insists that he pay a 50 per cent penalty on overtime.

How do American workers feel about it? This much is certain: No truly American workers would quibble about time-and-a-half if he knew his extra hours might help even of the battle on Bataan.

The work week is between 55 and 60 hours in Great Britain. It is between 60 and 70 hours in Germany.

This is war. Every American must work as many hours as compatible with maximum efficiency. He should be paid for every hour, at his regular pay rate. The 40-hour overtime penalties-like excessive profits-are holding back the war effort. For the duration, they must go!

To preserve this reading, we lead the deuce, not the ten, from 10-9-3-2, against no trump.

Some players for the same reason prefer the lead of the deuce from holding No. 52. But this is pressing a principle to extreme. After all, we lead the ten from 10-9-8-2, 10-9-2 and 10-2, none of which has a higher honor.

It would seem better in leading from any short holding to try to indicate at once that it is short, rather than to try to save one situation in which the ten-lead is necessarily ambiguous.

I am frequently asked if it is correct to lead the middle card from certain three-card holdings. What usually happens is that my correspondent, a Mr. A, has seen such a lead made by Mr. B, and upon being questioned, Mr. B insists that the middle card is the only correct lead Mr. A then writes to me, I have to reply that the lead may be correct for Mr. B but probably is not for

The reason for this answer is that in certain parts of the country, the players use a convention called "the three-card echo." involves a different system of leads from short holdings and a different system of responses.

If you are using this system in all its phases, then it is correct for you to lead a middle card, but it is foolish to single out one point of the system, practice that, and expect to be understood by the vast majority of players who use the system of leads I have out-lined in these articles. I do not want to argue the merits of the "three-card echo" as against the more universal system, but I do say that the player has to follow one system or the other in its en-





# How you can help save telephone lines needed for vital war calls

As THIS CITY speeds its part in the war effort, more telephone users here are making more telephone calls than ever before.

That's fine. We're glad that telephone calls help speed defense. By all means make all that are needed to get this vital job done.

But please remember that telephone calls travel on paths of copper. And much of the copper, rubber, aluminum, and other materials ordinarily used to expand the telephone system to handle a mounting flood of calls must be diverted in vast quantities for the manufacture of planes and tanks and guns.

You can help save copper for war needs, therefore, by so using your telephone that greatest efficiency is obtained from telephone wires, cables, and switchboards already in place.

## Here's How You Can Help

L. When asked to take a party line, please remember that in sharing the line you are helping conserve copper. Also, you are helping to make telephone service available for others who need it.

2. If your social calls can wait, it would help if you make them outside the rush hours. The telephone system here carries its heaviest load of calls-many of them defense calls-from 9 to 11 in the morning. Spreading this load will help save equipment.

3. Always look up the correct number. You will save time and help keep the lines clear for other calls.

4. Between 7 and 8 p. m. many soldiers and sailors are talking with sweethearts, wives, and mothers back home. If not too inconvenient it would help and you will get faster service, if you make your evening long distance calls AFTER 8 p. m.
