What does the war mean to you? How will it change your life? No one can look into a crystal ball and see reflected there the days and months ahead. Yet certain facts are clear, and clear enough, to outline the future before us.

Rubber and sugar are being rationed now; tin cans are getting scarce. Industry has stopped turning out automobiles to speed up plane production. In the golden dreamland of plenty that is America such shortages have been rare within the memories of most of us. We've been a prodigal people, secure in our industrial skill and superior.

Now that the war years are upon us, the dreamland is bound to change. Civilian sacrifices are just beginning to march toward us over the horizon. Many more will follow. We've got to face that fact. We'll have to change our lives in drastic ways to win this war.

The majority of Americans already realize this. 





But when we turn to the first question, what suit to open, we find it impossible to lay down rules.



Bridge would be a much easier game if we could always infer the best lead (the lead we would choose if we could see all four hands) from the sight of one hand and in-ferences from the bidding. All that we can do here is to point out some of the factors that the leader should weigh in making his choice.

One factor is a principle impor-tant in all defense, caution in cashing aces and kings. These high cards held by the defense often stand in the way of the de-clarer's developing enough tricks for his contract. They give the defense time to attack the declarer's weakness, and therefore should not be led out without careful consideration.

In today's hand, West might lead the king of hearts in order to "take a look at dummy," as the saying goes. But this look would the declarer his contract against any defense.

In clubs West has a solid sequence that can develop a third-round trick. West should open the queen of clubs to develop this trick before his ace and king of hearts

Impossible as such a situaion may seem, it is yet within the ealms of likelyhood, so far-reaching are the effects of a wartime economy on normal conditions.

Harvest Now On There is as yet no shortage of mi-grant farm labor. People in the northern states may not realize it, but the harvesting of the 1942 farm crops of Florida, Texas and California are on the market. Strawberries, first of the berry crops, are beginning to appear in some quan-

tity. Early vegetables are being shipped in carload lots.

From now on until Maine potatoes and Michigan and Washington state late fruits are picked, there is a steadily swelling of activity in the form lands which city dwellers, sitting down to their shortcake and cream, seldom think about. Farm labor scouts from the canneries have been looking over the situation, and they report enough hands n sight for this season's operations.

Not too many, but enough.

Department of Agriculture's marketing service keeps an eye on this situation, too. They report findings in terms of index numbers which give a picture of the whole country. A year ago, they put this surplus farm labor supply at 85. Today it is 64. A year ago the demand for farm labor was put at 86. Today it is 94. The demand for farm labor has gone up.
