# Stanolind 1 Stinnett May Open Second Pool In Vicinity Of Lubbock

Lubbock County's second oil pool ppeared in prospect Monday as Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. Stinnett logged porosity and saturation in the Clear Fork, lower Permian, dolomite.

The well encountered top of the porous, stained zone at 4,685 feet. First core was pulled from 4,711-25 feet, recovering 13 feet of anhydritic dolomite with oil saturation and scattered bleeding. The next core, from 4,725-40 feet, was fully recovered and described as anhydritic dolomite slightly stained with oil but also bleeding oil and water. Stanolind was coring ahead in the test and planned to pull another core at 4,755 feet. No. 1 Stinnett is more than six miles southeast of



## Allied Counter Blows Upsetting Invasion Plans

By Clyde A. Farnsworth AP War Editor.

Sustaining their counteroffensive on the invasion approaches to Australia, the airmen of the MacArthur command struck Monday at the Japanese right wing in Dutch Timor after having wrecked some two score of the enemy's planes in operations over the week end.

Despite the heavy losses, mostly hard-to-replace fight er planes, the Japanese sent a bomber and fighter force against Port Moresby Monday in what Australians admitted was the heaviest attack of the war on that city. Adding to this toll of Japan's air strength, a supplemental Australian communique said one and possibly two Japanese pisnes were destroyed in their attack Monday on Port Moresby, and a third was reported

Wyndham in Western Australia.

An Australian communique said that a Japanese fighter was shot down during a reconnaissance over Dutch Timor, about 300 miles off Northwestern Australia, and that Japanese positions there at Dili were bombed. The results of the bombing could not be observed.

What response to give naturally depends upon the particular situation. I will show a series of these situations to indicate the various factors that govern the response. Each defender has to figure out for himself what this logical plan is, but the responses are a means of communication whereby the defenders can pool their information and so aid each other to get a correct picture.

Today's hand shows a simple situation. East does not know West's exact honor holding in diamonds. nor his length. But East does know that he has no high card to support a continuation of the suit. He

# WPA Laborers To Be Put On Farms,

SAN ANTONIO (A)-WPA workers who are qualified for farm work must accept offers of agricultural employment at prevailing farm wages, whether or not this pay equals the WPA wage scale, H. P. But both A&M and Baylor are Drought, state administrator, declared Monday.

Reporting that misunderstanding of this pliase of WPA policy has arisen in some areas, Drought said that WPA will not keep on the payroll any worker who refuses any reasonable private employment offer at prevailing wages.

"Just so farmers are paying the same amount of wages which other farmers are offering for comparable work in the same locality, WPA will make available all qualified workers on its rolls a their request," he declared. "Although it is believed that most farm labor prices this year are at least equal to the bare subsistence wage paid by WPA, it is not necessary that any farmer's wage be any higher than those paid by other farmers in the community for his offer to be considered a 'reasonable' one."
