

According to President G. C. Collum of the Texas Band Teeachers Assn. the Western Division of the Texas Band Teachers Assn. met at Amarillo March the 6th., with forty band leaders present and a meeting of splendid value resulted.

Many changes were made in the rules governing band contests; such as permission of members to participate in the contest, so long as they are regular boni-fide members of the band, and meet with the band three fourths of the rehearsals. Various other changes were made stated President Collum not of interest at this time but of value, indeed

\$3,500 has been subscribed by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for prizes this year. A new feature in the judging has been decided upon. Two of the judges will be concealed, they will not be able to see the band, only hear it: the third judge will see the band and pass upon the discipline only. Judging from the increease experience previously in the number of bands entering these contests each

year it is expected that fifty bands will be on hand for the contest at Amarillo stated President Collum.

The increasing attendance of bands at the contests should be convincing evidence of two things. First, the steady growth and stability of the Texas Band Teachers Assn., Second; the increasing interest in bands in general in West Texas. It is noticeable indeed, and very pleasing, as well, stated Mr. Collum, that West Texas is supporting bands more strongly than ever before and each year we find larger and stronger and very active bands at West Texas points worthy of every compliment, the band as well and especially the people, who are taking more interest and supporting them. either by tax plan through the city or the subscriptions or thru the Commercial organization, as Haskell does, he said.
