Texas Baptists To Raise Relief Fund

DALLAS (P)—Texas Baptists were called on Thursday by Dr. W. W. Melton, executive secretary, to give \$40,000 on Sunday for the relief of "hungry, suffering, freezing, starving people in war-ravaged lands of Europe and Asia."

Dr. George W. Truett, Dallas, chairman of the Baptist World Emergency Committee which authorized a \$300,000 appeal to all the churches of the Southern Baptist Convention, said "the needs were so imperative that the foreign mission board has already sent forward sizeable sums, at the committee suggestion, in order to save human life, without further delay."

Dr. Melton said the call is more urgent because "the prolonged assault of Japan on China has reduced most of the country to direst poverty. Hundreds are dying daily of starvation and hundreds more of disease, due to lack of nourishment. Our missionaries have not escaped the pangs of hunger or the oppression of our foes."

Purchaser Must Return Old Tube To Get New Toothpaste, Other Articles

Midland merchants Thursday said that they must have in exchange an empty tube, of any kind, when a customer purchases a tube of shaving cream, toothpaste, or other "tubed" item. Exchange does not require a tube from the same commodity, but any tube may be turned in for any other type of merchandise in tubes.

WASHINGTON (P)—The War Production Board Wednesday prohibited retail merchants from selling tooth paste or shaving cream in tubes to any customer who fails to turn in some type of used collapsible tube for each new one purchased.

The provision, first of its kind and effectively immediately, makes retailers responsible for the trade-in transaction and directs that the used tubes thus collected be held subject to WPB orders.

New Restrictions
At the same time, the board placed drastic restrictions on future use and production of collapsible tin tubes and prohibited their use entirely for foods, cosmetics and most toilet preparations.

Under the terms of the trade-in provision, a WPB spokesman declared, retailers are liable to penalties prescribed under the second war powers act—a maximum of \$10,000 fine and a year's imprisonment—if sales of tube tooth paste or shaving cream are made in violation of the order.

Purchasers will not be required to exchange a used tube of the

same type as the tube being purchased.

It was understood that the used tubes eventually would be reprocessed and allocated back to the tube manufacturers—possibly representing the entire supply of tin they can expect for the duration of the war.

Difference in Tubes

The order provides that tubes containing 100 per cent tin may be used only for certain medical ointments and pharmaceutical preparations, while tin-coated tubes must be used for tooth-paste and shaving cream.

Here is a typical passage:
"Shall I raise my partner's suit?
"Or, shall I show my own suit?
"Or, shall I maybe bid no trump?
"This is the vexatious problem which is forever upsetting our peace of mind."

Then follows a lucid discussion of the principles involved, illustrated with sample hands. In today's deal, North's hand is quoted from the book. The recommended response to one heart is four hearts.

"If the spade suit were shown and a raise to game in hearts were made on the next round, responder would be showing at least two honor tricks. Opener might try for an unsuccessful slam. The immediate and pre-emptive raise to four hearts denies two honor tricks."

Notice how easy that bid makes it for South to pass, despite his strong hand. Since North cannot have two aces, nor the ace of diamonds and king-queen of spades, a slam bid is out of the question.

Texas Universities And Colleges Supply Many FBI Men For Hoover

WASHINGTON (P)—Thirty-two Texas universities and colleges claim the distinction of supplying the Federal Bureau of Investigation with one or more of its special agents or highly trained clerks.

There are 3,300 special agents employed under FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, among them are 170 who took their major college training at Texas institutions. In addition to the special agents, 54 clerks in the agency took their college training largely of entirely in Texas, raising the total number of FBI men coming from Lone Star State schools to 224.

These men are scattered all over the globe, covering enemy espionage

and subversive activities generally, as well as looking into the routine illegal operations that occupy their attention in normal times.

From the University of Texas came 94 of these FBI employees. Baylor University supplied 32, Southern Methodist University 19, North Texas State Teachers College, at Denton, 9, East Texas State Teachers College at Commerce, and Texas Christian University, 7 each.

The FBI does not disclose how many of its men are stationed at various offices scattered over the country and globe. There are four offices in Texas, at Dallas, Houston, San Antonio and El Paso. There

may be a few Texans assigned to their home state, but usually an FBI man is stationed elsewhere as a matter of practice in the earlier years of his service.

The personnel of the FBI has quadrupled since war broke out in Europe in September of 1939.

Because of the diversity of work performed by special agents it is often essential to the successful solution of a case that agents have a fluent speaking and reading know-

ledge of foreign languages and be experienced in many phases of industrial, commercial and professional life.

Varied fields of activity were pursued by these FBI men before they entered government service. Some were auto racers, newspaper men, business executives, brokers, bankers, and cowboys. Two had been experts in hypnotism. Just which of these pursuits had been followed by the Texans was not disclosed by

FBI officials in furnishing data on FBI men hailing from Texas.

More than 170 young men of former football fame now are with the FBI. Among them are several Texans, including TCU's great pair of All-Americans, Dave O'Brien and I. B. Hale.

Special Agent E. C. Wenig, now stationed at Dallas, was selected by Knute Rockne in 1920 for an All-American team. He then was playing with Morningstar College, Sioux

City, Ia. Later he became one of the pioneer players in professional football, joining up with the Green Bay Packers.

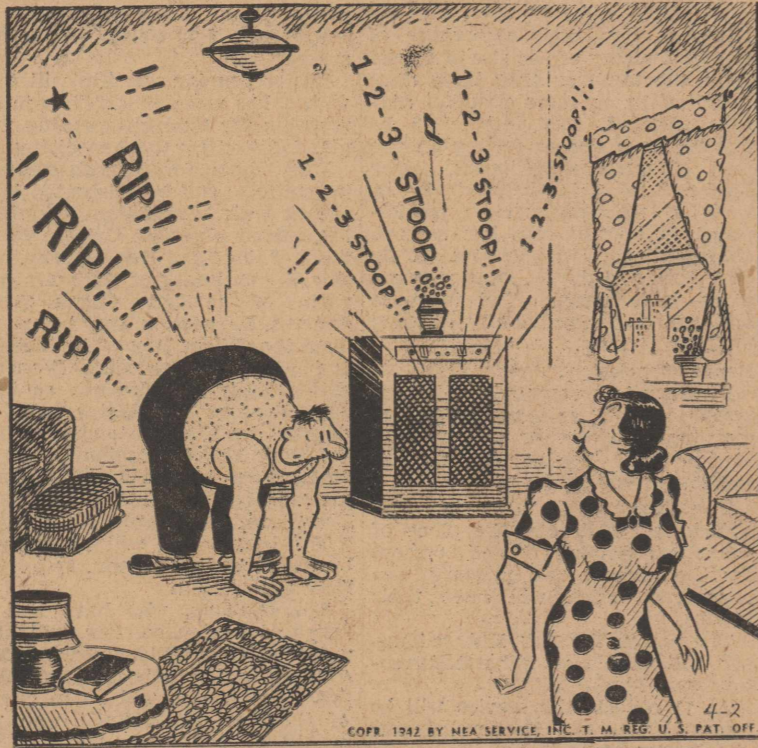
Other Texans now with the FBI who once played football include: George M. "Jack" Langdon, TCU; Ralph H. Winton and J. H. Davis, both of Baylor; F. H. McIntire, University of Texas.

The average age of members of the Bureau's Investigation personnel is about 30. The minimum age

requirement for entrance into the service is 23, the maximum is 35. Approximately 58 per cent of all FBI agents are married. Seventy-one per cent had legal training and 11 per cent were expert accountants before they entered the service. Nearly all have college degrees. The beginning salary for a special agent is \$3,200 annually.

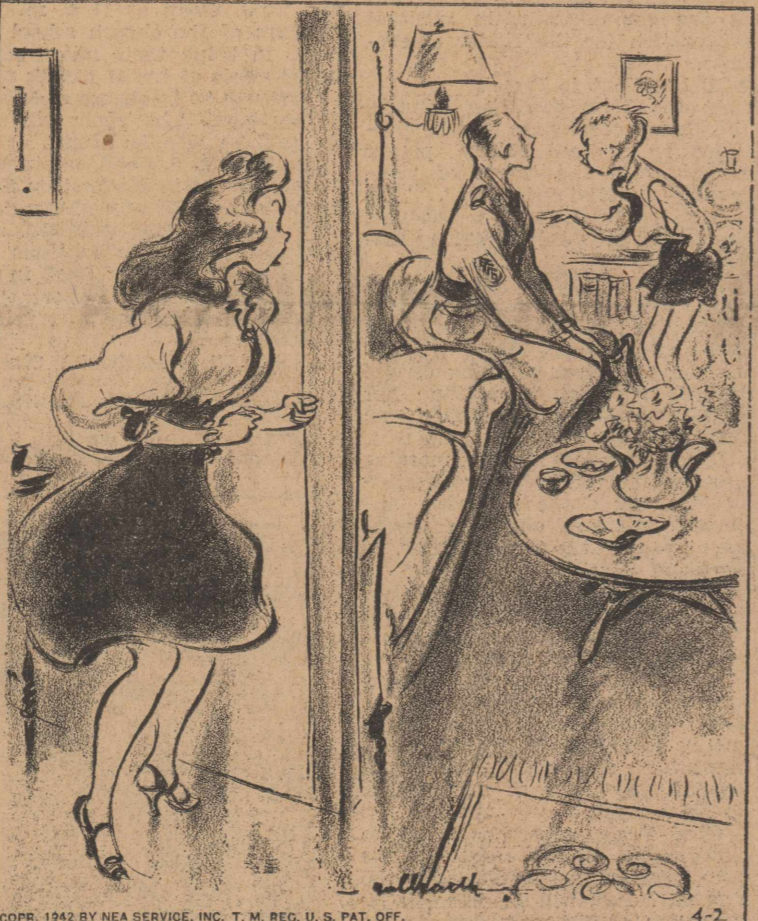

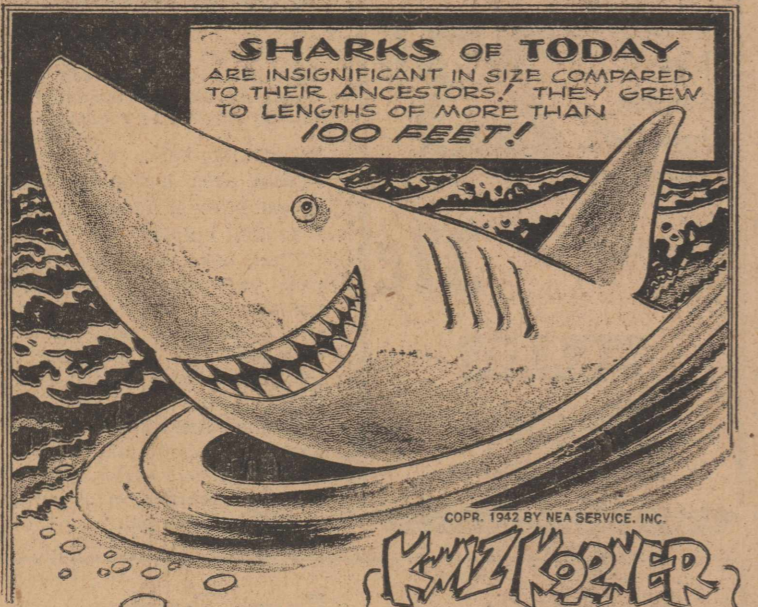

Weekly completions appear to have found a level at just below 300 as those reported last week totaled only two fewer than the previous week.

One state in which activity remains at last year's level is Arkansas. At the meeting of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission held at Little Rock last week, there were numerous comments about Arkansas' excellent conservation law and it was obvious that these were not merely kind expressions intended to gratify the host.

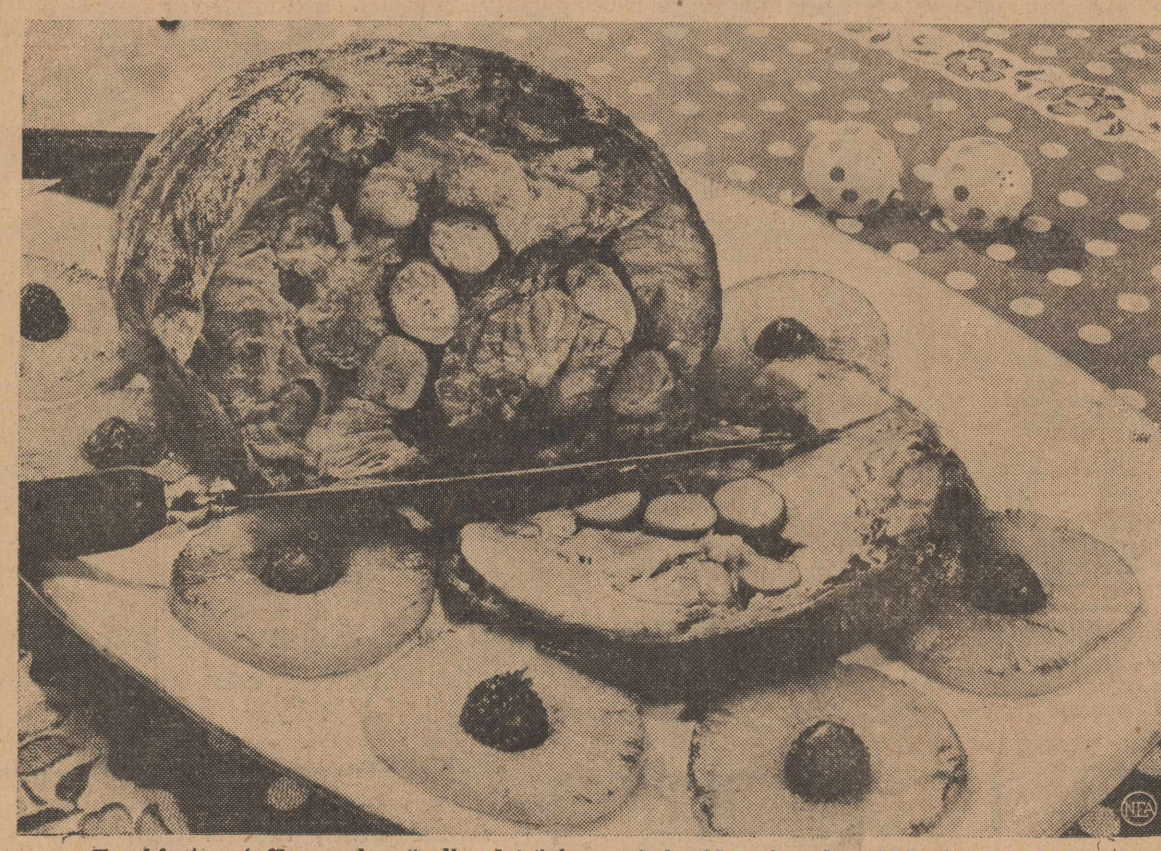
This does not, however, present the whole picture. Arkansas is fortunate in having much of her fresh production coming from fields whose development started under modern methods.

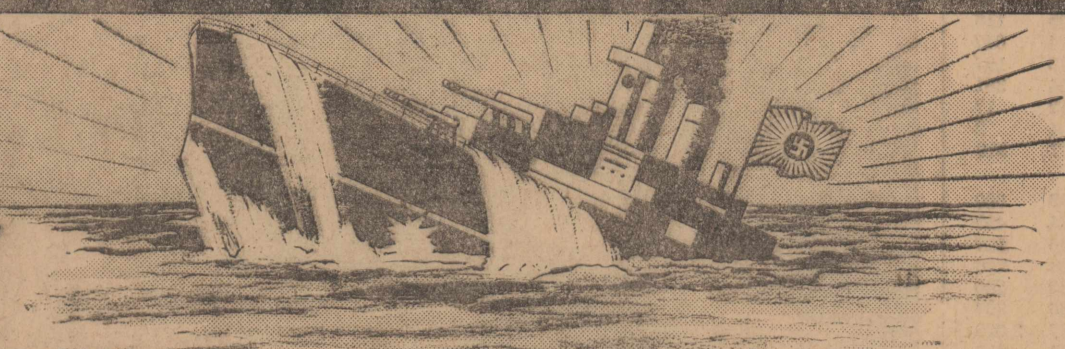

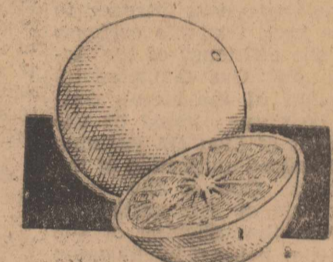

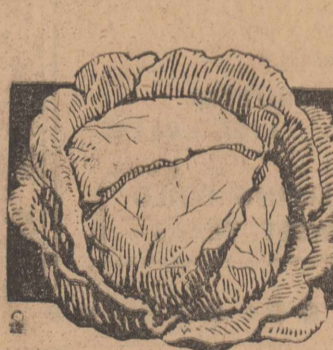
