

"Shall I raise my partner's suit?" Or, shall I show my own suit? 'Or, shall I maybe bid no trump? "This is the vexatious problem which is forever upsetting our peace

Then follows a lucid discussion of the principles involved, illustrated with sample hands. In today's deal, North's hand is quoted from the book. The recommended response to one heart is four hearts.

"If the spade suit were shown and a raise to game in hearts were made on the next round, responder would be showing at least two honor tricks. Opener might try for an unsuccessful slam. The immediate and pre-emptive raise to four hearts denies two honor tricks'

Notice how easy that bid makes it for South to pass, despite his strong hand, Since North cannot have two aces, nor the ace of dia-monds and king-queen of spades, a slam bid is out of the question.
