

Why We Are Rationed

The American people are indulging in unrealism today which is going to add to the unpleasantness of tomorrow. Even after Pearl arbor, Bataan, Singapore, Burma, we insist upon pampering ourselves with the narcotic of wishful thinking.

Specifically, to take current illustrations, there are the matters of automobiles and of sugar.

With all that has been said and written, the average man still appears to believe that the tire shortage will be relieved soon by a huge output of synthetic rubber; that there is no need for severe restriction upon gasoline, and so this will be lifted as soon as a few dunder-heads in Washington have been rebuked.

The same is true of sugar. We have been told, truthfully, that enough sugar is available to fill our national sweet tooth to overflowing. There are stories, believed if not true, that in Puerto Rico sugar cane is rotting uncut.

Tires, gasoline, sugar are banned or rationed because there is no other way of beating Hitler and the Japs. In all probability they will be banned, or rationed until the war

He who plans on any other basis is blowing soap bubbles of the flimsiest type. He'll be very sad when they burst. Everybody realizes that tires are cut off because we can't get rubber to make more. As for synthetics

We're so short of steel, already, that we're struggling to keep armament and munitions production booming We are forced to divert some of that steel to construct plants

in which to make enough synthetic rubber for military use. Is it sensible to suppose that any sane government will pull more steel out of war production, just so we can have tires for pleasure automobiles?

Everybody knows this country has more petroleum than we can use for generations to come.





The end of the month finds him without enough money, to leave the post. He has many friends and so he borrows off the more thrifty of them. Now he is spend-

Skimp until you're ahead of the game and then spend rationally. You can eat better spending next month's pay . . . But you can sleep better spending only this month's.



Handle Food To Retain All Its Values

The American homemaker today must be "pound" wise as well as penny wise, wasting neither precious food values nor precious cents.

The Stephens College home economics department shows us how to keep losses of food constituents at a minimum.

1. Moderate cooking tempera-tures should be used for all foods high in protein such as liver, lean meats, fowl, fish, glandular meats, and cheese.

2. Foods high in fat should not be subjected to temperatures high enough to produce smoking. 3. Starches should be cooked a

long time in the presence of moisture to swell the starch grains, or at a low temperature to dextrinize the starch without burning it. 4. To preserve minerals, cook foods in a small amount of water

and retain the cooking water for sauces and soups 5. Handle foods carefully. Store foods rich in vitamin A and C in
