Chinese Situation Very Grave, As Japs Continue Drive Into Burma

We have to face exceedingly bad news from Burma in the further Japanese successes which have enabled them to get a foot squarely in China's back door and increase the already grave threat to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's fighting machine.

By cutting a bloody swath through Lashio the Japs have secured the great supply depot that marks the beginning of the famous Burma Road which winds its solitary way through the mountains to the Chinese capital of Chungking and has been China's lifeline to the outside world. Lashio's rail communication with the Burmese port of Rangoon had, of course, already been severed but control of this entrance to the Burma Road would be essential to any plan for moving Nipponese forces into China over this route.

Allies In Grave Place

The Japanese thrust to Lashio also places the defending Allied forces in the Mandalay sector in a dangerous position by threatening them with envelopment. However, word from headquarters of Lieut. General Stilwell, American commander of the Chinese forces, is that he is prepared to fight for every inch of territory. He is getting yeoman's help from the American Volunteer "Flying Tigers" who have continued to give the Japanese heavy punishment.

The persistence of the Japanese in this major drive through Burma makes it clear that they are bent on completing their conquest of China as an integral part of their scheme for a new order in Eastern Asia. The Chinese military position now is more serious than ever, owing to the severance of supplies through Burma, the loss of the Burmese petroleum fields upon which they were dependent for the oil without which no fighting machine can run successfully, and the men-

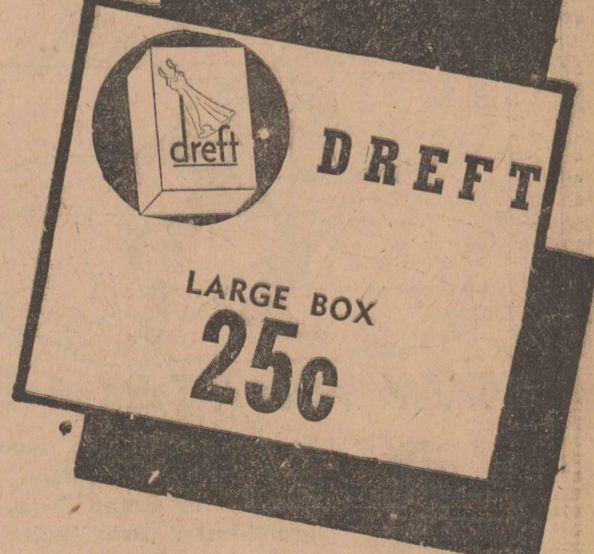
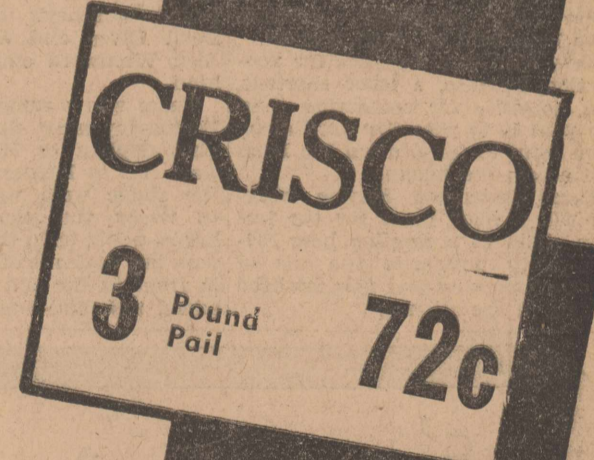

Crowell To Rebuild; Homeless Housed In Churches, Schools

CROWELL (AP)—The dazed citizens of this West Texas town vowed Thursday that they would build a better and more enduring community upon the ruins left by a tornado which took the lives of nine persons and injured 125 or more.

Gazing sorrowfully at the desolation wrought by the tornado and the fire that followed it, Mayor C. T. Schlagal declared: "This town has taken an awful licking. We're all dazed but the citizens of Crowell will rebuild their town, better than ever. They're that kind of people. They can take it on the chin, hard, and come back fighting."

Mayor Schlagal announced he would call a mass meeting to begin what he believed would be a five-year rebuilding job.

Homeless persons slept Wednesday night in the Methodist and Christian churches, and 400 spent the night at the school. Many of them took breakfast with the Red Cross on the town square.

Electricity and gas service were still cut off, but the water system was expected to be restored Thursday. CCC and WPA workers were arriving to join volunteer workers in the tremendous clean-up job.

No mass burial services were planned for the victims. The mayor estimated that 98 per cent of Crowell citizens suffered injury, property damage, or both. Only a few buildings stand and virtually all of these were damaged. It was estimated it would cost \$1,500,000 to replace the loss.

The Red Cross provided temporary facilities for 1,500 homeless. Hospitals and homes in adjoining towns took care of the injured, at least 30 of whom were in serious condition.

Service men stood guard over the battered and fire-blackened ruins to prevent looting.

Mr. Van Velzer, who was 76, had lived at Sapulpa about 25 years going to Weleetka to be with his daughter, Mrs. Vic Robards, about two weeks before his death.

He is survived by a son, Everett Van Velzer, and two daughters, Mrs. Robards and Mrs. Cummings.
