The 27th annual meeting of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists was held in Denver, Colorado, during the week of April 20-25. This was a joint meeting with the Society of Exploration Geophysicists and the Society of Economics Paleontologists and Mineralogists. It was attended by some 800 geologists 25 from West Texas and New Mex-

The most important subjects of discussion concerned the place of these organizations and their members in helping to win the war. Report On Survey

On Tuesday, April 21, the Association's National Service Committee presented its report of its first year of service under the chairmanship of F. L. Aurin. Of the guestionnaires sent to the 3,500 members of the Association about 2,600 have been returned and classified.




