# Divide Allied Farewell Party For Men Armies; Strike Leaving Midland Friday South China

Guerrilla Warfare Now Raging Behind Lines, As Chinese Dispersed

CHUNGKING (P) — Japanese treeps invaded China's Yunnan Province Tuesday after driving up Harper, Inc., oil firm operating in the Burma Road and crossing the shallow Wanting River, 670 miles

from this capital, a military spokesman said. Bitter fighting is in progress in the area around the border town of Wanting, still in Chinese hands, the spokesman reported.

He declared that destruction of the Chinese section of the Burma Road, which winds through sheer mountains and gaping gorges, had not been necessary but that the Chinese would carry out their scorched earth policy if necessary.

(The Japanese claimed their air force already had carried the war far into Yunnan Province with a heavy raid on Yungchang, about 100 miles inside the province where the Burma Road crosses the upper reaches of the great Mekong River. # Manila Bay Forts Are Surrendered To Japs, After Heroic Defense

About 7000 Men And Women, Starved, Wornout By Long Fight, Fall Into Jap Hands, After Withstanding 300 Air Raids, Bombardments

WASHINGTON-Corregidor has fallen.

The doughty American-Filipino troops, who held the isand fortress for 28 days after the loss of Bataan despite sustained air bombardment and a shattering cross fire of heavy shore batteries from both sides of Manila Bay, finally were forced to yield to an overwhelming Japanese landing attack.

Surrender of the battered rock was announced in a laconic communique from the War Department which said States has been informed that that terms were being arranged.

"x x Resistance of our troops has been overcome," said the announcement.

"Fighting has ceased and terms are being arranged covering the capitulation of the island forts in Manila Bay."

Just how many survived the weeks long ordeal of air raids and artillery bombardments was not known, but it was generally estimated there were about 7,000 men and women altogether on the fortified islands.

These included a naval detachment originally consisting of some 3,500 Marines and Blue Jackets, who made their way through shark-infested waters to Corregidor when Bataan was abandoned on April 9, and a group of Army nurses.

Since December 29, when 35 Japanese bombers subjected Corregidor to a three hour attack, that island alone had had 300 air raids. For the most part, sharp shooting gunners in the fortress kept raiding bombers at such high altitudes that

their aim was ineffective. The final, long-awaited attempt to storm the island was preceded by a day which saw the fortress bombed 13 times and shelled almost continually for five hours.

You probably have heard about certain government restrictions on telephone service and equipment now in effect. We should like to tell you a little more about these restrictions - why they are necessary, and what they will mean to you.

The reason for them is simple and complete. They are to save materials which are needed to fight the war.

What will they mean to you, the telephone user?

If you have a telephone now, they mean no change except that in many Texas cities affected by war growth you may have to have other parties on your line. And, in all cases, you can't get an extension telephone in your home if you haven't one already.\*

For people who have no telephones and want them, or for present users who move to new locations, we shall supply at least party-line service wherever there are now

enough lines and switchboards. But in general, where new construction of this type would be necessary, we shall not be able to provide service.\*

This will mean inconvenience and perhaps hardship to a few people now. As time goes on it will probably mean inconvenience and hardship to more people, but we need your help and sympathetic understanding in this important step to save the maximum of materials for the war.

Beside the great savings in materials already made by substitution and wartime engineering, the new restrictions will mean that more lead, iron, steel, zinc, copper, and rubber used in telephone equipment will now go into arms.

In spite of all this, and while telephone service may not be available to all who want it, we believe we can keep the service up to a high standard. At any rate, we shall do our level best. These difficulties are something that neither the government nor the telephone companies can help. They are part of the price of protecting liberty.

# **United States Airmen Strike Telling Blows**

Three Attacks Within Few Hours Devostates Principal Jap Airport

NEW DELHI, India. (AP)-Forty Japanese planes were destroyed and 25. others badly damaged by a heavy United States bomber squadron which struck early Wednesday in its second successive raid on Mingaladon airdrome just north of Rangoon

Three flights of Major Gen. Lewis H. Brereton's bomber force in India delivered the attack Wednesday merning, starting fires that could be seen 70 miles away.

Their bombs smashed into the fire-blackened Japanese hangar and gasoline dump, left wrecked by the two previous flights of bombers the night before.

The raid was the seventh in the lower Burma area since American fliers began their aerial offensive from India April 1.

#### **RAF** Also Attacks

The RAF, timing its blows with the American attack, struck anew at barges bringing Japanese war material and perhaps troops up the Chindwin River on the Burma front 400 miles to the north.

The Americans met strong antiaircraft and fighter plane opposi-tion, a U. S. Army Air Force headquarters communique said, intimating that Mingaladon was perhaps the chief of all the Japanese air bases in Burma.

The communique said the first flight of bombers started many fires and caused explosions and a second flight increased the destruction and spread the fires so that a








