Representative Jed Johnson, (D-Okla) chairman of the group, said he would introduce the bill im-

Decision to offer the legislation came after representatives of cotton growers in Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico failed in appeals to Agriculture Secretary Wickard for a readjustment of cotton quotas.

Tom W. Cheek, President of the Oklahoma Farmers Union, said the legislation was "a matter of getting 4,000,000 acres alloted acreage into production, with each state to stay within its own allotment.
