Here is one of the interesting hands that came up in their game recently. While it was not a spectacular hand, I was much impressed by the accuracy in detail displayed by all four ladies at the table.

On the opening lead declarer, after some thought, played low from dummy, and East played the ten, which held the trick. She then cashed the king of diamonds, and a third round forced out the ace, dummy discarding a heart. A spade was led for a finesse of the nine, which fell to the ten. East led back the queen of hearts, a well-considered effort to clear an entry to the West hand. South jumped up with the ace to lead another spade. On a finesse of the jack, East held up the ace, to force declarer to guess how to continue. Declarer led a low spade. East won then led another heart. On the spades East was then forced to discard her last heart. Declarer took an accurate count of the hands, figured that East had been dealt four clubs, finessed against East and so made the game.

### Home-Guerillas Receive Praise

WASHINGTON (AP)—A proposal to organize American sports rifle- and skeet shooters into small guerilla-like home guard units similar to Britain's Wednesday was reported under official study in half or more of the states. The National Rifle Association advanced the proposal to governors and adjutants general, asserting that "millions" of men who own weapons and are disqualified for active military service would be more effective than existing state guard units in coping quickly with sabotage and surprise enemy raids. C. B. Lister, association secretary, said "sporting rifles and shotguns would be effective enough in the hands of men who have undergone a minimum of training and are subject to emergency calls to safeguard particular 'target areas' near

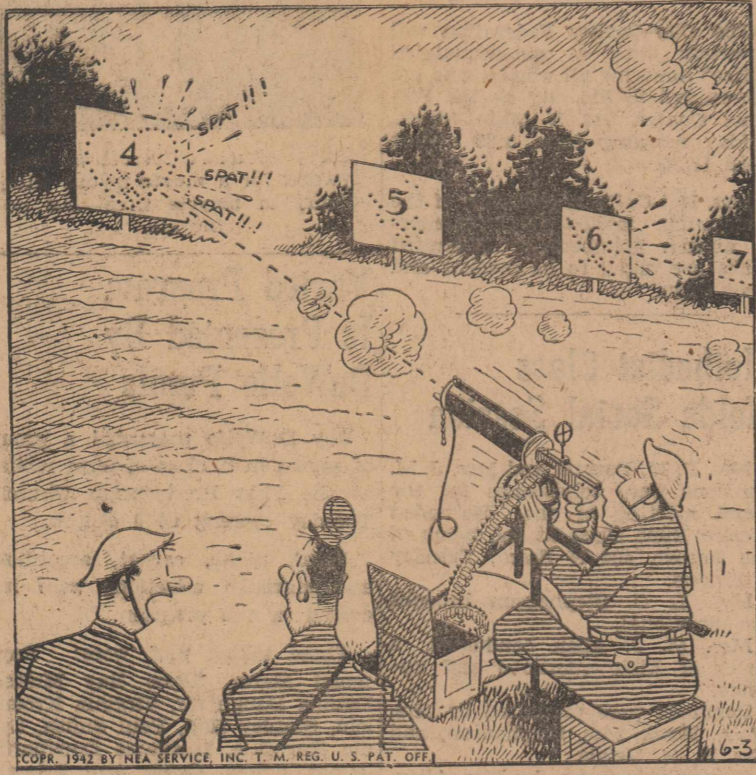
### Candidates Told No More Tires For Race

FORT WORTH (AP)—State OPA director Mark McGee called upon Texas office-seekers Wednesday to forego political rallies and campaign speaking tours this summer in order to conserve rubber. He warned that rationed tires are not to be used for political campaigning and said county rationing boards will not grant authority to replace other tires so used.

McGee's warning was directed particularly at the prevalent practice of holding a series of political rallies in each of the larger counties, attended by candidates and their followers and held usually at points that can be reached only by automobile. These rallies, he said, should be discontinued.
