



The object of this extraordinary duck is to shut West out of the lead forever, so that the spade king cannot be picked up. De-clarer has three losers at least, one in spades and two in clubs. One club loser can be discarded on a top heart. But two tricks will be lost in spades unless dummy's clubs can be cleared for more discards. If a club trick is lost to West, a spade lead through the king will set the declarer at once.

By letting the heart queen win the first trick, declarer can later discard two clubs on the ace and king of heart's, then establish the clubs by ruffing, without further loss of the lead. Two long clubs give two spade discards.



Short Season, No Spring Training Zeller Requests

DETROIT (A)-The Detroit Tigers came to bat with proposals that the baseball season of 1943 be reduced by two months and that the Southern spring training program be abandoned.

Offering each as a war measure, general manager Jack Zeller of the Tigers said he would present his ideas to the annual midsummer meeting of the American League club owners in New York July 6.

One dovetails into the other, Zeller said, with the spring training to be carried on in the park at home during the period which now constitutes the first month of the playing schedule. Under Zeller's plan, the season also would finish a month carrier. a month earlier.
