

28 Indicted For Conspiracy Against Nation; Tried To Obstruct War Work

Jap Troops Gain New Foothold On Coast New Guinea

GENERAL MACARTHUR'S HEADQUARTERS, Australia (AP)—The Japanese, in the first aggressive thrust toward Australia since their smashing Coral Sea defeat, have gained a new foothold on the southeast New Guinea Coast, 100 miles across from the vital American and Australian garrisoned Allied outpost of Port Moresby.

Under a terrific bombing and strafing assault from cccvppppp pyppshrdl shra Allied planes, the enemy put ashore a force of between 1,500 and 2,500 troops Wednesday at Gona Mission, near Buna on the Papuan Peninsula southeast of Japanese-held Salamaua.

General MacArthur's headquarters announced this landing, in an area where there are no Allied forces. (Continued on page two)

Big Boost In Tax Bill, Now Before Senate, Is Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary Morgenthau called for a two and one-half billion dollar boost in the tax bill Thursday with a warning that only bold taxation could bring America a sound economic future.

He appealed to the Senate finance committee to increase the house-approved \$6,271,000,000 tax measure to a minimum of \$7,700,000,000. He pointed out that the schedule of war spending for the current year has been stepped up by \$14,000,000,000.

"If the House bill were to become law," he said, "it would be necessary to borrow from the public during this fiscal year about \$3,000,000,000."

Morgenthau's Proposals
Compared with the House measure, Morgenthau asked new individual income taxes be boosted from \$2,872,300,000 to \$3,228,000,000; additional corporate taxes, including excess profits, increased from \$2,589,200,000 to \$3,347,700,000; revised excise taxes to be raised from \$816,800,000 to \$1,253,700,000; and changes in estate and gift taxes to produce \$316,100,000; and removal of "loopholes" to bring in another \$601,500,000.

Of most importance to the general public, Morgenthau requested a scale of personal income exemptions of \$600 for single persons, \$1,200 for married persons, and \$300 each for dependents. The present law is \$750, \$1,500 and \$400, and the House voted for \$500, \$1,200 and \$400.

Wants New Excise Taxes
Morgenthau also asked again for new excise taxes on soft drinks, candy and chewing gum, and increased rates on beer, wine, cigarettes, gasoline, oil, and transportation. He proposed a new tax of 5 per cent on freight and express voted by the House.

The secretary reiterated requests for mandatory joint income tax returns by married couples, repeal of percentage depletion allowances for oil companies, and repeal of income tax exemptions on interest from state and municipal bonds.

AUSTIN—(AP)—James V. Allred, campaigning for the U. S. Senatorial nomination, challenged the Texas voters to "write and ask the boys in the service if the war is an issue in this campaign."

Slamming home his theme of "win the war and win the peace," the former governor loosed a blast at isolationism and deplored what he termed the "desperate efforts of a beaten and defeated man to belaud the issue by wild charges affecting my honor and integrity."

Asserting "I shall not reply in kind to his charges," Allred declared "my record as Attorney General, as Governor and as United States Federal Judge sufficiently answers these insinuations against me."

"If you want an answer to the stupid assertion that the war has no place in this campaign," he shouted, "ask the thousands of patriotic members of the Texas Democratic Party."

Magnolia 1 Glenn Crane Test Finds Ellenburger High

A high top of Ellenburger, lower Ordovician, was credited Thursday to Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 D. K. Glenn, Southwestern Crane County wildcat about three miles equidistant between the Sand Hills field of Crane and the Abell field of Northern Pecos County.

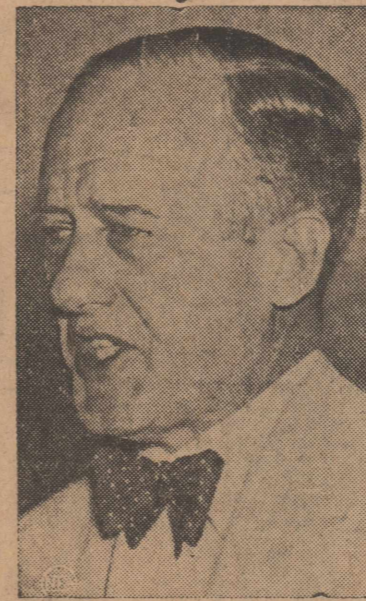
With elevation of 2,436 feet No. 1 Glenn topped the Ellenburger at 5,258 feet. This reportedly is 744 feet higher than the Ellenburger was found in Continental Oil Company No. 1 Jones, nearest producer in the Sand Hills, and correspondingly higher than a majority of the Abell wells which have penetrated to the Ellenburger. No. 1 Glenn logged base of Permian at 5,250 feet and drilled eight feet of detrital material identified as reworked Simpson, middle Ordovician, before entering the Ellenburger.

A 30-minute turntable test from 5,250-65 feet returned four feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil, gas or water. Owner is preparing to core ahead below 5,265 feet in dolomite.

Extending the Abell field one-quarter mile south, Tal-Vez Oil Company No. 2 Hal Burnett flowed 80 barrels of oil per hour after gun-perforating 5 1/2-inch casing with 120 shots from 5,305-20 opposite the McKee sand, upper of two producing sands found in the Simpson in that particular pool. Total depth of the well is 5,779 feet in Waddell, lower Simpson, sand. At last reports it was shut in awaiting potential gauge.

Lower Castile Discovery
Opening West Texas' first production from the Lower Castile. Pure Oil Company No. 1 Paul Le Gros, west offset to the discovery well of the Chancellor Delaware pool 20 miles southwest of Fort Stockton in Pecos County, flowed 395 barrels of oil by heads through 7 1/2-inch casing on 12-hour test made Wednesday. Testing continued. Accumulating oil flow was an estimated 2,500,000 cubic feet of gas per day. The well is bottomed at 5,072 feet in calcitic anhydrite of the Lower Castile, entered at 3,560 feet. It still lacks several feet of penetrating to the Lamar or black lime of the Delaware Mountain series.

Funeral services for T. A. Fannin, who had lived in Midland more than 36 years, were held Thursday morning at the First Methodist Church, with Rev. Carl Clement and Rev. John E. Pickering conducting the services. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Fannin; a son, Oliver W. Fannin of Fort Worth, and three grandsons, Oliver, Bill and Bob Fannin.

Mr. Fannin owned and operated a drug store here for many years, until his recent retirement on account of poor health, and had been active in all kinds of civic work. In 1931 when the county board of education was formed, he was elected first chairman of that group and had held that position all these years, until his death. He had taken a great interest in the development of rural schools, and had led in the development of the Midland County units.

Three Musketeers Of U.S. Air Force Pledge Teamwork

The greatest combat team on earth, the "Three Musketeers" of the airlines saluted each other and pledged their undying devotion to their nation and their allies Thursday, when the largest class of bombardiers today graduated from the Midland Army Flying School. Here to take part in the program were a navigator and a pilot, who with a bombardier, compose the team which mans the bombing planes.

The post theater was crowded to capacity, as three young lieutenants, who soon will ride the airlines together, talked of themselves as a team, pledged their full cooperation, one to the other, and spoke of training which they have received in preparation for front-line duty.

General I. Davies, in command at the school, spoke briefly, and awarded the commissions to the bombardiers. Lieutenant Colonel John K. Brown awarded the wings.

Lieutenant David A. Olds, navigator, from Kelly Field, spoke first, pointing to the fact that the United States is equipped with the best bombsight, and has the best planes, and the best pilots.

"You bombardiers are the best in the world," he continued. "No bomber can be effective without you, and without a good and a unified crew. You bombardiers are the deadliest weapon in the world, and we other members of the bomber crew salute you and pledge you our complete cooperation. We shall operate as one, as a team which will strike with deadly effect."

Lieutenant Charles S. Price, a pilot, and also from Kelly Field, then pledged that the pilots were ready.

"The pilot is no longer an individual," he declared. "He is a member of a team; and he is ready. The pilot now has a greater responsibility." (Continued on page two)

Thirty Publications And 28 Organizations Named In Conspiracy

WASHINGTON (AP)—A federal grand jury has indicted 27 men and one woman in ten states for conspiring to break down morale in the Armed Forces and thus "obstruct and defeat the war effort."

The indictment, returned secretly after nine months' investigation, was announced Thursday by Attorney General Biddle as it was opened in federal district court here.

The lone woman defendant is Mrs. Elizabeth Dring of Chicago, who was mentioned in the indictment as having used as an alias the name Rev. Frank Woodruff Johnson.

Russia Faces Gravest Crisis In Its History

In this war's second battle of Rostov and in other bloody mass engagements farther up the meandering course of the lower Don, deep within the North Caucasian territory, Russia fought Thursday for her life and preservation of the liaison with her Allies, through the Caucasus and the Middle East.

Amid clamor both in Britain and the United States for diversionary action by the Allies, Sir Stafford Cripps, Britain's lord privy seal, implied publicly that Britain had some impending measure in mind.

But the nature of the supposed plan remained a secret which Sir Stafford gave the British House of Commons to understand the Churchill government would not estimate "even to 615 people" the membership of the House.

German invasion forces, by Russian acknowledgment, menaced Rostov from positions only 20 miles to the northeast and Stalingrad from positions about 100 miles to the west.

Against a middle section of the lower Don, roughly halfway between Rostov and Stalingrad, the enemy strove to cut his way through the river line into the trans-Caucasus region, oil and mineral treasure house of the Soviet Union.

The Germans declared their forces reached the outskirts of Rostov Wednesday trying to repeat from another direction last November's swift but short-lived conquest of that city guarding the Estuary of the Don. Berlin said the advance continued Thursday.

The Vichy radio quoted Stockholm reports as saying that the Germans had commenced "a massive attack" on Stalingrad, an industrial center at a lower elbow of the Volga just east of the big bend in the Don. Whether this meant that the Germans were striking at Stalingrad's immediate defenses was not clear, but that seemed unlikely.

At the Egyptian end of the Middle East lifeline the British Commonwealth's army of the Nile was unofficially reported to have progressed. (Continued on page two)

WASHINGTON (AP)—Air-minded congressmen are asking Admirals and Merchant Marine chiefs whether a manufacturer capable of carrying big cargoes on trans-oceanic flights.

They are studying a proposal by Henry J. Kaiser, West coast ship-builder and engineering authority, that several existing shipyards be devoted to construction of giant flying boats, capable of carrying big cargoes on trans-oceanic flights.

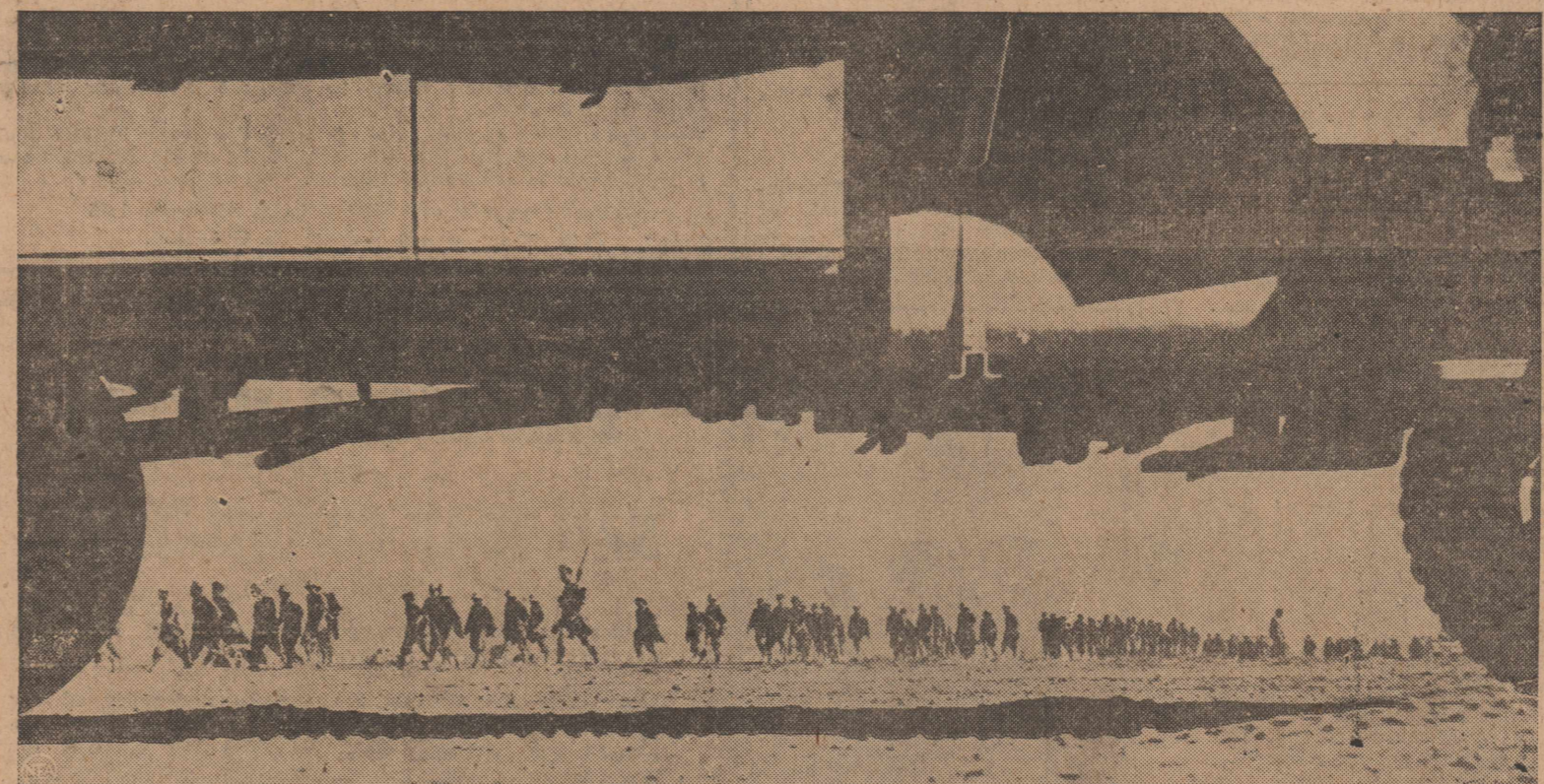

CAIRO (AP)—General Sir Claude Auchinleck's Army of the Nile, attacking simultaneously on all sectors of the El Alamein front for the first time, was reported Thursday to have driven back the Axis center in violent fighting mounting steadily in intensity.

CAIRO (AP)—United States four motored bombers joined the RAF in smashing anew at Tobruk, Ain El Gazala, Salum, Fuku, Matruh and many other Axis air and supply bases.

The Test Came Quickly

When Elmer Davis went to Washington to become czar over war publicity, few news men doubted that he would come into conflict with the War and Navy Departments — or, specifically, with the generals and the admirals.

The controversy came more promptly than most had expected. Davis had not even had time to accomplish administrative revisions before the trial of eight Nazi saboteurs began before a special military commission appointed by the President and headed by Maj. Gen. Frank R. McCoy.

Original detailed publicity on the capture of these submarineborne enemies was broadcast by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

Before the trial commenced Davis promised newspapermen he would make available daily a censored report on proceedings, including as many facts as would not be of aid to the enemy.

But General McCoy, presumably with the approval of his fellow officers on the commission, arbitrarily, curiously in fact, very uncivily — snubbed Davis and ignored Attorney General Biddle.

Thus the issue was joined.

One condition under which Davis took the job was that Army and Navy publicity should fall within his jurisdiction. The presidential order made that clear.

Now we must wait and see whether President Roosevelt is going to support Davis. This is no mere technicality.

We hope that Roosevelt will stand firmly back of Davis, give him the authority he was promised, hold him fully responsible for using it wisely, and send him back to civilian life if he fails.

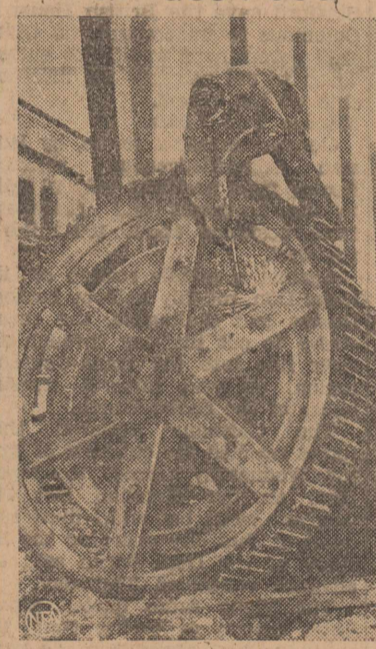

cost the Japanese heavily in casualties, a large transport and a landing barge sunk and a seaplane shot down. The Allies lost two fighters.

Allied airmen first spotted the small, southbound Japanese convoy picking its way along the island-dotted New Guinea coast just before dark Tuesday. They attacked immediately, scoring hits on the transport which later sank, and resumed the assault when the invaders started going ashore Wednesday.

Committing on the landing, Prime Minister John Curtin in Canberra said the Japanese had been working like beavers to carry out further incursions. The breathing space which followed the battle of the Coral Sea was all that the allies could have expected, he added.

Predicts An Air Battle

The landing may easily be the signal for an intense flare up in the air activity on both sides, but the allies will have one advantage in that their fighting planes can accompany their bombers to Buna.

On raids on Lae and Samarua, 165 miles respectively from Port Moresby, allied fighters were able to accompany their bombers and have sufficient reserve left for fighting.

The Japanese Zero fighters were able, however, to accompany their bombers from these bases to Port Moresby.

Threat to Port Moresby Although it would be difficult for the Japanese to make an overland attack upon Port Moresby from Buna, it would be just as difficult for the Americans and Australians to throw them out of their new base by land attack.

This first invasion of the Papua Peninsula was considered a greater threat to Port Moresby in that it put the invader closer to the allied base, but to get there overland he will find it going hard.

Facing the Japanese is the Owen Stanley range, rising above 13,000 feet and the peninsula has some of the world's most inaccessible territory.

This fast-growing Mississippi sport, drawing negroes, white plantation operators and tenants from all over the Delta, is sponsored by the Junior Auxiliary, county cousin of the city Junior League.

There are no handicaps for riders and the five events—junior, open novice, gentlemen jockey and sweepstakes—get underway with a yell from the starter and the use of whips and heels by the jockeys.

But the jockey doesn't have much to do with the mule's direction. The first mule off at the start is likely to be the winner, unless he should balk or decide to run out and jump the rail. Once the animal makes up its mind to run or not to run, the jockey just hangs on and hopes for the best.

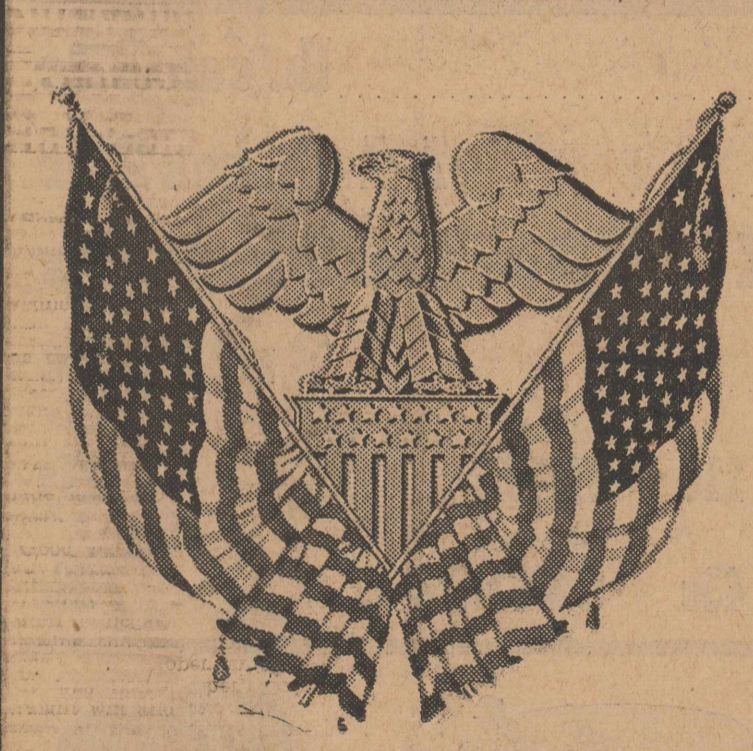

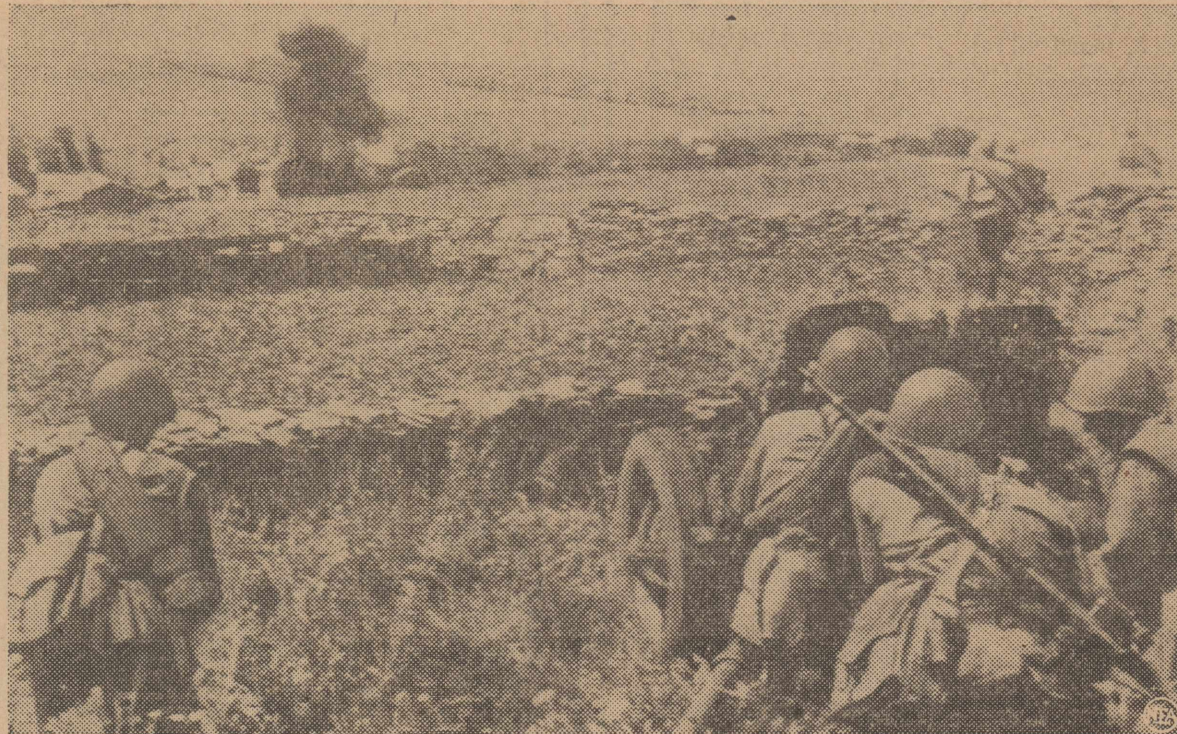

Randolph Churchill Certain Of Victory

NEW YORK (AP) — Randolph Churchill, 31-year-old son of the British prime minister, predicted Wednesday that "if we're lucky" the United Nations would win the war by the end of next year, "and if we're unlucky then we'll win by the end of 1944."

"We, the British, were only one-quarter ready for this war," Churchill said. "Germany prepared for 20 years for this war. The English have not been as clever in this war as the enemy."
"We have been largely enthusiastic amateurs in this war as compared to professional military men. We still have a lot to learn, but we are learning fast and we are going to win."

Churchill, captain of a British paratrooper formation, came here from Egypt where he suffered a crushed vertebra in an automobile accident last May.

Muskrats Help Indians Keep Wolf From Tepee

THE PAS, Man. (AP) — Muskrat catching on the Summerberry Conservation project near this northwestern Manitoba town provides Indians with a revenue of \$25 monthly and keeps many Indian families off relief, government officials announced.

The muskrat skins are graded by the government and then auctioned to buyers. The catch is restricted to 300 rats a year, yielding an average income of \$300 to persons given permits to catch animals each spring. Indian game wardens are employed on the 170,000-acre project to guard against poaching.

The United States has approximately 1975 "trailer cities," made up of persons who live in houses on motor wheels.

Spain Helps Hotels Rebuild, Refurnish

MADRID (AP) — The National Hotel Syndicate reports there are 46,846 hotels, inns, boarding houses, restaurants, cafes and bars throughout Spain, representing an investment of 6,000,000,000 pesetas and employing 230,000 persons.

The hotel industry gives the treasury 350 million pesetas in taxes, so the government has recently granted hotel owners and innkeepers loans amounting to 25,000,000 pesetas at 4 per cent interest for the construction of new hotels and restaurants and the improvement of old ones.

Spanish hotels were often criticized by travelers in the last century and even in the beginning of the twentieth, but they have been considerably improved since the end of the Spanish civil war.

The government has decided to support the hotel industry with loans at a lower interest rate than those granted by private banks. These loans are designed for the current of small remodeling in accordance with the national policy of aiding them in preference to the wealthier owners. The loans are payable within thirty-five years.

Production Of Old Glory Has High Priority Rating

CLEVELAND (UP) — When war production priorities were handed out Old Glory was not forgotten. It has been an A-2 rating.

This assignment of a rating on the part of the WPB assures materials for not only the making of American flags, but for marine signal flags, flags of the United Nations, religious flags, service flags, office of civilian defense flags, railroad flags and danger signal flags.

The acute shortage of materials has caused flag manufacturers to reduce their output drastically — and turn their attentions to the American flag.

Frank Walton, deputy director of the textile branch of the WPB, considers Old Glory a "very essential" part of the war production program.

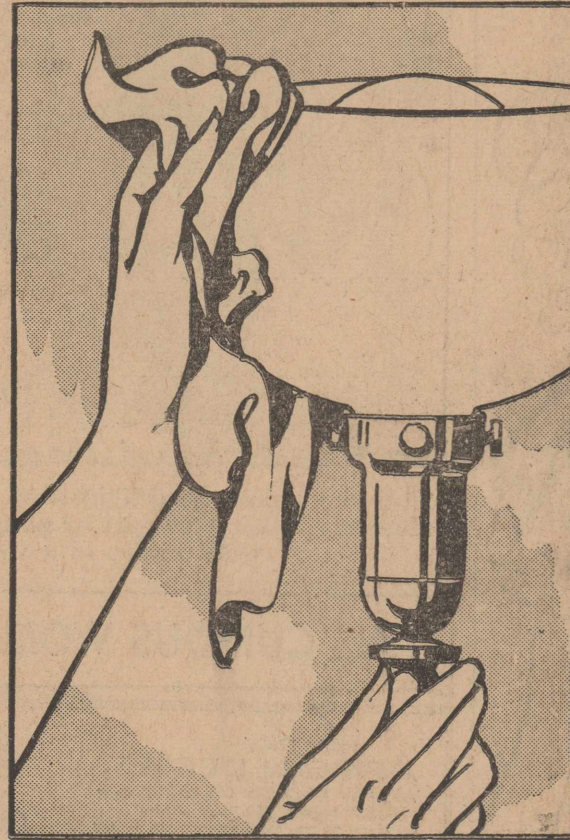

C., winner of the national amateur pair championship at Richmond last fall, was in New York recently, and I had the pleasure of playing with him in a local duplicate game. His defense on today's hand was outstanding and brought out a point to which I want to call special attention.

This hand was played at one of two hearts at all of the tables. The usual opening lead was a club, and the usual result was four-odd for the declarer.

Farber, sitting West, set the contract. He opened a trump, which certainly is the lead indicated by his general strength. South won and led a diamond. Farber went up with the king—a very necessary play overlooked by many players. Durmy has no side entry, so that his only chance to make the diamond suit is to hold up the ace until it is solid. If he is allowed to finesse and force out East's queen, he will win four tricks.

Declarer decided to let the diamond king hold, as his only chance. Farber continued with the seven of hearts. South took out the third trump, then led the second diamond for a finesse. When East produced the queen and led back the club queen, it was curtains. Declarer won only six tricks.

Ickes Hikes Crude Oil Production

WASHINGTON (AP)—Petroleum Coordinator Tokes set the August production rate for all petroleum liquids at 4,038,500 barrels daily, almost 200,000 barrels a day over the July output schedule.

Ickes said this marked the third consecutive month that it had been possible "due largely to expansion of overland oil transportation facilities from the Gulf Coast" to boost the national production of petroleum liquids.

And now come are WAACs—to add more social misfortune to the "dateless" girls.

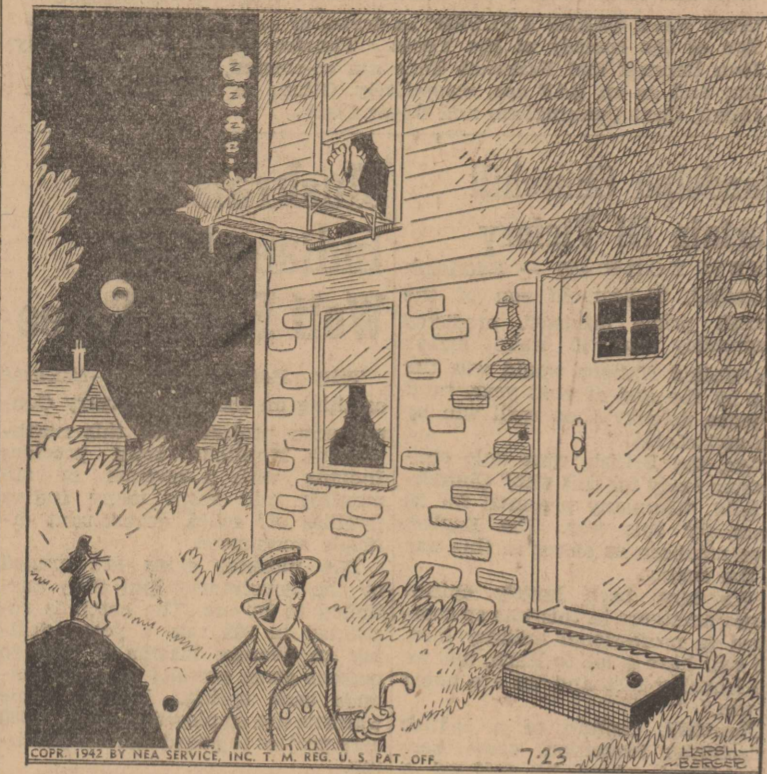

Commission Sets August Allowable

AUSTIN (AP)—A statewide oil order authorizing average daily allowable production of 1,388,021 barrels in August was announced by the Railroad Commission. The permissible was 3,679 barrels less than the Office of Petroleum Coordinator's certification for August market demand in Texas and 260,738 barrels greater than the average allowable reported for Texas wells on July 18. Nine producing holidays were decreed, Aug. 8, 9, 15, 16, 22, 23, 29, 30 and 31. The OPC's August certification was an increase of 182,300 barrels over its July recommendation for Texas. Announcing details of the statewide schedule, Commissioner Olin Culberson said it reflected a "steadily improving picture in the oil industry."

Put apricots through strainer. Add lemon and orange juice. Mix with gingerale before serving and pour over ice cubes in tall glasses. Garnish with lemon and mint.

Jim-Jam Punch
Two cups raspberry jam (or other flavor), 1 cup boiling water, 1-2 cup lemon juice, 4 cups water.
Mash jam, add boiling water. Place over heat and melt, stirring constantly. All lemon juice and water. Strain. Chill. Serve in tall glasses with ice and garnish with lemonslices.

Driver License Exam Dates Being Shifted

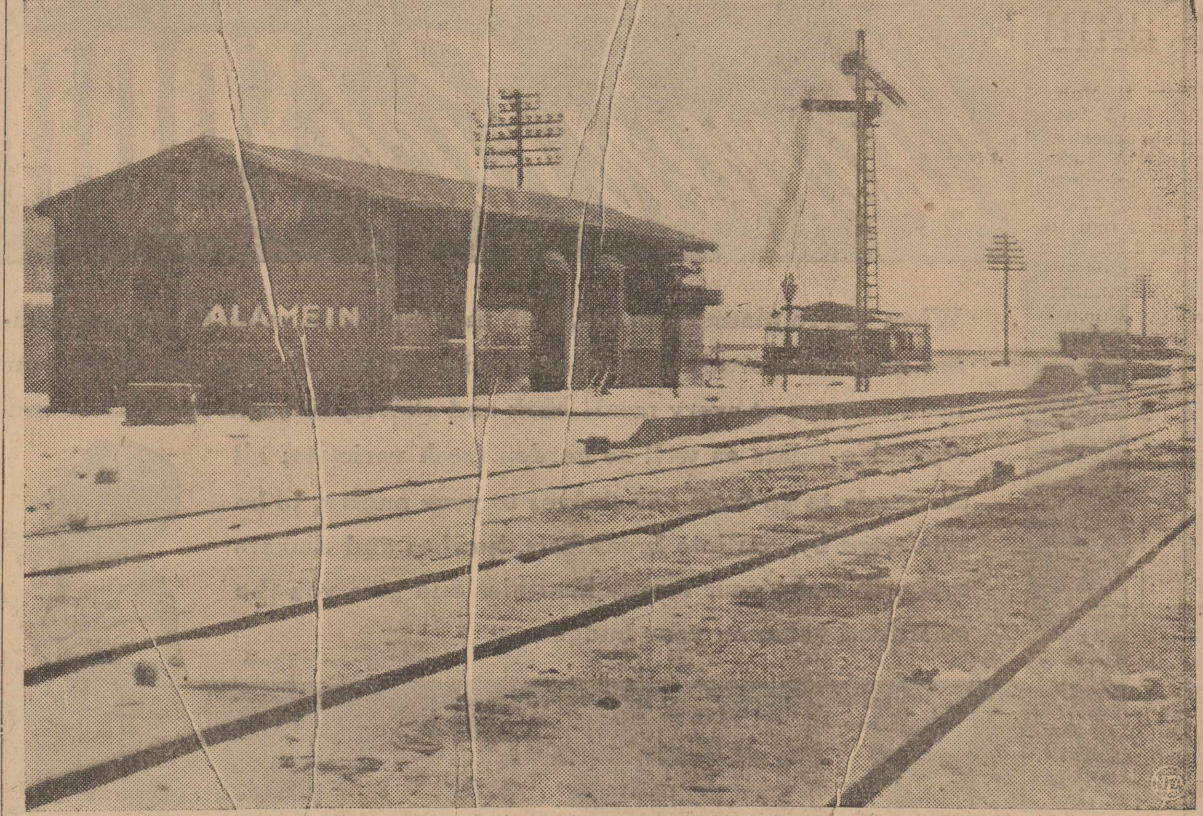

Oklahoma Treasury Has Hefty Surplus

OKLAHOMA CITY (UP)—Oklahoma, for the second time in 12 years, had a surplus in its treasury when the fiscal year closed June 30.

The surplus was a record-breaking amount of \$6,000,000. It resulted largely from increased taxes on cigarettes, a new tax on other smoking tobaccos and additional levies on automobile licenses to help finance public schools.

Under a constitutional amendment adopted by the voters in March of 1941, Oklahoma is prohibited from incurring deficits. If state income falls below legislative appropriations, all divisions of government must scale down their activities to offset the lag in money. The \$6,000,000 will be impounded in the general revenue fund to help finance future legislative appropriations. Legislators who meet

next January already are talking about reducing taxes. The last legislature raised the tax on cigarettes from three cents to five cents per package. Automobile licenses were increased about 40 per cent and a tax of one cent was placed on all cigars regardless of the original price.

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
