When U.S. Planes go into battle, pilots are given a plane of heavy construction, protected by armor, with superior fire power, plenty of gasoline capacity, parachute, rubber boat, flares and every other life-saving device for use in case the flyer has to bail out.

The Japs sacrifice all these in the Zero fighter, just to give the Jap pilots this quick pick-up-and-go advantage. All these factors explain why the captain on a photograph of a crashed Zero fighter, recived from Australia, bore the news that in the last month more than 300 of these Zero planes had been similarly destroyed. 





Texas production was down 7,395 to 1,224,865; East Texas, 4,640 to 293,055; California, 3,000 to 698,750; Illinois, 8,840 to 269,245; Kansas, 2,350 to 283,700; Michigan 7,850 to 60,000, and the Rocky Mountain states, 1,625 to 121,140.

Louisiana increased 6,635 to 324, 145; Oklahoma 6,250 to 380,900, and Eastern fields 250 to 98,750.






