Canadians, British And Fighting French Join In Big Assault

By Russell Lundstrom

LONDON. (AP)—United States troops with Canadian, British and Fighting French Commandos stormed the French Coast on the broad beaches around Dieppe at dawn Wednesday and with tanks and the greatest aerial umbrella ever spread aloft fought on throughout the day against the German defenders.

Despite the unprecedented scope of the attack, the British repeatedly announced that the action was not an invasion intended to create a front in Western Europe but was only a raid.

This was supported by the return to Britain during the afternoon of some of the commandos who had accomplished this mission speedily.

The main battle roared on, however, and the possibilities inherent in the situation increased as night ap-

The constant procession of more than 1,000 United States Army, RAF and Royal Canadian Air Force fighters and bombers from British frontline airdromes to the battle zone in France suggested that, at the least, the great assault might be a test to determine whether such an aerial "big-top" could positively protect a true invasion force all day long.

The planes shuttled to the attack and back for reloading and refueling so quickly that the scene at British airdromes recalled the Battle of Britain in the fall of 1940.

(Although the British repeatedly asserted the action was a Commando raid and not an invasion, the strength and continuing nature of the assault suggested that it was developing into a major operation with unpredictable pos-

Even as the battle thundered on, first units of the Commando force who had speedily accomplished their mission, returned to a British port in gay spirits.

There was no immediate indication how many men returned in the first contingent, nor whether Americans were among them. 





The reason for this play East's precise holding of three cards including the 10 and king. or queen, under the ace-jack-nine. From the lead it can reasonably be inferred that North lacks the other high honor, the queen. His normal play will then be to take a finesse of the nine, and as it happens, this will drive out West's queen, leaving dummy with a major tenace

Opening— 5.

By playing the king, East forces the declarer to guess how to play the suit. The finesse against the 10, which East knows will win, is shut out. Instead, declarer is allowed to kill the king if he wishes, but he will have to guess what to

do on the second round.

On a later low lead by North, East will play low, and declarer may think that East has the queen. If he plays the jack, the defense then wins two tricks in the suit. Or if East is allowed to hold the first trick with the king of diamonds, declarer has to guess whe-ther to finesse or swing the ace on the next lead.

are warning us that nothing like Kaiser proposes ever has been done, and therefore nothing like it can be done. Unfortunately, to the voices of consistent pessimists and let's-do-it the old wayers have been added the discouraging advice of some who in the past have shown willingness to try new pathways after the old have led

o dead ends. Perhaps it really can't be done. Perhaps it is not feasible to provide 200-ton or even 70-ton cargo airships, built largely from noncritical materials, as substitutes for the vessels which Axis U-boats are sinking faster than they can be replaced.

Certainly there are very grave barriers in the way, of which the highest hurdles would be engines and preci-

sion instruments. Nevertheless, to brusk off the Kaiser proposal without any attempt to find a way of achieving the ostensibly impossible would not be the approach by which this war s going to be won.

If one were to sit down in a cozy armchair, canvass the war situation today and draw inferences from hisory, he might conclude that the United Nations cannot win this war.

By conventional standards already we are beaten. We are beaten, up to now, by a nation which 10 years ago could not possibly, by conventional standards, have been conceded a fighting chance against even France—not to mention Britain, Russia and the United States.

The Germans, whom we considered a stolid, unimaginative people, have cleaned up all of continental Europe except Russia by forgetting that things "can't be done," and doing them.

The Russians, whom we considered inept imitators of more original-minded peoples, have withstood the Vazi blitzkrieg marvelously well because they didn't conede that "it can't be done."

Are we, whose greatest pride has been our inventive genius, our willingness to take a chance, going to curl up and die because somebody thinks "it can't be done"? Perhaps it can't. Perhaps it shouldn't. How do we

America's Card Authority An old whist maxim says, "Play second hand low, third hand high.' This may be good advice when the player sees only his own hand, but it certainly does not apply to auction and contract bridge, where the player sees the dummy also.

This week I am going to show



some common situations in which a defender, playing second to a trick, must play high instead of

In today's hand, spades are opened and declarer holds up the ace until the third round, discarding a diamond from dummy. Then he lays down the king of clubs, which East takes with the ace. East leads a diamond and South plays the ace. Now South leads a low heart.

West must jump up with the queen. If he does not dummy will surely duck the trick to East. The declarer can undoubtedly win a club or diamond return by East. Then he will run four hearts which ought to be enough to give him the game, with his side tricks.

By playing the queen, West forces dummy to play an honor, or West will run his spades. That kills the heart suit if South had only two hearts originally. If South had three hearts, the contract probably cannot be defeated.





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
