

RAF Planes Pound Germany

Battle Develops To Break Japs Hold On Island Of New Guinea

WASHINGTON, (AP) — A raging battle to break a Japanese grip in Southeastern New Guinea developed swiftly in crocodile-infested swamplands Friday as American naval and air forces emerged apparently victorious in the second round of the Solomon Islands conflict.

Disappearance of a battered enemy fleet from the U. S. controlled Tulagi area of the Solomons temporarily narrowed the struggle in the Southwest Pacific to two Japanese footholds on New Guinea.

Enemy forces which landed two days ago at Milne Bay, some 225 miles from the strong Allied New Guinea base at Port Moresby and 420 miles from the Australian mainland, were pounded by an Allied land-air attack that destroyed Japanese planes, troops, supplies and fuel dumps.

General MacArthur's Australian headquarters reported that Allied planes during the day in fights over Milne Bay and the Japanese base at Buna, 180 miles up the northeastern coast of New Guinea. A single Allied fighter was lost. Earlier, Japanese losses at the swampy Milne Bay landing included a transport, probably a carrier and six landing barges.

Meanwhile, a terse Navy Department communique reported that "Japanese forces appear to have withdrawn from the vicinity of our positions in the Tulagi area."

While modern naval warfare might result in turning a withdrawal into another large scale invasion attempt in a matter of days or even hours, the enemy's appearance was regarded generally as a victory for U. S. Marines and American naval and air forces.

While the Navy earlier announced at least 13 Japanese warships damaged in the Solomons encounter, a Reuters' New Zealand correspondent reported that Japanese wounds in the week's affray, severe and annoying as they are to the enemy, do not probably touch the main strength of the Japanese naval force.

Two-Day Jap Slaughter
A force of 350 Japs—virtually every defender—was wiped out and all seaplane installation methodical wrecked by U. S. Marines during the recent Makin Island raid, now disclosed by the scrap metal have been a two-day job of slaughter and destruction.

Contrasting with earlier reports of a hit-and-run raid, the participants, including Major James Roosevelt, son of the President, made it clear the scrappy Marines were hunted for the few Jap stragglers still alive before withdrawing to ships.

Steadily Landing
And so steadily was the landing during a moonless night on the northernmost island of the Japanese-held Gilbert group, 1,500 miles northeast of the Solomons, that the Marines had been ashore for 20 minutes, deployed for battle, before the Japs discovered them.

A Jap bomber was caught by Marines while attempting to flee from the battle scene but the invaders shot away two of its engines and from 100 feet up it crashed, killing all aboard.

Major Roosevelt summed up what he thought of the raiding force this way: "I don't think there is a finer group of men in the world."

Pyote Air School Project Contract Is Let Thursday

Union Purchases Mascho Andrews County Wildcat

Midland district offices of the Union Oil Company of California announced Friday the purchase from Mascho Oil Company, Midland, of a newly-splitted wildcat well three miles south of Shafter Lake in Andrews County. Consideration was not divulged.

The Midland firm, headed by James A. Mascho, also sold to Union the north half of the southeast quarter and the north half of the northeast quarter of section 23, block A-36, public school land. This additional acreage rounds out Union's holdings in the area, giving it 800 acres in the immediate vicinity of the well, the No. 1 Mrs. A. C. Means. The wildcat, which lies four and one-half miles southwest of the Means pool, now is standing at 270 feet in red beds after cementing 8 5/8-inch surface casing at 256 feet.

In Northern Dawson County, Ray A. Albaugh of Lamesa No. 1 T. L. Higginbotham is drilling below 1,699 feet in red beds. String of 10 3/4-inch surface pipe was cemented at 184 feet with 80 sacks.

Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 1 D. N. Leaverton, scheduled 7,500-foot deep Permian test in North-western Gaines County, is drilling shale and anhydrite at 3,590 feet.

In Southern Gaines, The Texas Company No. 1 J. Bay Robertson is drilling out cement at 6,437 feet. (Continued on Page 2)

WAR BULLETINS

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—More than 100 crewmen from the scuttled German pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee have fled internment in Argentina and at least six now are fighting against the United Nations, Juan Antonio Solari, chairman of a congressional committee investigating anti-Argentine activities, said Friday.

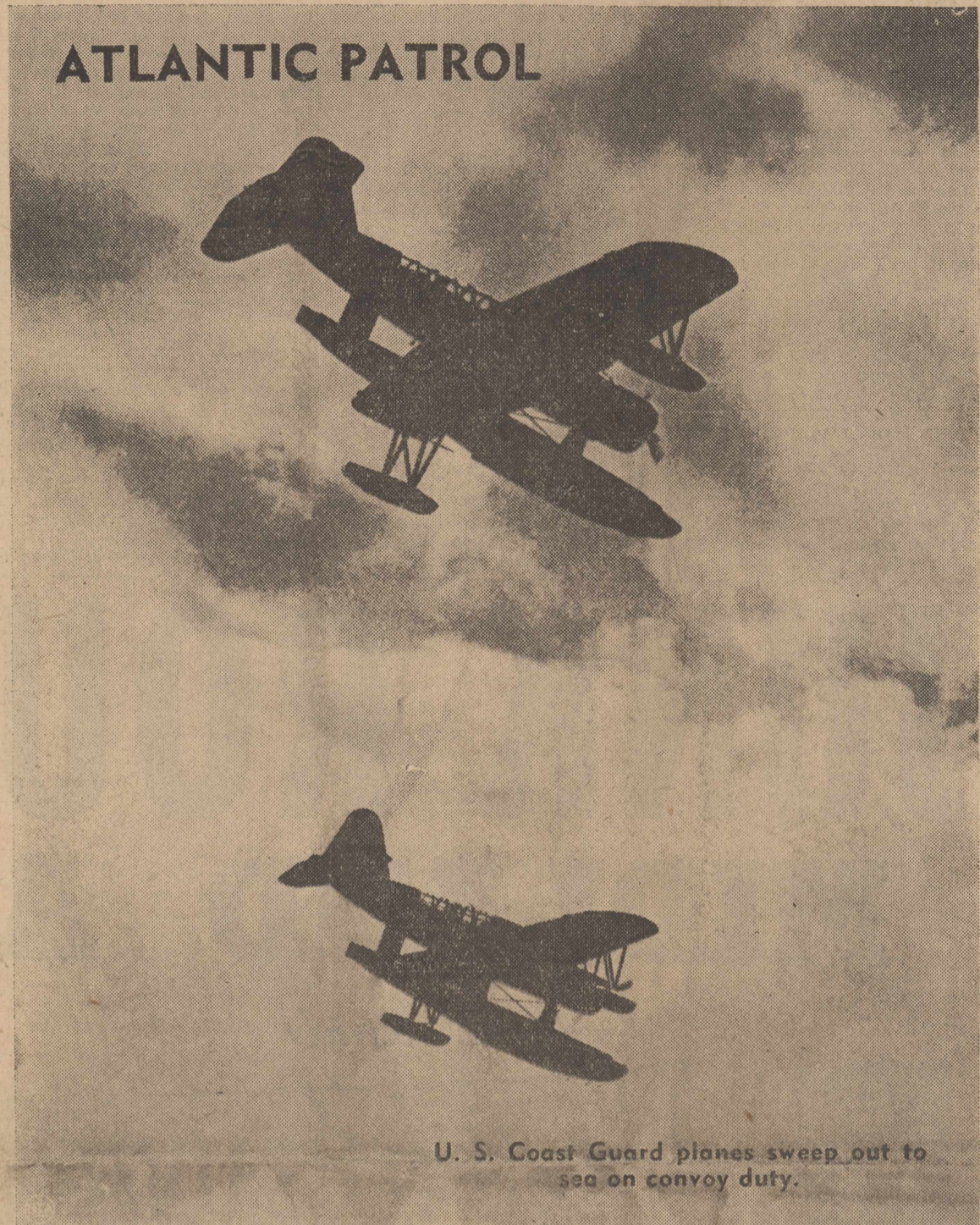
LONDON (AP)—The German-dominated Brussels radio said Friday that a British plane attacking a Brussels-Paris express train killed nine persons described as Belgian Nationals.

CHUNGKING (AP)—The Chinese have reentered Chuhshien, western Chekiang province, and have recaptured the great airfield just outside the city, most important of the East China bases from which Japan could be bombed, Chinese dispatches from the front declared Friday.

BERN, Switzerland (AP)—Five Norwegians, all army officers, were given death sentences Thursday by a German military court at Oslo on charges of terrorism, bombing, sabotage and activity aiding the enemy, the Havas news agency reported Friday.

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts) (AP)—More than 10,000 alien Jews have been arrested in Unoccupied France in the past few days as a preliminary to deportation, the German radio reported Friday.

LONDON (AP)—United States flying fortresses were over Northern France again Friday afternoon, it was reported authoritatively.

Scrap Scoopers Raid Downtown Midland Friday

A-jingle and a-jangle, sixteen teen-age Midland misses, tin-tagged and in ragged attire, raided downtown Midland Friday morning, rounding up war-worthy scrap, in a final clean-up of the city.

The Scrap Scoopers, as the newly organized Jaycee commandos are called, took the town in a surprise raid, calling on every business house in the city, offering a helping hand at carrying any scrap to the front sidewalk.

Scrap was piled outside, where trucks will pick it up later Friday, to put with the fast-growing Midland County scrap pile that soon (Continued on Page 2)

Problems Of Oil Industry Are Put Before Committee

Problems of drillers and facts and figures of oil operators showing they are operating at a loss to meet war needs were dumped into the lap of the Senate's subcommittee investigating troubles and difficulties of the petroleum industry before it concluded its hearing here Thursday evening.

Before Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney of Wyoming, chairman of the committee, and Senator Carl A. Hatch of New Mexico, chairman of the Senate's public lands committee, left Midland they also heard first-hand a request for a 25-cent barrel or more increase in oil prices, and a request for an end to "selective buying."

William B. Heroy, director of petroleum reserves for the Office of Petroleum Coordinator, and Watson B. Joyce, chief of the crude oil section of the Office of Price Administration, also heard the suggestions.

To Resume Study Soon
At the conclusion of the hearing here which was crowded into a one-day affair so the senators could meet other engagements, they announced they would welcome additional evidence and that it should be mailed to them promptly at Washington. The hearings will be resumed soon in Washington where a thorough study will be made of the industry.

Russell B. Brown, general counsel of the Independent Petroleum Association, representatives of the U. S. Geological Survey and other officials also heard the testimony as did Chairman E. O. Thompson of the Texas Railroad Commission and Beauford Jester, its junior member.

Hotel Scharbauer's Crystal Ballroom was crowded almost to capacity for both the morning and afternoon sessions of the committee. Thompson and Jester backed the Texans in their pleas and Thompson opened the session with a demand for a price increase and an end to "selective buying."

Tells Drillers' Problems
Problems of the driller were explained by Lloyd Noble of Tulsa, who said the oil industry was one of a very few ready when war was declared.

After Noble had told of the loss of experienced manpower in the drilling industry, O'Mahoney said essential men in war industries must be kept in those industries and that the Selective Service officials in Washington understand that.

Education Is Called On For New War Role

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Paul V. McNutt, Federal Security Administrator and War Manpower Commission Chairman, called on the nation's 31,000,000 teachers and students Friday to shoulder "new and heavier war duties" and asked school boards to reconsider their programs and responsibilities in the light of war needs.

"I urge you to put aside any thought of education as usual," he said in an address prepared for the opening of a four-day institute on education and the war sponsored by the U. S. Office of Education Wartime Commission.

McNutt announced that every able bodied college youth was destined for the armed forces and should realize that he cannot have assurance of remaining in school "for any specified period of time."

Teachers Urged To Stay
Mindful of a prospective serious shortage of teachers, McNutt urged particularly that teachers stay at their posts unless drafted by the Army or Navy or war industry for "work of higher priority rating."

"It is not only a teacher's duty to stay at his post," he added, "but he must expect to carry heavier work loads than in peacetime."

As for college students, McNutt said there was no excuse for any young man or woman preparing for any profession not directly useful to the war effort.

War Reservist Program
"Through the ROTC and through student loans to accelerate training in certain technical fields," he declared, "we have the beginning of a national college war reservist program. I hope to see this expanded to the point that every college is formally enrolled as a reservist."

He said every high school student should regard himself as in the "reserves" and called on elementary school children to enlist in the salvage campaign and on other pupils and students to help in the victory savings drive.

Red Armies Stem Nazi Drive On Stalingrad With Tempest Of Fire

An armada of British warplanes perhaps 600 strong pounded the German rail-aircraft center of Kassel in a "concentrated and effective" assault before dawn Friday while on the Russian front the Red armies stemmed the Nazi drive against Stalingrad with a tempest of defense fire.

Other British planes flew 1,500 miles round-trip to bomb the Baltic port of Gdynia in Nazi-conquered Poland.

Soviet dispatches, while conceding that the Germans were battering at the distant approaches of Stalingrad and that the battle had reached a stage of crisis, said a Nazi armored spearhead to the northwest had been cut off and encircled.

Connally Wants To Change Tax Bill

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Victorious in an earlier fight against the mandatory filing of joint federal income tax returns by husbands and wives in community property states, Senator Connally (D-Texas) said Friday he would seek to eliminate from the new revenue bill a House-approved provision which would cancel community property rights with respect to estate taxes.

"The amount involved in the estate taxes is less than the income taxes which recur year after year," Connally said, "but the principle involved tax is perhaps even more iniquitous."

Eight states have community property laws—Texas, Louisiana, Arizona, New Mexico, Idaho, Nevada, Washington and California.

Connally took the stand that if only half the property belonged to the husband in life, certainly no more than half of it belonged to his estate after death.

Health Staff Moves Into New Quarters

The Midland County Health Unit staff Friday moved into the new health center building, although the building it not quite complete. The staff will be on hand to direct the final installations of equipment, and be ready for the formal opening within a few days.

The staff of the unit will be increased, as the new facilities will enable a general expansion of the health program.

Offices of the unit have been in the county courthouse since the work began here more than a year ago.

6,000 Lambs Sold By Leonard Proctor

Leonard Proctor has sold 6,000 mutton lambs to a Denver, Colorado, buyer for September delivery. The sale was handled by Otto Drake of San Angelo.

Proctor is reported to have gotten good prices for the lambs, which are high grade stock raised on the Proctor Brothers ranches southeast of Midland.

U. S. Destroyer Is Sunk In Atlantic Collision

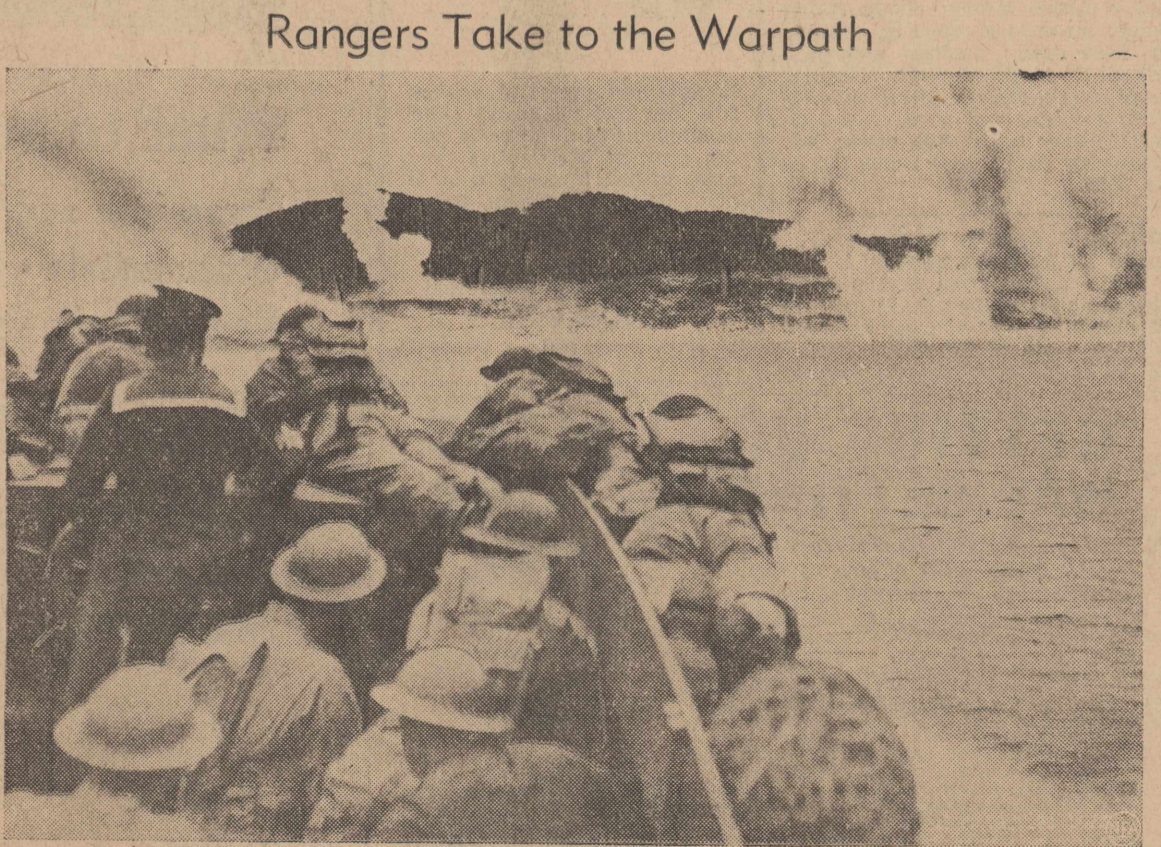

could not be filled with the available manpower.

Waste Of Steel
Arch Brown of Fort Worth, a drilling contractor, said that if experienced workers are not retained for the drilling industry, tons of steel and other critical materials would be wasted in the search for oil.

More than a dozen witnesses testified at the afternoon session which concluded the hearings here, the committee finding it necessary to curtail its program.

Several auditors and accountants for oil companies told the committee that companies which they represent are operating at a loss, submitted figures to back their statements, but promised the concerns would do all in their power to aid in winning the war, regardless of the consequences.

Lyle R. Sproles, Midland and Fort Worth accountant, read from records of one independent company to show it was producing oil at an average cost of \$1.33 a barrel and receiving for it only \$1.10 a barrel. Sproles represents a number of independent operators.

Another accountant, H. Rabun of Midland, testified that an independent company which he represents also was operating at a loss which ran as high as 44 cents a barrel in one month. He estimated the loss was caused by decreases in allowances and increases of about 10 per cent in production costs. R. M. Andrews, another Midland accountant, said a company he represents now shows a loss of 20 cents on each barrel of oil it produces.

"Producers are not getting cut of the oil," he said, asserting controlled production, declining production and increasing expenses are to blame.

Sidney M. Witt of Tulsa, auditor for an oil company, said its records show a loss of as much as 44 cents a barrel on oil produced. He said operating costs have increased 15 to 20 per cent for his company.

Financial records for another large independent operator were presented by Mary Evelyn Wellburn who showed how its profits had decreased month by month until now it was operating at a loss.

Says Wildcatting Will Stop
John I. Moore, prominent Midland geologist and independent operator, told the committee that unless the price of crude oil is increased wildcatting for new reserves would stop.

On questioning by the committee, he said development of oil had hardly scratched the deeper horizons of West Texas and predicted tremendous possibilities in deeper explorations if money is available.

He said an increase in price and better pipe line facilities are needed as incentives for further wildcatting. Moore said price increases should be passed on to the consumers as it has been in the past.

Neville G. Penrose, Fort Worth operator, asked the committee to correct the prevailing impression in Washington that all oil men are rich.

"It isn't so," he declared. He told of his wildcatting in West Texas for the last fifteen years, recalled troubles of operators, and asked why nothing had been done to aid producers although federal officials were sympathetic to marketers and transporters in their problems. He described several "acute situations" and suggested long term loans are needed by independent operators. He said these had been promised by the RFC but he had never heard of one being granted and did know of several rejections.

Wants Basic Price
An East Texas operator, H. P. Nichols of Tyler, said the present oil price will not justify rehabilitation of wells and demanded that "selective buying" be stopped immediately. He suggested that selection of fields where oil is to be produced be left to the railroad

commission in Texas and not designated by federal officials. After telling of an increase of 50 per cent in labor costs and increases of from 10 to 40 per cent in oil well supply costs, he said today's price for oil in East Texas is 10 cents per barrel less than it was in 1937. He represented the East Texas Oil Association.

Nichols urged a "basic or parity price for oil" and a price increase of 50 per cent. He predicted that if the price is not increased abandonments will pile up in East Texas at an alarming rate.

Wildcats To Be Deeper
The expense in development of Permian Basin oil pools was described in detail by George Abell, Midland Geologist. He said future discoveries must be made at greater depths and exploration costs will be three to five times greater than in the past.

"If the government is interested in future reserves somebody's going to have to put up the money," Abell told the committee. "If oil prices are not increased there will be no wildcatting."

O'Mahoney explained the committee wanted all evidence in full in the hope of bringing out the fullest possible development of raw materials. He said he had just received word from Washington that the bureau of mines would establish a plant at Laramie, Wyo., for development of sponge iron.

W. M. Priddy of Tyler and Wichita Falls urged a price of \$2.00 a barrel for oil and told of an increase in the number of dry holes.

James Mascho of Midland said major companies no longer will support wildcatting by independent operators, and asserted he would like to see \$3.00 a barrel oil.

O'Mahoney told the crowd of oil operators, representing large and small companies, that drilling for

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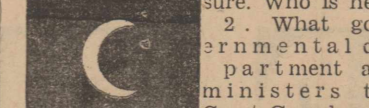

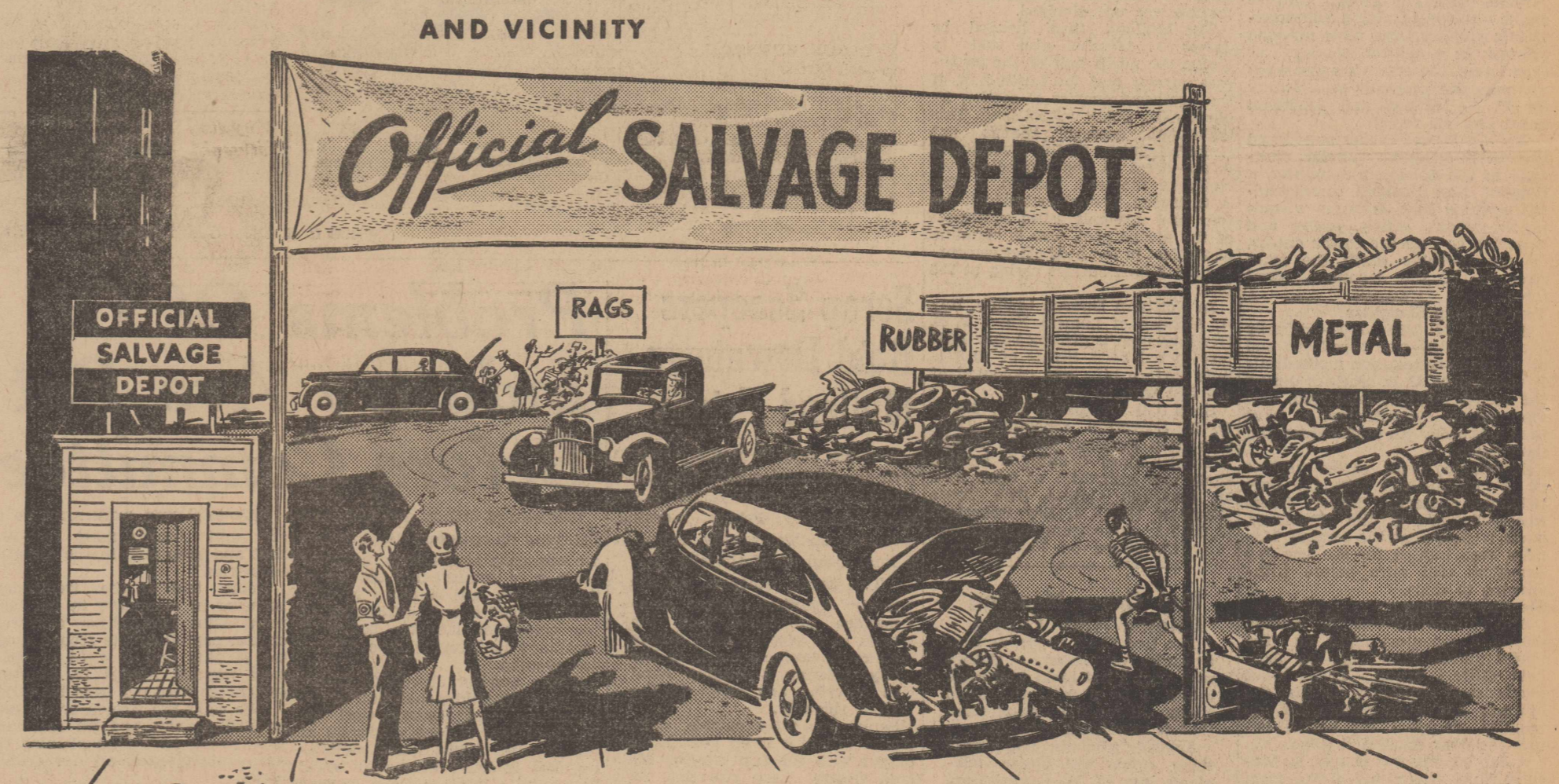

 Yesterday I spoke of the frequent advisability of an exploratory lead in place of a simple exit. There is an angle here to be watched, though, which is that an exploratory lead may operate to place cards for the declarer.

Compare the way today's hand was played at two of the tables of a duplicate game. In both cases the king of hearts won the jack on the opening lead, and declarer took a diamond finesse which

West correctly allowed to win. A spade was led to the ace, and a second diamond finesse lost to the king.

At one table West now led a spade, aiming to establish his partner's possible queen. This located the queen for the declarer, who cheerfully took his king and led low. East led a second heart and declarer saw that West probably held the queen, else East would have exited with a diamond or even tried clubs. So the ace of hearts was played and the jack of clubs led. That developed the ninth trick for the declarer while the defense was winning only one trick in each suit.

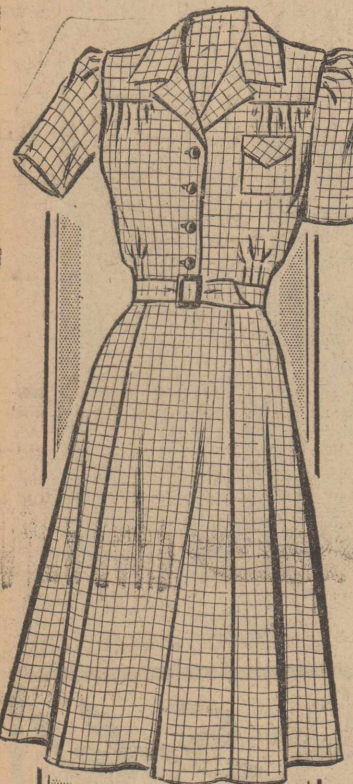
At the other table West at trick five exited with a diamond, leaving the declarer to guess about the spade suit. Dummy cashed the fourth diamond, West discarding a spade and North a club. The jack of clubs was led, covered by the queen and king and won by the ace. Now a heart return left declarer helpless, however well he guessed.

Californians Dominate National Tennis Tourney

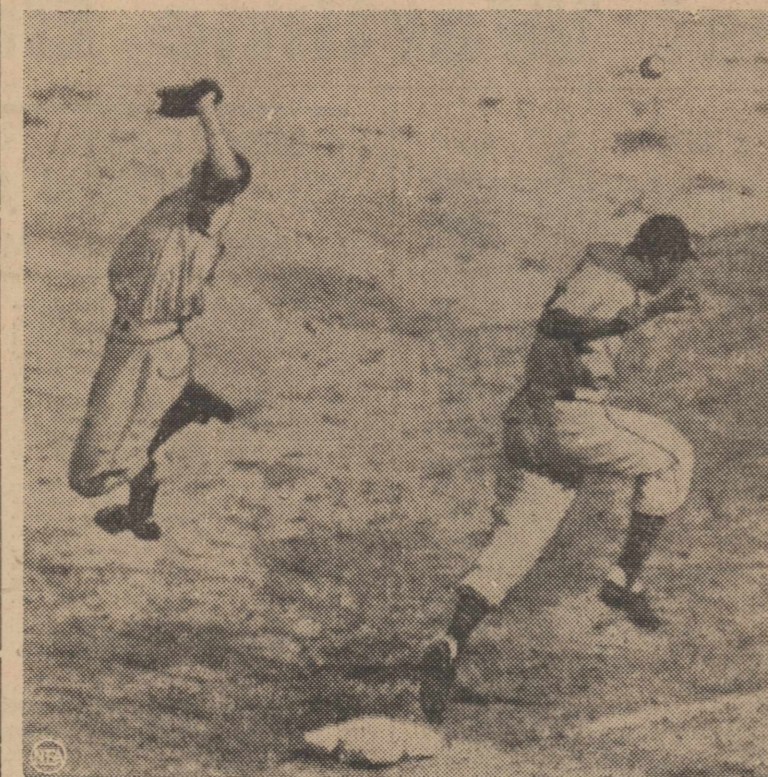

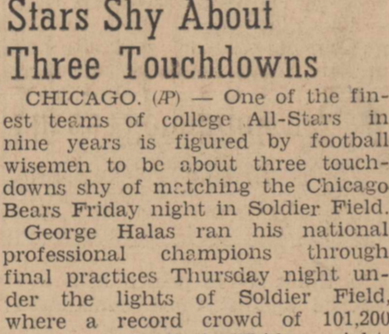

What little excitement had been breathed into the two major league pennant races in recent days apparently was expelled Thursday as the Brooklyn Dodgers bounced out of their lethargy and quelled the St. Louis Cardinals 4-1 and the onrush of the Boston Red Sox was checked by the Cleveland Indians 4-2.

The Dodgers had the cocksureness taken out of them at St. Louis as the Redbirds took the first three tussles, but the net result of the struggle was to send the Dodgers into the last month of the season with a 5 1/2 game lead and the knowledge that they would need to stay awake to keep it. The Cardinals came back Thursday night with Max Lanier in the fourth game of the series with just two days rest since he had hit Brooklyn to four hits Monday night. The stocky southpaw wasn't up to the job, however, and was shelved for five successive singles and three runs in the fourth. Then another lefthander, Ernie White, came in and was pelted for an additional single and Brooklyn's final run before getting his house in order. Davis Does It

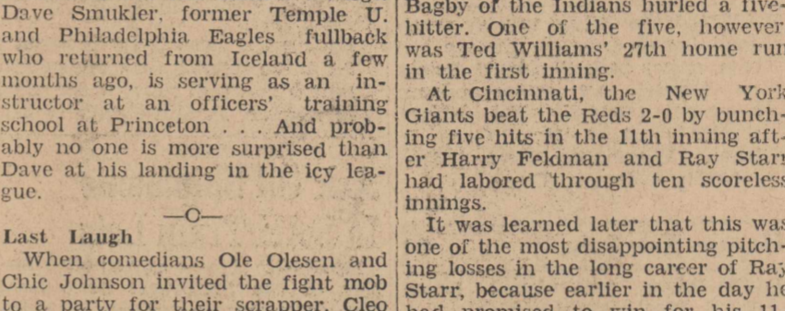
It was the veteran Curt Davis, once a Cardinal, who directed the Dodger revival in gaining his 14th triumph of the season. He held the Redbirds to eight scattered hits and knocked in two of Brooklyn's runs with a single. The Red Sox' string of nine consecutive victories not only was broken in the only American League game, but Cecil (Tex) Hughson's skein of 11 straight pitching triumphs also was snapped as Pin Bagby of the Indians hurled a five-hitter. One of the five, however, was Ted Williams' 27th home run in the first inning.

At Cincinnati, the New York Giants beat the Reds 2-0 by bunting five hits in the 11th inning after Harry Feldman and Ray Starr had labored through ten scoreless innings. It was learned later that this was one of the most disappointing pitching losses in the long career of Ray Starr, because earlier in the day he had promised to win for his 11-year-old son who was taken to a hospital Thursday for treatment of infantile paralysis.

Hank Gornicki provided a one-man show at Pittsburgh by pitching two-hit ball and hitting a two-run homer to lead the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 5-0 victory over the Boston Braves.

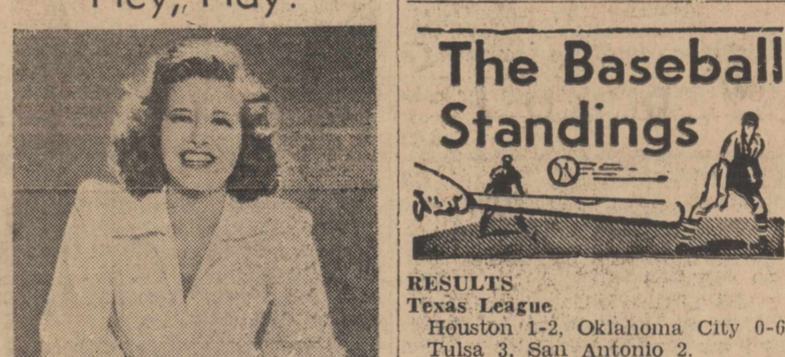
