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Nazis Smash At Stalingrad

New Zealanders Force Axis Retreat

Allied Air Forces Hammer Constantly At Rommel's Army

CAIRO (AP)—Nazi Marshal Erwin Rommel's Axis forces fell back slowly toward the West Saturday night under the sharp blows of British tanks and infantrymen and the bludgeonings of Allied bombers flying almost constantly over the western desert battlefield.

New Zealanders forced an Axis withdrawal over a battlefield strewn with wrecked German heavy tanks along the central sector of the El Alamein front and held firmly to their new positions.

South of the Alamein sector, in an area where some of the heaviest fighting of the week-long action has occurred the combat moved at a slow pace to the west.

Battlefront reports said enemy tanks and their anti-tank guns, while withdrawing farther to the west, still were in the wedge where they drove in the British positions at the southern extremity of the Alamein line.

Rommel's unarmored vehicles, mostly supply trucks, however, were almost entirely west of the line. Widely dispersed, they have taken a terrible beating from air attacks.

United States Middle East Headquarters announced U. S. medium bombers and fighters continued their support of the RAF, attacking concentrated motor transport and making several direct hits.

The entire first week of the new fight in the desert appeared to consist mainly of jockeying for position for the real battle for Egypt and the Nile.

Striking southward from their central positions into the enemy flank, the New Zealanders pushed Marshal Erwin Rommel's armored forces back three miles, the second time the Axis commander has given ground since his initial probing thrust against the Allied line began last Monday.

Take Axis Prisoners
A number of Axis prisoners, about half of them Italians and the other half members of the 90th German light infantry, were taken.

This Allied attack started Thursday night and fairly heavy fighting continued through Friday when Rommel made three sharp but futile counter-attacks in an effort to dislodge the New Zealanders.

The latest flare-up of ground fighting was followed Friday night by a burst of aerial activity in which Allied fighters shot down nine enemy planes, three near Alexandria and five over the desert battle area. Two of the craft bagged in the Alexandria vicinity were Italian bombers.

Raid Axis Convoy
British bombers and torpedo planes which raided an Axis convoy in the Eastern Mediterranean Thursday night were reported to have scored a torpedo hit which halved a medium-sized merchant vessel.

A recapitulation on this raid, which had been reported previously, showed that, three ships were hit and set afire and that three hits were scored on an Axis destroyer.

American Airmen Batter Railways Germany, France

LONDON (AP)—American airmen in flying fortresses, Boston bombers and fighter planes, made their biggest assault yet on Hitler's transport system Saturday, the bombers smashing at the Rouen railway yards and the LeHavre docks in France when the fighters escorted the bigger planes and engaged in diversionary sweeps.

There were no American losses. The attacks followed a night of intensive Allied action against Germany. A powerful force of hundreds of RAF planes started big fires in Bremen, while the Russians scattered bombs on eastern Germany and attacked Budapest for the first time.

A German war bulletin mentioned the Russian raids without naming the cities other than Budapest, but the British radio quoted Scandinavian dispatches from Berlin and saying Vienna in Austria, Koenigsberg in East Prussia and Breslau in German Silesia were among the places hit.

The German high command said the Russians also attacked places in Poland.

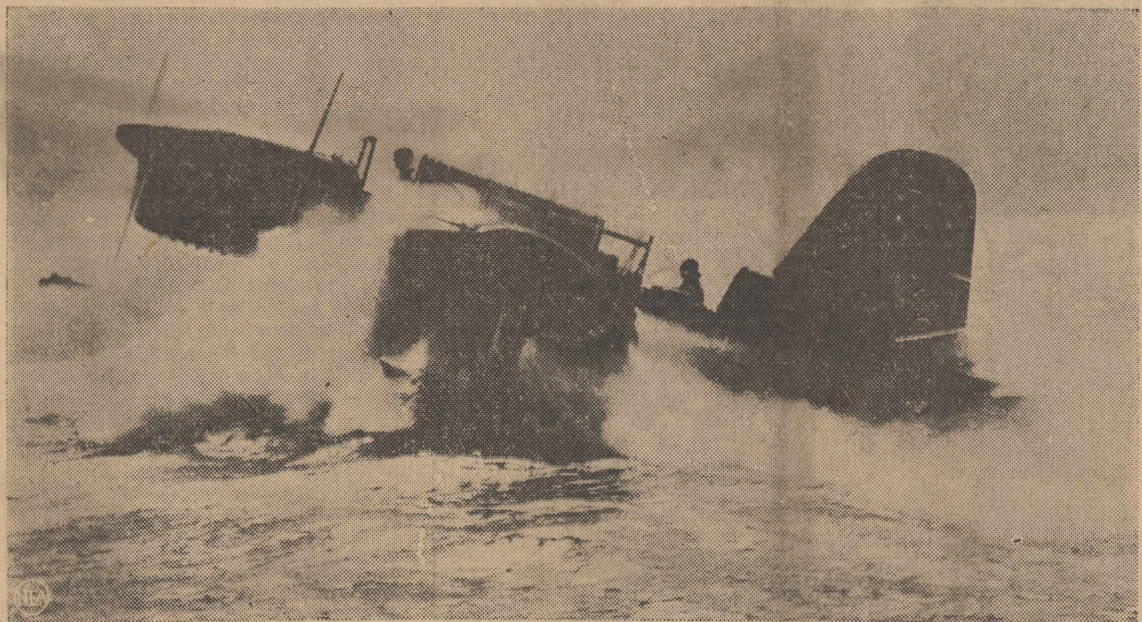
For the twin-motored Boston bombers it was the first action since July 4 when they made their first attack across the channel in a raid on Holland.

Labor Day Launchings Will Be World Record
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Navy hailed as a world's record for the shipbuilding industry Saturday the program of 150 keel layings and launchings on Labor Day while the Army announced that 60 boats of its own would slide down the ways Monday.

Assistant Secretary of the Navy Ralph Bard said that many of the warships were being delivered far ahead of schedule. Among them are destroyers, submarine chasers, motor torpedo boats, mine sweepers, coastal transports, seaplane tenders and other ships.

Texas Democrats Meet On Monday

AUSTIN—The legions of Texas democracy, delegates from every county of the state, gather here Monday and Tuesday to organize the party machinery for the next two years.

The best prospect for dissension was the Prohibition question, although sentiment among early arriving delegates and officials had not crystallized.

The retiring state executive committee headed by E. B. Germany of Dallas will meet Monday for a canvass of votes in the run-off primary and to certify party nominees to the convention which meets Tuesday.

Barring the unexpected, George A. Butler of Houston will become Executive Committee Chairman in succession to Germany.

Labor Day, Work Day For Texas Laborers

(By The Associated Press)
Work usual, with few exceptions, will be Texas' Labor Day challenge to the Axis.

War work plants will hum with industry, hundreds of employees will contribute their day's pay to the government's war effort, and usual holiday observances will be held to a minimum.

Harry W. Acreman, Austin, executive secretary of the Texas Federation of Labor, said many member groups will replace normal labor day parades and all-day outings with a full work day, with workers employed on federal projects dominating the day's wages to the government.

Others will buy Bonds with Labor Day pay. A few night celebrations would interfere with essential work.

Eighth Command Moved To Dallas

DALLAS (AP)—Transfer to Dallas of the Eighth Service Command Headquarters controlling military establishment in five states—was reported Saturday by Rep. Kilday of Texas who said the War Department ordered the move over his protests.

The Command, formerly the Eighth Corps Area, has jurisdiction in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and New Mexico. It supplies all military units and installations in this area and has been located in San Antonio since 1890.

Kilday said at Washington that Robert P. Patterson, Under-Secretary of War, cited military congestion in San Antonio and a desire for a more central location as factors that led to the order.

Texas' Contribution To Oil Supply Praised

WASHINGTON (AP)—Texas' contribution to the world's supply of oil, life-blood of war machinery, was lauded on the Texas Forum of the Air program prepared here for Sunday broadcast in the state.

Members of the forum panel were Representative Gossett of Wichita Falls, Russell B. Brown of Ardmore, Okla., and J. C. Hunter of Abilene, Texas.

Bombers Hit At Jap Ships In Buna Area

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Australia (AP)—Allied bombers destroyed a number of landing barges and boats at Buna, Japanese base in Southeastern New Guinea, in three destructive attacks, a communique said Sunday.

The communique also said Allied forces continued mopping up remnants of Japanese ground forces who were still holding out in the Milne Bay Area, in the southeastern tip of New Guinea.

In the Buna raids a number of grounded Japanese aircraft was set on fire.

The Allied planes, after dropping their bombs, heavily strafed the Buna area, which is the main base for the Japanese thrust to Kokoda, only 60 miles across the Owen Stanley mountain range from the Allied base at Port Moresby.

Grounded aircraft and a fuel dump were set afire; huts, motor vehicles, landing barges and boats were destroyed; and anti aircraft position was silenced. There was no interception.

At Kokoda, allied fighters machine-gunned enemy positions in close support of ground forces; one plane was lost.

HURRICANE CANCELS COTTON LABOR SHORTAGE

Propose Curb On Purchasing Of Consumer Goods

WASHINGTON (AP)—A simple plan to curb consumer purchasing by imposing an arbitrary limitation on the amount an individual might spend out of his income has been suggested by Treasury officials to the Senate Finance Committee, it was learned Saturday.

The proposal offered tentatively by Roy Blough, head of the Treasury's Tax Research Bureau, contemplates issuance by the government of a sort of rationing certificate to each taxpayer permitting him to spend a certain proportion of his income, but no more. Income that could not be spent might be expected to gravitate to government bonds.

A man with a \$5,000 annual income might be granted sufficient certificates to spend 80 per cent of it, or \$4,000.

Low income groups existing on a bare subsistence level might be permitted to spend all of their earnings.

Northeastern Gains In Line For Deep Wildcat

New deep wildcat operation for northeastern Gaines County was presented Saturday by the report that C. W. Crockett of Dallas is planning to start by Oct. 1 a 7,500-foot test three and one-quarter miles northwest of the Cedar Lake pool.

It will be designated the No. 1 Thomas S. Riley and probably will be staked in the center of the southwest quarter of the southwest quarter of section 35 block H, D. & W. survey. Location falls two and one-quarter miles west of the old Stanolind Oil Gas Company No. 1-B Riley, small producer, now abandoned, northwest of Cedar Lake proper.

"We drove by and saw all that scrap you have gathered," said the telephoner to scrap headquarters, "and we want you to send a truck out and pick up 3 or 4 pounds of scrap metal we have." FDR Says War Sacrifices To Be Necessary

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Roosevelt, in advance of his traditionally-awaited anti-inflation decree, warned Saturday night that the nation faced "sacrifices of wage increases, crop price increases, profit increases, and bodily comforts."

This indication of the program he will announce Monday in a message to Congress and an address to the people was given in a Labor Day statement which said that "all this is little enough for free men to sacrifice in a world where freedom is imperiled."

Government officials who could not be quoted by name reported the plan contemplated the setting up of an economic administrator to supervise the program and an executive order limiting wages, salaries and farm prices.

Grave Hour For Labor

The President's Labor Day statement Saturday night said that because the "evil men of West and East" threaten democracy and democracy's labor, farmers and industrialists, "we are certain to be asked for sacrifices."

This, said the President, is a grave hour for labor as it is for the farmer, the industrialist, the teacher and preacher, the apportioned housewife, the smallest child in the cradle.

"All these are the beneficiaries and heirs of the democratic system," he said, "and it is democracy itself that the evil men of West and East hate and seek to destroy."

Good Right Arm.

In many countries free labor is non-existent, he declared, and in conquered lands workmen "cover beneath the lash of the slave-masters, and their rights and those of free men have vanished."

"They are threatened and besieged everywhere," the Chief Executive said.

But he added this cheering word: "Happily, our good right arm is strong and growing stronger. In our own country, in the countries of our brother allies, the people who live by the sweat of their brows have risen mightily to the challenge of the struggle. Production of war materials is now the greatest in our history, but it is not yet enough. It will be greater still."

Metal Scrap Drive Rolls Along With Much Yet To Be Done In This Area

Midland County scrap drives are under full speed, with surprising results in quantities, but with much yet to be done, say county leaders who Saturday especially praised the work of the Human Chain workers in the rural areas of the county, and the several individuals and groups of the city who have shouldered heavy responsibilities in seeing that there is no waste scrap left idle in Midland County.

More than 150 tons, well more than 300,000 pounds of scrap metal were gathered in Midland last week by the Human Chain, the Jaycees and individuals. Up to one week ago there had already been more than 375 tons of non-industrial scrap gathered, and some 1,700,000 pounds or near 900 tons of industrial scrap. A great part of this has been cut into small pieces and shipped;

Battle Rages With Increasing Fury As Reds Fight Bitterly

Germany's battering army drove deeper into the southwestern defenses of Stalingrad Sunday as the historic battle for the Volga River city, already called a "Red Verdun," raged on in increasing fury.

The stalwart Red Army fighters, who earlier had broken into Nazi positions northwest of Stalingrad, held their ground in that sector against attack after attack, the Soviet midnight communique said, but on the second great salient southwest of the city the Germans succeeded in advancing," the communique said in its terse acknowledgment of the new gain, the first announced in two days.

* Fighting also continued around the Black Sea naval base of Novorossiisk and in the Caucasus around Moudok, where the Germans were trying to reach the Grozny oil fields, but Stalingrad was the main battlefield.

Labor Day

Labor Day was sponsored originally by the Knights of Labor, first general trade union organization in this country, which had much more resemblance to the present-day C. I. O. than to the A. F. of L.

Quite naturally, perhaps, we have come to think of Labor Day as the particular property of those workers who are organized into trade unions.

But since this year we are fighting a bloody war for the preservation of democracy, let's talk about democratic labor—with the small "l"—which comprises perhaps 85 or 90 per cent of those who work for a living.

Because of the shortsightedness and sometimes the selfishness of certain union officials, Labor—with the capital "L"—has brought upon itself frequent severe denunciations.

But Labor is made up largely of laborers. And the record will show that labor—the men who actually do the work—has proven itself as actively, sacrificially patriotic as any element in our population.

Because of our geographical position, because of our vast natural resources and because of our productive capacity, the anti-Axis world is forced to depend upon the United States for much of the material of war.

Upon the shoulders of American labor the fate of the world rests today. If labor continues to come through as it has been doing, totalitarianism can be whipped. If labor were to let down, as nobody has the right to expect that it will, then all the courage of all the soldiers and sailors of the United Nations cannot save us.

The point to be kept in mind is that democracy depends upon American labor, not American Labor. The first, without the capital "L," includes the 85 per cent of who are not unionized, plus probably 99 per cent of those who do belong to unions.

The boys in the front lines look for their weapons and munitions to the men at the machines—not to the relatively few union officials who show an inclination sometimes to forget that this is not their private war.

The men behind the machines are you and us, the folk with whom we brush shoulders on the street.

Give them a chance for themselves, and these millions are as willing to sacrifice for the preservation of democracy as any loud-voiced street-corner orator.

So on Labor Day this year let's forget that the first Monday in September used to be dedicated to Labor, and in the brief moment that we can spare from production for war, let us remember that labor should not be branded for the sins of a few of its self-proclaimed oracles.

Livermore No. 1 Maxwell-State May Open Farthest North Pool In Lea County, Southeast N. M.

HOBBS, N. M.—Prospects for the farthest north production in Lea County, starting of an important wildcat test west of the West Eunice pool in the same county and completion of 10 new producers in the Square Lake pool of Eddy County were highlights Saturday in Southeast New Mexico developments.

Indicating opening of Lea's most northerly area, George P. Livermore, Inc. No. 1 Maxwell-State, 10 miles west by northwest of Lovington, is standing at 5,257 feet in line after cementing 7-inch casing at 5,200 feet with 1,000 sacks.

The wildcat made its bid for production when it logged an odor of oil at 5,200 feet and drilled soft lime, about 50 per cent porous and oil stained, from 5,231 to 5,240 feet and from 5,243 to 5,245 feet. It was cored from 5,245 to 5,257 feet, present depth, with recovery of 8 feet of lime carrying broken porosity and with slight staining in the bottom five feet. Operators will rig up cable-tool unit and swab the well to test after plug has been drilled. It is 660 feet out of the northwest corner of section 26-15-34.

New Lea Wildcat
C. J. (Red) Davidson of Fort Worth and J. C. Clower of Eunice are rigging up spudder at their No. 1 Shell Oil Company-State, new Lea wildcat three and one-half miles west by southwest of the West Eunice pool. It was staked 660 feet out of the northeast corner of section 20-21-34. Shell reportedly is donating the north half of the northeast quarter of section 9, the south half of the northeast quarter of section 17 and the east half of the northeast quarter of section 20, in addition to \$10,000 dry-hole money. Contract depth of the test is 4,200 feet.

R. Olsen Oil Company and Atlantic Refining Company No. 1 Langlie, scheduled 8,500-foot Ordovician test in the Langlie Permian pool of Southeastern Lea, twisted off drillpipe at 3,383 feet in line and is fishing. It logged a slight showing of gas in line from 3,037 to 3,088 feet. Location is 660 feet out of the southeast corner of section 11-25-37.

Complete Five Producers
Ohio Oil Company No. 1 State-Don McCormick, wildcat in extreme Northeastern Lea, 600 feet out of the northeast corner of section 36-9-37e, temporarily halted drilling at 4,950 feet in line and now is standing after cementing 4 1/2-in-

ch casing at 4,953 feet with 50 sacks. When operators drill ahead they will employ reverse-circulation. Sanders Brothers and Barney Cokburn, both of Artesia, each completed five producers in the Square Lake pool of Eddy, at present the scene of the greatest activity in the state.

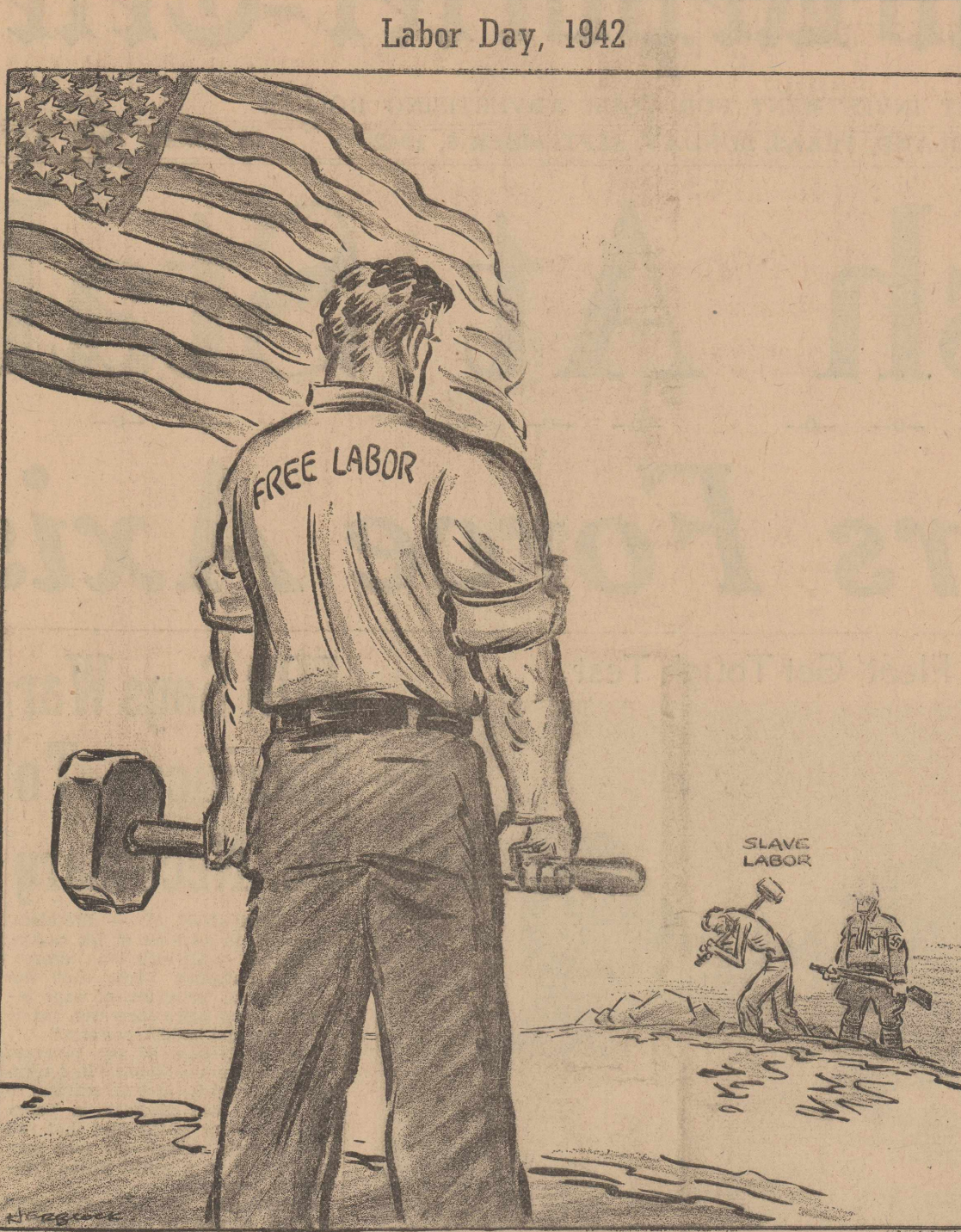
Cockburn No. 4 State, section 2-17-30e, flowed 65 barrels of oil in three and one-half hours through open 2-inch tubing set at 2,810 feet after shooting with 260 quarts of nitro from 2,933 to 3,033 feet, the total depth. It topped pay at 2,944 feet. His No. 7 Tide Water-State, section 38-16s-30e, was shot with 360 quarts from 2,970 feet to bottom at 3,107 feet and flowed 140 barrels in 13 hours through open 7-inch casing.

Leonard-State Completed
Cockburn No. 1 Leonard-State was completed at 2,885 feet in line for a three-hour flow of 44 barrels through open 2-inch tubing hung at 2,667 feet following a shot with 200 quarts from 2,778 to 2,872 feet. In section 35-16s-30e, Cockburn No. 8 George Etz responded to a 160-quart shot from 2,934 to 3,024 feet, one foot from bottom, by flowing 35 barrels in four hours through open 2-inch tubing hung at 2,670 feet. The same operator's No. 14 Etz, also in section 35-16s-30e, was shot with 180 quarts from 2,925 to 3,020 feet and flowed 72 barrels in six hours through open 2-inch tubing swung at 2,600 feet. Steel line measurement corrected total depth of 3,020 feet to equal 3,017 feet.

Sanders Brothers No. 4-E Etz was completed at 3,007 feet in line for natural flow of 200 barrels per day through open 2-inch tubing. No. 3-E Etz also was completed naturally, flowing 80 barrels a day through open 2-inch, bottomed at 2,965 feet in line. The firm's No. 8 Leonard was shot with 200 quarts from 2,907 to 2,987 feet, total depth, and flowed 50 barrels daily through open tubing. All three wells are in section 34-16s-30e.

all will be moving within the next week. The Midland Army Flying School salvage department, headed by Colonel Seward W. Hulse, has salvaged more than a million pounds of metal, which has been delivered to the mills.

Friday and Saturday several individuals were out gathering lots of scrap, seeing to it individually that it was picked up and delivered, some 25 to 30 tons. At the same time, I. O. Sturkie with a crew of torch cutters, with heavy trucks, cutting up heavy stuff on farms and ranches, gathering some 40 to 50 tons. On Saturday the Jaycee Scrap Scoopers gathered the smaller scrap that had accumulated at homes and stores throughout the city, adding another 10 tons.

Saturday night, scrap continued to accumulate in front of some stores, and a few homes, indicating the growing interest in the drive. This will be gathered within the week. Farmers and ranchmen, said a few days of dry weather would see the gathering of many more tons.

"Thank everybody," said Cliff Dunagan, general county salvage chairman, "for the splendid work. But we are not through, any more than our boys in the battlelines are through. We must stay with this, like they will, until the job is done. This is everybody's campaign, just like it is everybody's war. Let's win at home so the boys can win at the front."

The systematic torture of German nerves at home and the appalling slaughter of the flower of German manhood in Russia both were aimed at crippling the German war potential and breaking the enemy's will to fight.

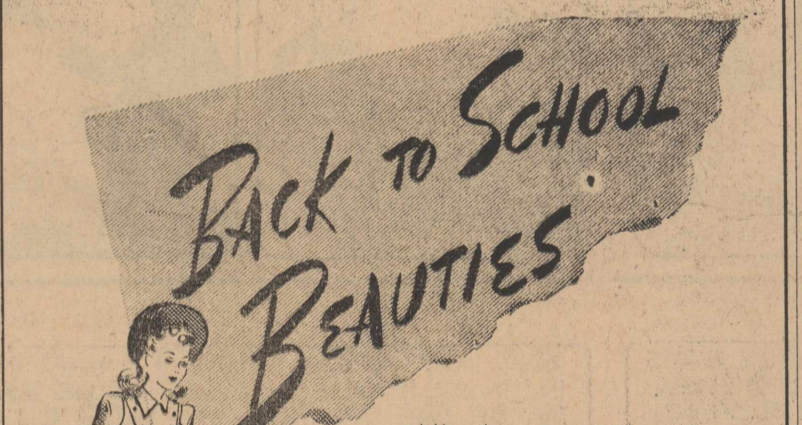

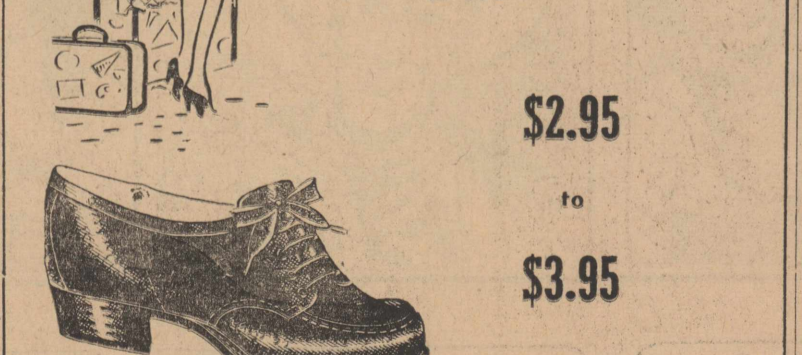

Croatian Folk Music Program On Friday

The Croatian Tamburitza Ensemble will appear in the High School Auditorium on Thursday, September 10, at 1:30 p. m., according to an announcement by Mrs. Alma Thomas.

The Tamburitza is the oldest string instrument in use by a Christian nation. Devised by Carpathian mountain shepherds more than fifteen centuries ago, it consisted originally of no more than two strings stretched along a piece of dry wood. The shepherds called their instrument a "dangubica," meaning the passing of the day. Evidently the dangubica was invented by the shepherds to amuse them as they watched their flocks.

The shepherds migrated farther and farther south and finally the groups or clans became known as Slovenes, Croats, Serbs, Dalmatians, Bosnians, etc. The Croats retained the dangubica as their household instrument. Improvements followed rapidly. One form was called the "bugaria," and another, the "Brac." From the Bugaria and Brac have come all of the present eight members of the Tamburitza family of instruments.

The Thursday programs here includes, besides the Jugo-Slav numbers, selections from well known composers. There are also the latest popular airs which are played with verve and zest. Folk songs sung to orchestral accompaniment, vocal duets, and solos, descriptive numbers and quaint dances from Croatia are unusual and favorite features. Clad in their native costumes, these spirited musicians form a striking picture and present a program of notable charm. From coast to coast, audiences have acclaimed this program an outstanding one. They were a hit in the South and Southwest the summer of 1942, appearing in such schools as the University of Texas.

Letters sent by this means should be addressed in care of the Postmaster, San Francisco, California. They should be sent Air Mail and an additional five cent stamp should be enclosed.
